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Subject: PREMISES LICENCE NEW APPLICATION

RE: EXPRESS FOOD STORE, 2-3 CLIFTON TERRACE, LONDON, N4 3JP

1. Synopsis

- 1.1 This is an application for a new premise licence under the Licensing Act 2003.
- 1.2 The new application is to:
 - i) permit the premises to sell alcohol, off supplies only, Mondays to Sundays for 24 hours a day.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 To determine the application for a new premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.

2.2 To consider the representation from the Police in the light of the revised Secretary of State Guidance to Local Authorities issued on 25th April 2012 namely:

The Licensing Authority should accept all reasonable and proportionate representations made by the Police unless the Authority has evidence that to do so would not be appropriate for the promotion of the Licensing Objectives.

2.3 If the Committee grants the application it should be subject to:

- i. conditions of the current premises licence;
- ii. conditions prepared by the Licensing Officer which are consistent with the Operating Schedule (See appendix 4);
- iii. conditions recommended by responsible Authorities (see appendix 4);
- iv. any conditions deemed necessary by the Committee to promote the four licensing objectives.

3. Background

3.2 There is a premise currently in effect at this location held by the applicant to permit the sale of alcohol on Monday to Sunday from 08:00 until 23:00.

3.3 The Licensing Team has received 3 letters of representation, from the Metropolitan Police, Licensing Authority and Public Health Authority.

- STAFF TO BE TRAINED REGULARLY ON LICENSING PROVISIONS AND THIS TO BE DOCUMENTED.



