41 <u>INTRODUCTIONS AND PROCEDURE (Item 1)</u>

Councillor Poole welcomed everyone to the meeting, asked members and officers to introduce themselves and informed those present that the procedure was as detailed in the agenda.

42 APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE (Item 2)

46 MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETINGS (Item 6) RESOLVED

That the minutes of the meetings held on the 22 September 2014, the 2 October 2014 and the 18 November 2014 be confirmed as a correct record of proceedings and the Chair be authorised to sign them.

47 <u>MINI FOOD STORE, 8 KINGS CROSS ROAD, WC1X 9AQ - APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE REVIEW. (Item 1)</u>

The Sub-Committee heard from the license Mrs Kidane, that she had not received the notification of hearing but was only aware of the meeting following the receipt of an email the previous day. She had also been unable to contact her solicitor. The licensing officer reported that the notification of the hearing had been sent to both the home and the business address.

The Sub-Committee was satisfied that notification had been despatched in good time and informed the licensee that the majority of licensees did not have legal representation. The Sub-Committee agreed to proceed with the review on that basis.

The trading standards officer reported that they recommended that the licence be suspended and conditions added. The trigger for the review was that wine was seized, believed to be non-duty paid, in March 2014. The licence holders were out of the country at the time and had left Mr Habetesellaisse in charge of the shop. He was a personal licence holder and should have been suspicious of the wine. Wine had also been seized in

September 2012. The licence holders were out of the country on business at this time and the matter could not be resolved promptly. The officer stated that in their favour there had been no further problems with underage sales since one had been made in February 2011, despite three test purchases. All spirits seemed legal when recently checked. He stated that the business did not seem to have any other regulatory issues. The business was offered the option of voluntarily not selling alcohol and adding conditions to the licence but the licensees chose not to accept this offer. He invited the Sub-Committee to impose a suspension, add proposed conditions and also add an additional condition relating to the responsiveness of the designated premises supervisor or the licensee.

In response to questions the trading standards officer reported that the extra condition suggested was not usual, but in this particular case, where there had been issues with prolonged absences of the licensees, it was believed to be proportionate.

Mrs Kidane, the licensee, stated that they had left Mr Habetesellaise in charge while away. He had bought the alcohol during this time. He had now been removed from the business. Mrs Kidane had been full time at the business for the past six months and was taking responsibility. A friend supporting Mrs Kidane stated that Mr Habetellaise had been the manager for about a year and he was the problem. Mrs Kidane knew the proper way to purchase alcohol and had CCTV. The solicitor had advised not to accept the voluntary suspension. All other proposed conditions were met.

In response to questions the Sub-Committee noted that Mrs Kidane had read the Licensing Policy. She understood that the standards of management would need to be robust. She would be responsible for the premises and would be on-site. It was stated that she would not be returning to Ethiopia but would be permanently in this country.

In summary, the trading standards officer reports that the business had not caused undue problems but issues arose during the prolonged absence of the licensees. He considered that the additional conditions proposed would overcome these problems. Mrs Kidane stated that she was aware of the mistakes made and would continue to manage the premises.

RESOLVED

That the premises licence in respect of Mini Food Store, 8 Kings Cross Road, WC1X 9AQ be suspended for a period of two weeks and conditions as detailed on pages 49 and 50 of the agenda be added to the licence with the following additional condition.

 The licensee or the DPS must be able to present themselves to responsible bodies in person within seven days of notice being left at the premises, unless prior agreement has been given by the Licensing Authority.

REASONS FOR DECISION

The Sub-Committee listened to all the evidence and submissions and read all the material. The Sub-Committee reached the decision having given consideration to the Licensing Act 2003, as amended, and its regulations, the national guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.

The Sub-Committee heard evidence from Trading Standards that the trigger for the review was the seizure of wine on 31st March 2014. There was no evidence of duty having been paid by the business for the wine. Invoices had been provided to Trading Standards but these were not acceptable to Trading Standards. The wine had been purchased by Mr Habetesellaisse, an employee who had been left in charge of the shop whilst the licensees and DPS were out of the country.

The Sub Committee heard further evidence that illicit alcohol had also been seized from the shop in September 2012, when Mr and Mrs Kidane were abroad on business.

The Sub-Committee heard that there was an underage sale in February 2011, but following this, three subsequent tests had been passed. The business did not seem to have any other regulatory issues and trading standards officers considered that the matter could be dealt with by a suspension and the imposition of additional conditions.

