Subject: PREMISES LICENCE REVIEW APPLICATION
RE: MEDITERRANEAN FOOD CENTRE, UNIT 2, MARQUEES ESTATE, ST PAULS ROAD, N1 2RH

1. Synopsis

- 1.1 This is an application by David Fordham of Islington Council's Trading Standards team for a Review of the Premises Licence under Section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003. A copy of the review application is attached as Appendix 1.
- 1.2 The grounds for review are related to the licensing objectives:
 - i) The prevention of crime and disorder.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 To determine the application to review the premises licence under Section 52 of the Licensing Act.
- 2.2 The Committee must have regard to the application and any relevant representations. The Committee must take such steps as necessary for the promotion of the four licensing objectives.
- 2.3 The steps stated in Sections 52(4) of the Act are as follows:
 - a) to modify the conditions of the licence; and for this purpose the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them are altered, omitted or any new condition is added;
 - b) to exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence;
 - c) to remove the designated premises supervisor;
 - d) to suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months;

- e) to revoke the licence;
- f) the Committee also have the option to leave the licence in its existing state;
- g) the Committee also has the power in relation to steps a) and b) to provide that the modification and exclusion only has effect for a limited period not exceeding three months.

3. Background

- 3.1 The premises currently holds a licence allowing:
 - i) The sale by retail of alcohol, off supplies only, Monday to Saturday from 08:00 until 23:00, and on Sunday 10:00 – 22:30.
- 3.2 Papers are attached as follows:-
 - Appendix 1: application form;
 - Appendix 2: current premises licence;
 - Appendix 3: police representations;
 - Appendix 4: suggested conditions and map of premise location.
- 3.3 The Licensing Authority has also received two representations one by way of a witness statement from the Police and one from the Council Health and Safety officer.
- 3.4 The Councils Trading Standards Team has recommended that the licence be revoked as there is evidence that the licensee has been knowingly involved in serious breaches of the law.
- 3.5 This application was originally heard by the licensing Sub Committee on the 2 February 2012, when the decision of the Committee was to revoke the licence. As the licence holder was not legally represented at the original hearing, the Council and the licensees' legal representative ha agreed by consent order at the Highbury Corner Magistrates Court to send the matter back to Council's Licensing Sub Committee in order for the case to be reheard.

4. Conclusion and reasons for recommendations

- 4.1 The Council is required to consider this application for review in the light of all relevant information from the applicant and the licence holder. It may attach such conditions necessary to promote the licensing objectives.

Licensing Sub-Committee C – 2 February 2012

99 **MEDITERRANEAN FOOD CENTRE, UNIT 2, MARQUESS ESTATE, ST PAULS ROAD, LONDON, N1 2RH – APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE REVIEW UNDER THE LICENSING ACT 2003 (Item B7)**

The trading standards officer reported that the review had been brought following a seizure of illicit wine, cigarettes and tobacco at the premises. He recommended that the licence be revoked as he had no confidence in the management standards. The police strongly supported revocation of the licence.

Mr Er, supported by his friend and translator, spoke against the review. He reported that he did not see the guidance letter sent in March 2011, warning businesses about smuggled goods. He made a mistake and bought wine from a van. He stated he received a letter from the trading standards officer dated 19 December but had been unable to make contact with him. He did not receive the letter that had been hand delivered on the 23 January informing him of the date of the hearing. He had contacted licensing agencies but they asked for large sums of money to represent him. He stated that he had only bought the wine the day before the alcohol was seized and knew that the alcohol was illicit.

In response to questions from the Sub-Committee, the trading standards officer reported that he had been warned by the HMRC a week or two before the seizure, to add this premises to his visits. Mr Er was unable to explain why the tobacco was in a chocolate box near the counter and inside a sofa bed.

In summing up, the trading standards officer reported that the evidence heard had not changed his view that the licence should be revoked. Mr Er apologised and asked that only conditions be imposed on his licence.

Members of the Sub-Committee left the room to consider their decision.

RESOLVED:

That the premises licence in respect of the Mediterranean Food Centre, Unit 2, Marquess Estate, St Pauls Road, N1 2RH be revoked.