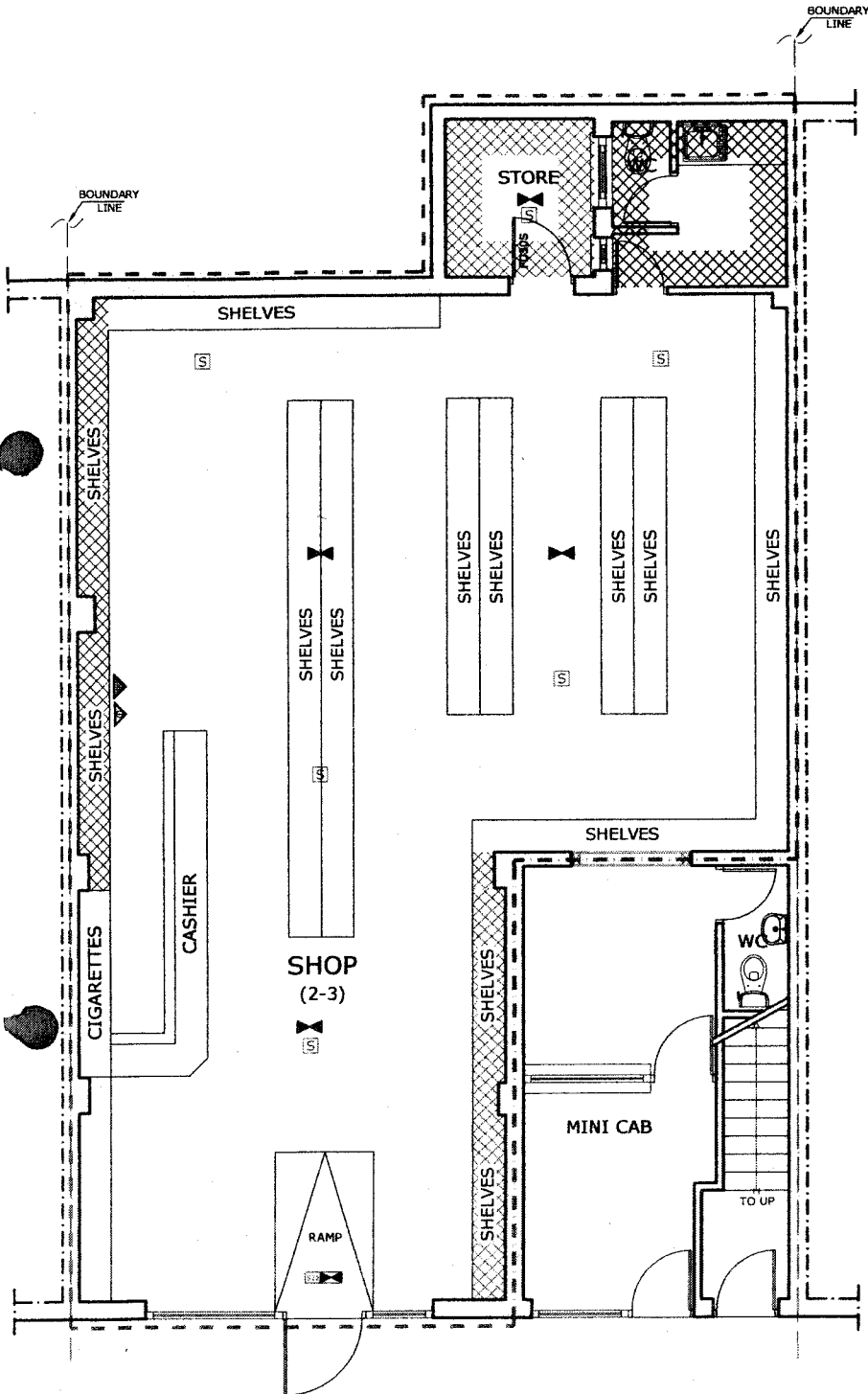

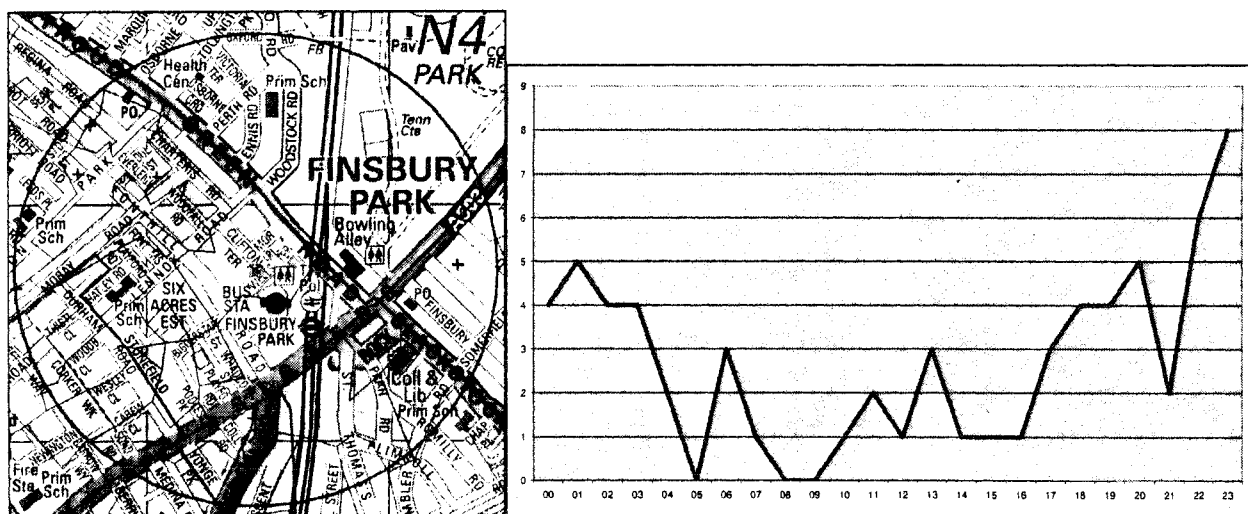
The figures below show borough wide statistics for alcohol violence, alcohol related offences, and 999 calls with an **alcohol qualifier**. The time period in question is November 2011-October 2012 unless stated:

- There were 714 violent offences involving alcohol.
- The borough suffered 1563 crimes with alcohol as a contributing factor.
- Police were called to 702 emergency calls involving alcohol.
- There were 1861 violence offences between the hours of 2000-0600.
- There were 6977 property crime offences between the hours of 2000-0600.
- The London Ambulance Service attended 1272 incidents in Islington between Oct 2011 and Sep 2012 where alcohol was recorded as a feature.
- Islington has a known cohort of street drinkers. These individuals often congregate in favoured places such as particular parks or areas of street pavement. Between Oct 2011-Sep 2012, outreach teams recorded a total of 230 contacts with street drinkers across the borough.