The Sub-Committee noted that there had been no further problems of underage sales since the one in 2011.

The Sub-Committee heard evidence that the previous problems referred to above had arisen as a result of poor management. This fact was accepted at the hearing by Ms. Kidane and she informed the Sub-Committee that she was now more directly involved and that the staff who had accepted illicit goods in the past had been dismissed. This was accepted by Trading Standards.

Trading Standards informed the Sub-Committee that their proposed conditions had been accepted by the licensees and that the only area of disagreement was the fact that Trading Standards had asked the Sub-Committee to suspend the licence for a period.

Section 52 Licensing Act 2003, provides that the conditions of a licence may be modified if it is considered necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The authority may also suspend the licence for a maximum period of 3 months.

The Sub-Committee was of the opinion that the inclusion of the extra conditions together with a 2 week suspension was both reasonable and proportionate.



3.2 Licensing History

- 24th November 2005, premises licence granted to Giraffe Concepts Limited. The
 premises licence was granted by way of conversion under the Licensing Act 2003 from a
 restaurant licence issued by the Magistrates Court. The premises licence, as a result,
 currently has conditions attached to it which stipulate that the premises must supply
 substantial food and that the supply of alcohol is only authorised as an ancillary to a meal;
- 19th September 2014, Brewdog Bars Ltd became the licensee;

- 5th December 2014, premises licence variation application received;
- 12th December 2014, applicant submits additional information, including an operating schedule, dispersal policy and smoking policy.

4. Planning Implications

4.1 Historical records indicate that the lawful use of the land is as a restaurant, under use class A3. The proposed use, primarily as a drinking establishment, would appear to fall under use class A4 and the applicant is therefore reminded that planning permission would be required for such a change of use.

5 Recommendations

- 5.2 If the Committee grants the application it should be subject to:



Appendix 2

DISPERSAL POLICY BREWDOG ESSEX ROAD ISLINGTON

The purpose of this Dispersal Policy is to ensure, so far as it is possible, that minimum disturbance or nuisance is caused to our neighbours and to ensure that the operation of the premises makes the minimum impact upon the neighbourhood in relation to potential nuisance and anti-social behaviour. This will be achieved by exercising pro-active measures towards and at the end of the evening.

By ensuring that this Dispersal Policy document is brought to the attention of Management and Staff we will seek to encourage the efficient, controlled and safe dispersal of our patrons during our closing period.

- 1. At the end of the evening management and staff will assist with the orderly and gradual dispersal of patrons.
- 2. Staff Members (including door personnel when employed) will advise patrons to leave the premises quickly and quietly out of respect for our neighbours.
- 3. Notices will be displayed requesting our customers to leave quietly and in an orderly manner out of consideration to neighbours and their attention will be drawn to these notices by members of staff.
- 4. We will ensure the removal of all bottles and drinking receptacles from any patron before exiting the premises (this does not apply in the case of consumption in any delineated external drinking area).
- 5. We will actively discourage our customers from assembling outside the premises at the end of the evening.

SMOKING POLICY BREWDOG ESSEX ROAD ISLINGTON

- 1. Any outside area used by customers wishing to smoke shall be covered by the CCTV system which will be installed at the premises.
- 2. The outside area shall be monitored by staff or door staff (when employed) at all times it is in use.
- 3. The area will be cleaned regularly.
- 4. Suitable receptacles shall be provided for smokers to dispose of cigarette butts.
- 5. Signs will be displayed in the area requesting customers keep noise to a minimum.
- 6. Patrons who disregard signage and verbal instructions regarding noise will be asked to move inside and/or leave the premises.
- 7. Open containers of alcohol shall not be permitted to be taken beyond the boundary of the outside area.

OPERATING SCHEDULE - BREWDOG ESSEX ROAD ISLINGTON

Staff shall be trained in the requirements of the Licensing Act 2003 with regard to the Licensing Objectives.