REASONS FOR DECISION

The Sub-Committee considered the submissions put forward by the responsible authorities and the applicant.

The Sub-Committee noted that the review was brought following the discovery of smuggled alcohol and tobacco found at the premises by the responsible authorities. The Home Office guidance at paragraphs 11.26 and 11.27 identified criminal activity which the Secretary of State considered should be treated particularly seriously. This included the sale of smuggled tobacco and alcohol. The Sub-Committee considered that the crime prevention objective was undermined through the premises being used for the sale of smuggled tobacco and alcohol.

The Sub-Committee noted that 102 bottles of Italian wine, 35 x 20 packs of Marlboro Gold cigarettes and 3 x 50g of Golden Virginia tobacco were seized from the licensed premises on 11 November 2011. The licensee admitted he had bought the wine from a man in a van, despite clear advice being sent to the shop in March 2011. Thirty packs of the cigarettes were found inside a sofa bed that was folded up in the storage area of the shop. The licensee admitted that he knew that the tobacco was illegal and knew that he had bought illicit wine. The Sub-Committee therefore had grave concerns regarding the management of the premises. The Sub-Committee noted that the licensee was hiding tobacco, which he knew to be illicit, in a sofa bed to avoid detection. The Sub-Committee noted that the licensee knew that the wine he had bought was illicit wine. The Sub-Committee noted that no explanation was given as to why the illicit tobacco was being stored in chocolate boxes or in the sofa bed.

Licensing Sub-Committee C – 2 February 2012

The Sub-Committee noted that the licensee had been sent a letter from Trading Standards dated the 19 December and that the licensee claimed not to have received a hand delivered letter dated the 23 January. The Sub-Committee was not satisfied with the applicant's explanation as to his attempts to contact trading standards or the licensing team.

The Sub-Committee heard evidence from the applicant that he had only purchased the illicit wine the day before it was seized, however, evidence was also given by trading standards that the visit to the premises was occasioned by a tip off from HMRC and this had been planned at least a week in advance.

In light of the above the Sub-Committee was not satisfied with the standards of management at the premises. Although the licensee stated that he would accept further conditions on his licence he did not offer specific conditions and in any event, the Sub-Committee was not satisfied that adding further conditions to the licence would promote the licensing objectives. Equally, the Sub-Committee was not satisfied that the licensing objectives would be promoted by changing the DPS.

Given these considerations the Sub-Committee decided to revoke the licence. In reaching their decision, the Sub-Committee took into particular consideration licensing policy 028 which requires licensees to operate to the highest standards of management, licensing policy 038 regarding the review of licences and licensing policy 039 regarding the sale of smuggled goods and considered their decision was necessary and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives.

Jennifer Neil, barrister, supported by Mr Erodgan, the licensee, tabled a letter detailing the circumstances that had led to the underage sale. This would be interleaved with the agenda papers.

The trading standards officer highlighted that this review for underage sales was less than four months after a previous review in October 2011 following the seizure of illicit alcohol. At the previous review, a number of conditions had been added to the licence. Staff training records and the refusals book were not provided in December following the underage sale. Whilst he understood that the client had a disabled child and had been called away on that evening, the licensee had not put any measures in place for these circumstances.

Jennifer Neil reported to the Sub-Committee that Mr Erdogan had been called away for half an hour on the evening in question as the stairlift had broken and his wife needed help in putting his disabled daughter to bed. These were unforeseen circumstances and Mr Erdogan had left Mr Aksoy, who was not an employee, in charge of the premises. Mr Erdogan accepted that records were not kept at the premises; they were previously recorded informally and had now been transferred into a proper log. Ms Neil reported that Mr Erdogan had not suspected that the illicit alcohol had been smuggled. She did not consider that it was proportionate to revoke or suspend the licence as this had been an exceptional circumstance and would not happen again. Staff had all been trained in underage sales.