Alcohol Issues - LBI Only

London Ambulance data indicates that between October 2011 and September 2012 (most recent data available) ambulances were called to 65 incidents in the area (Islington only) where alcohol was noted as a feature. Data mapped according to output areas highlights the Seven Sisters Road/Finsbury Park LT area. Note no data was available for areas outside Islington.



Temporal data for the town centre indicates that alcohol related attendances peaked between 22:00-01:00 hours over the period. The general trend data indicates that call out levels were higher in the hours around/following midnight.

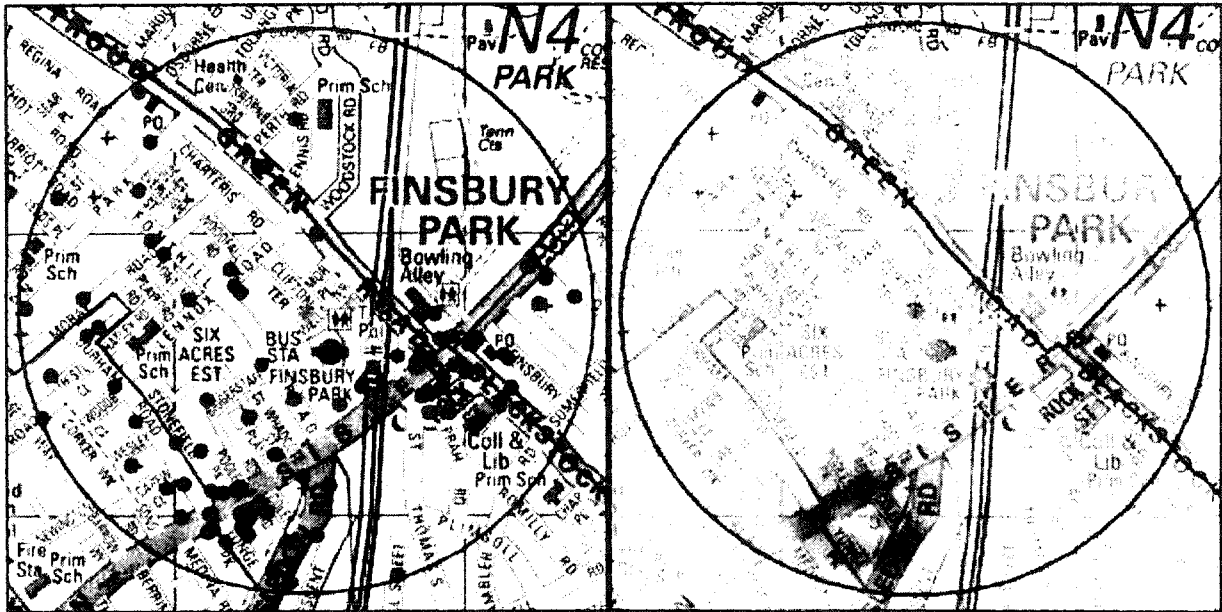

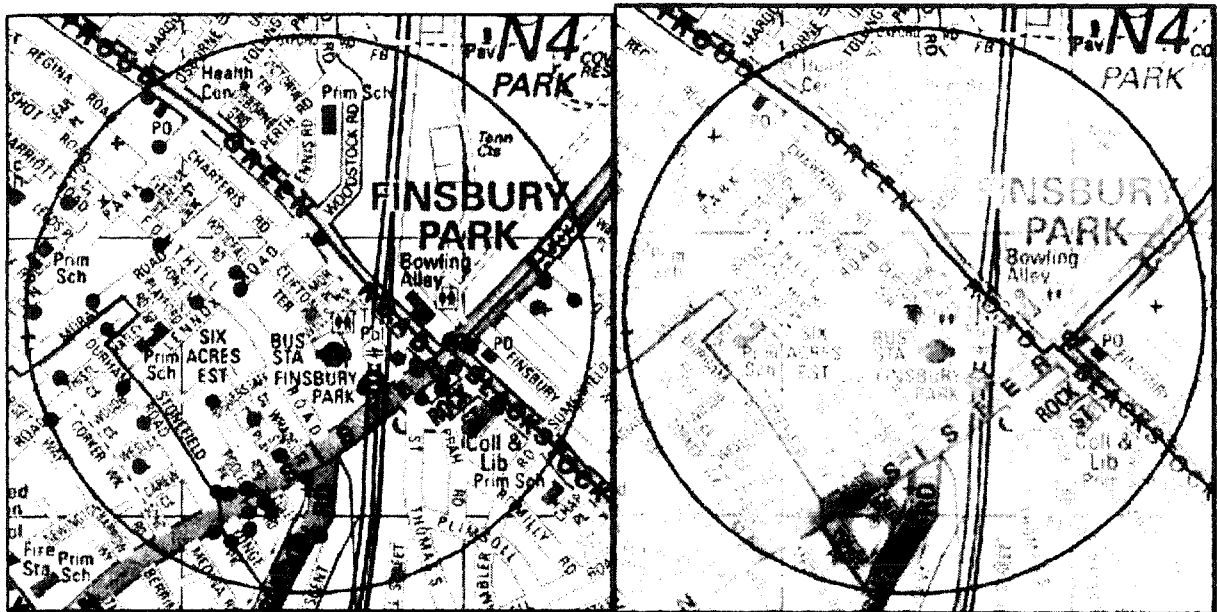

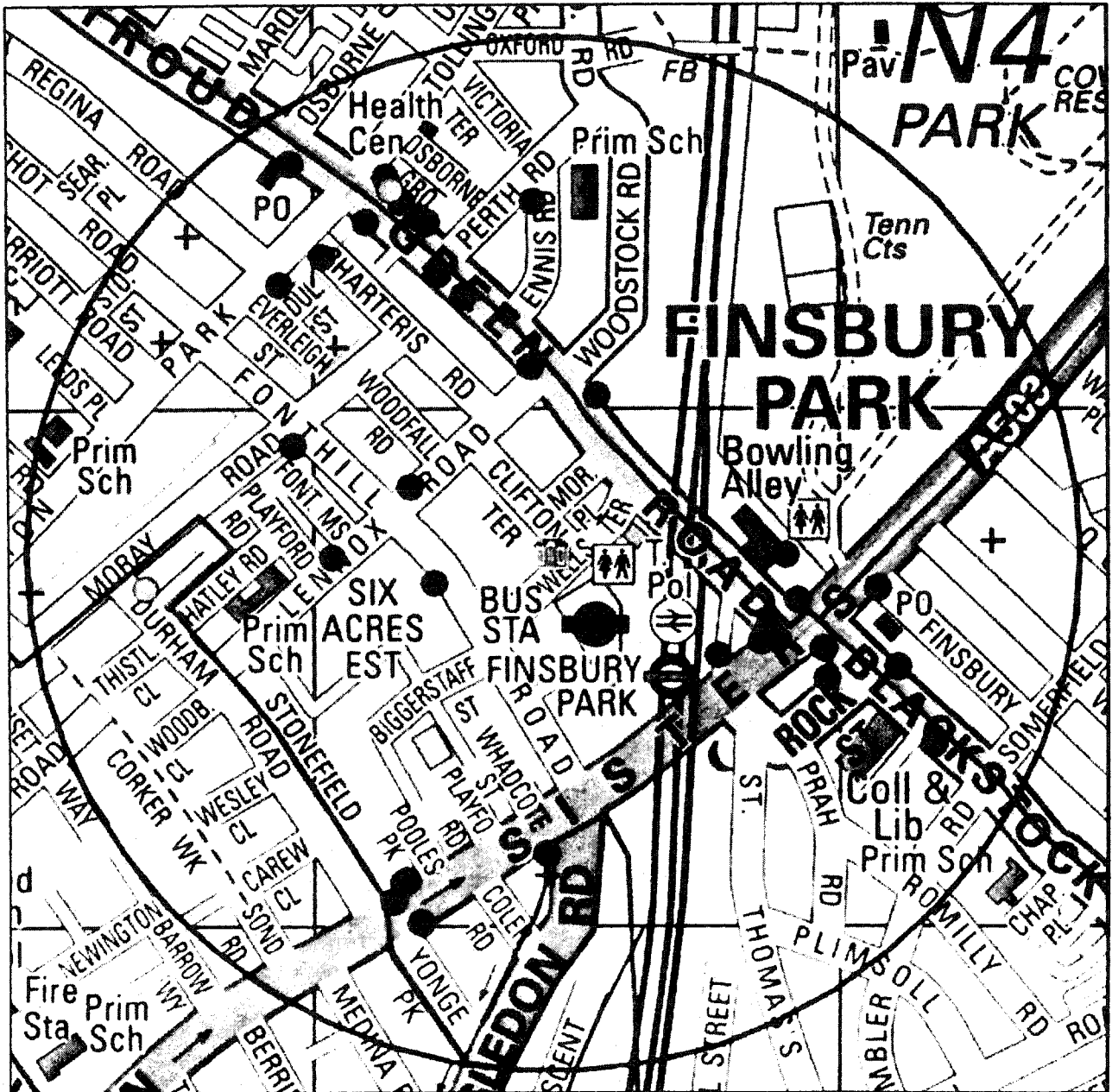

There are 11 pubs, 24 restaurants, 2 [unclear], and no [unclear] in this area.

I formally oppose the granting of this licence application on behalf of Islington Police. This statement provides the rationale for my decision.

Over recent years Islington has experienced rapid growth in its night time economy. The cumulative effect of this is a heavy footfall of persons who are not resident in Islington Borough but who are present between the hours of 8pm and 6am to take advantage of the extremely vibrant night-time economy.