A) The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

- 1. All instances of crime and disorder shall be reported to the police.
- 2. An incident book shall be used to record all instances of public disorder.
- 3. The holder of the premises licence or its nominee shall subscribe to and participate fully in the local pub/club/shop watch scheme.
- 4. The licensee shall, in accordance with a risk assessment to be carried out by the DPS, provide a sufficient number of door supervisors to prevent the admission of, and ensure the departure from the premises of drunk and disorderly people or other people displaying signs of other substance abuse, without causing further disorder.
- 5. CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. The system will enable frontal identification of every person entering the premises. The system shall record in real time and operate whilst the premises are open for licensable activities. The recordings shall be kept available for a minimum of 31 days. Recordings shall be made available to an Authorised Officer or a Police Officer (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998) within 24 hours of any request.
- 6. Alcoholic and other drinks purchased from the premises may not be taken away from the immediate curtilage of the premises in open containers such as glasses or opened bottles (save for consumption in any delineated external area as shown on the plan attached to the licence).
- 7. Clear and prominent notices shall be displayed on the premises warning customers of the need to quard their property and to be aware of the operation of pickpockets, bag snatchers, etc. The notices shall advise customers to report concerns to the designated premises supervisor or the person in charge of the licensed premises.
- 8. Staff will be trained in the laws relating to under age sales, and that training shall be documented and repeated at 6 monthly intervals.
- 9. A refusals book will be maintained at the premises, and made available to an officer of a responsible authority upon request.

B) Public Safety

- 1. Safety checks shall be carried out before the admission of the public. Details of safety checks shall be kept in a Log-book on the premises. The Log-book shall be made available for inspection by authorised officers.
- 2. All exit routes shall be kept unobstructed, with non-slippery and even surfaces, free of trip hazards and clearly identified.
- 3. Where chairs and tables are provided, internal gangways shall be kept unobstructed.

- 4. All exits doors shall be maintained easily operable without the use of a key, card, code or similar means.
- 5. Exit doors shall be regularly checked to ensure that they function satisfactorily and a record of the check shall be kept.
- 6. Any removable security fastenings must be removed whenever the premises are open to the public or occupied by staff.
- 7. The edges of the treads of steps and stairways must be maintained so as to be in good condition and be conspicuous.
- 8. When disabled people are present, there must be sufficient numbers of staff and adequate arrangements must be in place to enable their safe evacuation in the event of an emergency. Disabled people on the premises must be made aware of such arrangements by staff and by the use of appropriate signage.
- 9. In the absence of adequate daylight, the lighting in any area accessible to the public shall be fully in operation when they are present.
- 10. Emergency lighting batteries are fully charged before the admission of the public.
- 11. Access for emergency vehicles must be kept clear and free from obstruction.
- 12. Adequate and appropriate supply of first aid equipment and materials must be available on the premises at all times.
- 13. There must be at least one suitably trained first-aider on duty when the public are present, and if more than one suitably trained first-aider is available, their respective duties must be clearly defined.
- 14. A first aid box will be available at the premises at all times.
- 15. The premises shall maintain an Incident Log and public liability insurance.

C) The Prevention of Public Nuisance

- 1. Noise or vibration must not emanate from the premises so as to cause a nuisance to nearby properties.
- 2. No more than 120 customers shall be permitted inside the premises at any one time.
- 3. Seating will be available for not less than 60 customers.
- 4. No more than 32 customers shall be permitted to stand in the premises whilst consuming alcohol.
- 5. No more than 28 seated customers shall be permitted in the external seating area.
- 6. Use of the external seating area shall cease at 23:00 save in respect of smokers, which will be limited to 10 customers at any one time.
- 7. Food will be available until 60 minutes before licensable activities cease.
- 8. Prominent, clear and legible notices must be displayed at all exits requesting the public to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly.
- 9. A dedicated licensed taxi/mini cab service shall be available with the premises for customers.

- 10. The emptying of bins into skips, and refuse collections will not take place between 23:00 and 07:00.
- 11. The exterior of the building shall be cleared of litter at regular intervals.
- 12. A Dispersal and Smoking Policy will be implemented and adhered to (see attached).
- 13. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.

D) The Protection of Children From Harm

- 1. The licensee shall adopt the Challenge 25 and the BII National Standards Proof of Age Scheme.
- 2. The licensee shall ensure that staff are trained about age restricted products and ensure that they sign to confirm that they have understood the training. The licensee shall keep records of training and instruction given to staff.
- 3. The licensee should regularly monitor staff to check how they are dealing with young people who ask for alcohol and other age restricted products.
- 4. The licensee shall put arrangements in place to ensure that before serving alcohol to young persons, staff ask to see accredited proof of age cards e.g. Citizencard, a Passport, or UK Driving Licence bearing the photograph and date of birth of the bearer.
- 5. The licensee and staff should note any refusals to sell to young people in a refusals log. The refusals log shall be checked and signed monthly by the designated premises supervisor. The refusals log shall be made available for inspection by the licensing team, police or trading standards.