In response to questions, it was ascertained that Mr Aksoy had no retail experience and did not run a similar business, as stated in the letter from the solicitors. He did not know the age limit for alcohol. Members were concerned that Mr Erdogan did not have a good command of English and would lack the confidence to challenge young people. A Challenge 25 condition had been placed on the licence in October 2011 and at the time of the underage sale a Challenge 21 poster was on display in the shop. Training was given orally and a record was filled in after the incident in December.

This application to review relates to the objective to prevent crime and disorder and Licensing Policies 39 and 28. It particularly relates to the discovery of illicit alcohol and tobacco in the shop, which indicates that the highest standards of management have not been exhibited by the business.

On 23rd March 2011, a letter was sent to the premises, addressed to 'The Licensee and Proprietor', that introduced attached guidance about smuggled alcohol and tobacco and warned that businesses found with smuggled goods in future were likely to have their licences reviewed.

On 11th November, 2011, officers from Trading Standards and HMRC visited the premises to inspect the stock of alcohol and tobacco, following information received by HMRC that the business was dealing in illicit tobacco. The Licensee and owner of the business, Mr Er, was present. The officers seized the following as they were believed to be non-duty paid.

- 102 bottles (16.5 litres) of Italian wine: The wine was recognised by HMRC officers as brands that have regularly been smuggled and supplied in the region without duty being paid. Mr Er stated that he had bought the wine from a 'man in a van' and that he had no receipts. He said he had paid £17 for 12 (£1.42 per bottle). The duty payable on a bottle of wine is £1.81.
- 35 x 20 packs of Marlboro Gold Original cigarettes: All packs carry Polish language warnings and what appears to be a Polish tax marker was visible on the five loose packs.
- 3 x 50g packs of Golden Virginia hand rolling tobacco: All pouches carry Belgian warnings and tax markers. The pouches will be examined by the trademark hold before the review hearing.

The hand rolling tobacco and 5 packs of the cigarettes were found near the counter in a chocolate box. The remaining 30 packs of cigarettes (three sleeves of 200) were found inside a sofa bed that was folded up in the storage area of the shop.

The total duty that would have been evaded had the goods confirmed to have been illicit been sold is approximately £353.

Trading Standards are concerned at the possession for supply of illicit alcohol and tobacco for the following reasons:

- Counterfeit spirits, particularly vodka, may be unsafe to consume.
- The willingness to intentionally or recklessly break one law indicates the business is less likely to be compliant with other laws.
- The sale by retailers of illicit goods gives them an unfair advantage over law abiding businesses.
- Illicit goods are often smuggled into the country and / or produced by organised crime. It is believed that the profits are frequently used to fund other types of serious crime.
- The trade in illicit alcohol and tobacco causes huge losses to the UK's tax revenues.

Section 13(4) of Licensing Act 2003 and Regulation 7 of The Licensing Act 2003 (Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates) Regulations 2005 makes a local weights and measures authority a responsible authority for the purposes of the legislation. Islington Council is a local weights and measures authority and that function is carried out by the trading standards team.

Here is a summary of events supporting this application

23/03/11	TS advice	TS sent the business guidance on smuggled alcohol as part of a mailshot to all independent off licences.
11/11/11	Seizure	102 bottles of wine; 700 cigarettes; and 0.15kg hand rolling tobacco seized by HMRC

Recommendations:

This licensee has clearly demonstrated that he is unconcerned with legal compliance, let alone fulfilling his responsibility to promote the licensing objectives.

Clear advice on how to avoid stocking illicit alcohol was sent to the shop in March 2011. One piece of advice given was "Never buy alcohol, cigarettes or tobacco from anyone who brings the goods to the shop", yet this is exactly what Mr Er has admitted doing.

The guidance also said that warning on tobacco products had to be in English and that if they were not, the product "is illegal for sale in the UK and is almost certain to be smuggled". The fact that the illicit tobacco was hidden is a clear indication that Mr Er knew it to be illegal.

I believe on the facts described in this application that this licence should be revoked as there is evidence that the licensee has been knowingly involved in serious breaches of the law. This gives me no confidence in his willingness to fulfil his responsibility to promote the licensing objectives or to exhibit the highest standards of management.