Unfortunately there has not been commensurate increase in public services. Each new license or extension of an existing license will create additional demand on a range of public services. There is a direct link between the number of persons in public places who have consumed alcohol and the number of violent assaults that take place in that public place. This 'new' business for the police will involve reporting and investigating more instances of theft, anti social behaviour, drunkenness and serious assaults. No additional police resource will be available to cope with this extra demand. More people will be the victims of crime and more people will be injured.

The number of Police personnel available both in terms of uniform deterrence and investigative capacity is at its lowest between the hours of 11pm and 8am. At a time when both Police resources are being severely squeezed long with the resources available to NHS I would strongly resist increasing the number of persons who have consumed alcohol onto the streets of Islington. I have dwindling resources to deal with the consequences. The average investigation into an allegation of Grievous Bodily Harm costs Islington Police £2000 to investigate. Last year Islington investigated over 350 such crimes. This takes no account of the costs to the NHS. It also takes no account of the thousands of alcohol-related Actual Bodily Harm and Common Assault investigations that are taken on by Islington Police every year.

In an area that is already saturated with Licensed Premises it is just not sustainable to keep increasing the number of people on those streets after midnight. No matter how well any establishment is run internally their very business case is based on growing the number of people who end up on the streets of Islington having been drinking. As local public services are already stretched then the inevitable consequence of granting more post-midnight licences is an increase in the number of victims of serious violence. I would ask that the licence application be rejected.

Licensing Act 2003**Representation from NHS North Central London (Islington Public Health) on behalf of health bodies providing services in Islington****Express Food Store, 2-3 Clifton Terrace, N4 3JP**

I am submitting a representation against the application to vary the premises license to permit the sale of alcohol 24 hours a day from the above premises. This representation is on behalf of NHS North Central London's Islington Public Health Department, which as a health body is a responsible authority.

The impact of alcohol is particularly great in Islington with some of the greatest levels of alcohol-related problems in London, including:

- The highest rate of alcohol-specific deaths in men in London
- One of the highest rates of alcohol-related hospital admissions in London
- Significantly higher levels of alcohol-related violent crime and claimants of incapacity benefit where main medical reason for being a claimant is alcoholism

Finsbury Park ward seems to particularly feel the affects of alcohol related harm and has higher rates of both alcohol-related and alcohol-specific hospital admissions.

The grounds for the representation are:

- Public safety
- Crime and disorder

The relevant policies in Islington's Licensing Policy

- Policy 23: Location, cumulative impact and saturation
- Policy 25: Shops selling alcohol

Express Food Store is located in Finsbury Park ward. This is an area which already has relatively high density of premises. Currently within Finsbury Park Ward there are:

- 85 premises licensed to sell alcohol, equivalent to one premises for every 127 residents aged 18 and over. This is close to the Islington average.
- 39 premises are licensed for off-sales of alcohol only (i.e. excluding on-licences that also sell alcohol for consumption off the premises), one for every 277 residents aged 18 and over in the ward, and 4th highest rate in Islington (the average is one per 390 in Islington)
- 10 off-licensed premises are licensed to sell alcohol for consumption 24 hours a day off the premises in Finsbury ward: one for every 1,079 residents (the average is one per 2,018 in Islington)

I am concerned that if this application is granted it will increase the availability of alcohol for consumption off premises. This could lead to an increase in public nuisance, crime and disorder and impact adversely on health of both those buying and consuming the alcohol but also the health of others who come in contact with them.

The area already has sufficient premises to meet demand of local residents and additional outlets supplying alcohol after 1am will be detrimental to the local residents in terms of noise and disturbance in the early hours of the morning.

Alcohol and health

Alcohol misuse imposes a major preventable burden to health and the effect of this in Islington is felt across all health services. Recent analysis has estimated that in Islington the cost of hospital admissions where alcohol is an attributable factor was £7429.9k, (£39.4 per Islington resident during the financial year 2008/09¹¹).

There is a growing body of evidence that an increased number of alcohol outlets results in significant increases in both alcohol consumption and alcohol-related harm, including injury, violence and medical harm. Evidence from a number of countries indicates reducing alcohol outlet density can have an impact on reducing violence and problem drinking. There is also strong and reasonably consistent evidence that changes in hours or days of trading can have a significant impact on volume of alcohol consumed and rates of alcohol related problems^{2,3,4,5,6}.

Impact of alcohol on health in Islington

The impact of alcohol on health in Islington is particularly severe. Alcohol-specific hospital admissions are those which are wholly related to alcohol (e.g. alcoholic liver disease or alcohol overdose). Islington has the second

North Central London

highest rate in London for hospital admissions where alcohol is the specific cause of admission. For men the rate is also significantly worse than England, with Islington having the 24th highest rate out of 326 boroughs nationally.

Currently Islington has one of the highest rates of alcohol-related hospital admissions (all hospital admissions in which alcohol is likely to have played a part, for example injuries/falls or high blood pressure) in London. The rate for both men and women is significantly worse than the England average. Increases in alcohol related admissions have been much higher in Islington than in England as a whole. For instance, in Islington, the increase in alcohol-related admissions in men was 39% and 44% for women between 2003/4 and 2009/10, compared to increases of 25% for both men and women in England.

Finsbury Park Ward

Ambulance callouts

The data on alcohol-related ambulance callouts reflects where the ambulance attended, not where the individual lives, and therefore includes people who live outside the borough but who come into Islington to work, socialise, etc. In 2011/12, there were 253 alcohol-related ambulance callouts in Finsbury Park ward (10.8% of all alcohol-related callouts in Islington), compared to an average of 146 per ward. Local analysis indicates that there is a general trend of ambulance callouts increasing as the number of licensed premises increases. At the smaller geographical Lower Super Output Area (equal to an area of around 1,500 residents), there were 33 alcohol-related ambulance call-outs in the vicinity of the Express Food Store, compared to an average of 20 across all Islington LSOAs. Across Islington, 53% of alcohol-related callouts resulted in conveying a person to hospital, and 6% resulted in assistance being given at the scene or conveyed to an NHS walk-in centre – this results in a substantial use of health service resource.

Hospital admissions

Finsbury ward had the 6th highest rate of alcohol-specific hospital admissions among Islington wards in 2011/12, with a rate of 857 per 100,000 people – equivalent to more than 90 admissions to hospital.

Of all the wards in Islington, Finsbury Park ward had the highest rate of alcohol-related hospital admissions in 2011/12 – a rate of 3,307 hospital admissions per 100,000 people – equivalent to more than 400 admissions. This rate in Finsbury Park ward was significantly higher than the average for Islington as a whole.