My name is Robin Clark and I am a Police Sergeant with the Metropolitan Police Service. I currently work as a Licensing officer at Islington Police Station. I have been given this specific responsibility by the Borough Commander who is acting under the written delegated authority of the Commissioner of Police for the Metropolis. A copy of this authority has been lodged with Islington Council Legal Department.

This statement is submitted in response to the review application made by the Mr David Fordham of Islington Council Trading Standards Service regarding the premises Mediterranean Food Centre, Unit 2, Marquess Estate, St Paul's Road, N1 2RH.

Having read the information provided by Islington Trading Standards I have very grave concerns about the management of these premises and cannot see how they can continue to be trusted to meet the necessary standard of management for the licensed trade. Not only have they failed to meet the licensing objectives but by hiding the goods in a sofa they have shown criminal intent to avoid detection and to thwart the efforts of the Council officials and Police. As such on behalf of Islington Police I strongly support the request for revocation of this licence.

**Licensing Act 2003 – Requirements schedule dated 13 January 2012 for
Mediterranean Food Centre Unit 2, Marquess Estate St Paul's Road N1 2RH**

- (1) Two additional emergency lighting luminaires in compliance with BS 5266 – 1 should be provided in the trading area of the shop.

The two new emergency lighting luminaires should be equally spaced between the existing emergency lighting luminaires in the trading area of the shop.

Note: Non-maintained emergency lighting should be wired to the local lighting circuit in such a manner as to operate not only in the event of failure of the mains supply but also on failure of the supply to the local lighting circuit.

- (2) Remove the green stick on signs attached to the existing emergency lighting luminaires within the premises.
- (3) The existing emergency lighting luminaires in the shop and basement stairway should be cleaned, inspected and tested to ensure that each luminaire is wired to the local lighting circuit in such a manner as to operate not only in the event of failure of the mains supply but also on failure of the supply to the local lighting circuit.
- (4) Mains operated smoke alarms with a standby power supply such as a rechargeable or replaceable battery or capacitor in accordance with BS 5839 – 6 should be provided in the parts of the premises specified below:

- Trading area of the shop.
- Basement stairway.

Smoke alarms should be sited so that no point is further than 7.5m from the nearest smoke alarm. Smoke alarms should not be mounted within 500mm of any walls or obstructions.

Smoke alarms should be interlinked so that detection of smoke by one unit operates the alarm signal in all of them. Smoke alarms should be wired in compliance with BS 7671 to a single independent circuit at the main distribution board. The circuit should be clearly labelled **Fire Alarm do not isolate**.

- (5) Mechanical extract ventilation should be installed in the toilet extracting direct to external air at a rate of not less than 6 litres/second. The extract fan should have a 15 minute over-run controlled by the light switch. Air inlet to the toilet should be provided, e.g. 10mm gap under the door.
- (6) Graphic symbol exit sign in compliance with the Health and Safety (Safety Signs and Signals) Regulations should be fixed over the entrance/exit door and graphic symbol exit route signs indicating the escape route to the entrance/exit door should be suspended from the ceiling within the trading area of the shop.
- (7) Fire extinguishers should be sited in staffed areas adjacent to the exits from staffed areas.

Fire fighting appliances should be on brackets or stands and located so as not to obstruct exit routes or cause a hazard to persons in and about the premises.

Appropriate signs should be fixed adjacent to the fire fighting appliances indicating the type of fire fighting appliance and the class of fire covered.

Note: The next inspection/service date for the fire extinguishers is March 2012.

(8) Copies of the inspection and test certificates specified below, certified by an approved competent person, should be submitted to the responsible authority for health and public safety.

- Electrical installation for the smoke alarm system
- Emergency lighting

An approved competent person for the testing and certification of electrical installations and emergency lighting should be one of the following:

A contractor enrolled with the National Inspection Council for Electrical Installation Contracting, or a member of the Electrical Contractors Association, or a competent person from an appropriate approved organisation.

Suggested conditions of approval recommended by health and safety

1. The premises shall not be used under the licence until the requirements specified in the schedule dated 13 January 2012 have been completed and approved in writing by the responsible authority for health and safety.