Conclusion

Islington experiences some of the highest levels of alcohol-related harm in London and the cumulative availability of alcohol is one area that is likely to be impacting on this.

Rates of hospital admissions as a result of alcohol are higher in Finsbury Park ward than in the borough as a whole, indicating alcohol is having a particular impact on residents in this part of Islington.

There is already good availability of alcohol through off licences in Finsbury Park, with a higher than average density as measured by the number of off licences per residents aged 18 and over.

There is evidence that increased availability of alcohol, both in terms of the time period in which alcohol is available (hours of sale) and number of premises from which alcohol is available results in an increase in alcohol related harm. The effect of this is increased pressure and costs to the NHS. The impacts are also felt across a range of groups including the council, policing and the community as a whole.

Recommendation

NHS North Central London's Islington Public Health Department recommends that:

1. The application for a 24 hour licence to supply alcohol is refused
2. The permitted hours of 07:00 to 01:00 at these premises not extended.

**Licensing Act 2003- Representation from the Licensing Authority
Application: Express Food Store, 2-3 Clifton Terrace, London N4 3JP**

I am submitting a representation on behalf of the Licensing Authority against the new application for a Premises Licence to permit the sale of alcohol 24 hours a day from the above premises.

The grounds for the representation are:

- Public nuisance
- Crime and disorder

The premises already has a premises licence under the trading name Nisa Local, which permits off sales of alcohol until 1am each day of the week. In May 2012 the licensee of Nisa Local applied for a 24 hour licence to permit the sale of alcohol. This application was refused by the Licensing Committee in June 2012.

Express Food Store is located in the Finsbury Park ward to just behind Finsbury Park station. This is situated in an alcohol related crime and disorder hotspot area any further increase in the late night availability of alcohol needs to be carefully managed to ensure that the area, which has already reached saturation point in terms of crime and disorder, is carefully managed.

The premise is close to the densely populated Andover Estate.

There are over 100 licensed premises in the Finsbury Park ward, 41 premises are licensed for the off sales of alcohol and 6 premises hold a 24 hour license. The nearest off licence, in Wells Terrace, holds a premises licence to permit off sales until 2am each day.

The area already has sufficient licensed premises to cater for demands of local residents and any additional outlets supplying alcohol in the early hours of the morning will be detrimental to the local residents in terms in terms of noise and disturbance and increase the potential for increasing alcohol related crime and disorder.

The Licensing Authority fully supports any representations for the Police in terms of crime and disorder and is committed to supporting the Reclaim the Night programme of activities to reduce the incidence of alcohol related crime through reducing access to alcohol late at night.

Whilst the section 10.13 of the Guidance issued under s812 Licensing Act 2003 encourages Local Authorities to grant premises licences for shops and supermarkets to permit alcohol sales whenever the outlet is open for shopping the Licensing Authority may restrict hours where there are good reasons, based up the licensing objectives. The Licensing Authority is of the opinion that the alcohol related crime hotspot data for this area provides good reasons for departing from this guidance.

In determining this application the Licensing Committee should be mindful of:

Licensing Policy 23 – '*... the type of premises and their cumulative impact upon the area*

Licensing Policy 25- in particular paragraph 109 in which the Licensing Authority expresses its concern over the increasing number of licensed shops selling alcohol for consumption off the premises and advises that it will '*...consider restricting the hour in locations where longer hours are not considered appropriate because of the nature of the area or where representations are received...*

The Licensing Authority recommends that the application for a 24 hour licence is refused and that consideration be given to granting a licence to permit off sales of alcohol until 1am.

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
 - a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
3. All door supervisors shall be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.
4. The admission of children to the exhibition of a film shall be restricted in accordance with the recommendation of a film classification body as defined in the Video Recordings Act 1984 or Islington Council acting as the licensing authority where it has given notice in section 20(3) of the Licensing Act 2003.
5. The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any "irresponsible promotions" in relation to the premises.

In this condition, an "irresponsible promotion" means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children:

 - a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to:
 - i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);
 - c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
 - d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on:
 - i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
 - ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
 - e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
6. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
7. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

8. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

9. The responsible person shall ensure that:
 - a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:
 - i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
 - b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule