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
 - a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3. All door supervisors shall be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.
- 4. The admission of children to the exhibition of a film shall be restricted in accordance with the recommendation of a film classification body as defined in the Video Recordings Act 1984 or Islington Council acting as the licensing authority where it has given notice in section 20(3) of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 5. The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any "irresponsible promotions" in relation to the premises.
 - In this condition, an "irresponsible promotion" means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children:
 - a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to:
 - i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);
 - c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
 - d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on:
 - i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
 - ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
 - e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
- 6. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 7. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

8. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

- 9. The responsible person shall ensure that:
 - a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:
 - i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
 - b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

- 1. Unless otherwise specified on this licence no regulated entertainment shall take place at the premises with the exception of pre-booked private events limited to the provision of music and dancing for pre-invited guests.
- 2. This licence is subject to such further conditions as are consistent with any restrictions imposed on the use of the premises for the existing licensable activities under the licence by virtue of the enactments hereinafter set out:

With reference to the above application, we are writing to inform you that the Metropolitan Police, as a Responsible Authority, will be objecting to this application as it is our belief that if granted the application would undermine the Licensing Objectives.

The venue is situated in the 'Upper Street/Angel Cumulative Impact Zone', an area which traditionally suffers from high levels of crime and disorder and there are concerns that this application will cause further policing problems in an already demanding area.

Islington has almost double the national average of licensed premises per resident, and this is why the Police supported the implementation of the Council's Cumulative Impact Policy. This large number of licensed premises and the issues associated with these impacts greatly on the Police and all other emergency services resource.

There are 80 licensed premises within a 250 metre radius of this venue. Over 20 of those venues fit into the pub/bar/off licence category. These venues have a huge impact on the late night economy of the borough and by their sheer nature of being 'drinking establishments' have a huge impact on the levels of anti social behaviour and crime. So much so that the Metropolitan Police are currently focussing efforts on Operation Equinox, which was introduced to reduce Violence with Injury offences. There is a significant link between these offences and the aforementioned drinking establishments.

We have taken into account that the venue is not seeking to alter hours, and to cease alcohol sales at latest midnight, which is welcomed. However, this application is seeking to remove a condition which effectively ties the venue to being a restaurant. It is a rare occurrence for police to be called to an alcohol fed disturbance at a restaurant. In removing this condition, police are concerned that the venue will become essentially a drinking establishment, essentially become a 'new bar' and will have a negative impact on the night time economy.

There was nothing in the application stating that the venue wished to change to a bar, and no mention whatsoever of any additional conditions, usually seen with pubs and bars. Police emailed the applicant asking whether such conditions had been considered. Despite opening lines of communication the applicant has not spoken to the police. We were informed by the local authority that the applicant had forwarded extensive conditions regarding a smoking policy, dispersal policy and an operating schedule encompassing the licensing objectives. Why this was not included in the original application is not known.

Whilst the police are grateful for their late submission there are still grave concerns that the changes to the venue will add to the cumulative impact as previously mentioned. Why do they not wish to discuss these matters with the police? Furthermore the lack of inclusion of these policies in the initial application raises questions of their honesty and professionalism.

It is for these reasons that we are objecting to the application, and propose that it is refused.

I am submitting a representation on behalf of the Licensing Authority with respect to the variation application to remove licence conditions 5 and 6 which require the premises to operate as a restaurant.

The grounds for the representation are:

- Public nuisance
- Crime and disorder

Licensing Policy Considerations

Licensing Policies 1 & 2 Licensing Policies 9 & 10 Licensing Policy 11 Location, cumulative impact and saturation Standards of management – The Operating Mixed use premises

Issues of Concern

- 1. The premises are located in the Angel and Upper Street Cumulative Impact therefore the onus is on the applicant to demonstrate that this proposal will not undermine the licensing objective.
- 2. In the operating schedule attached to the application the applicant indicated that proposal would not add to the cumulative impact because the hours of operation and the capacity of the premises would not change and the remaining conditions would be adequate. These remaining conditions were concerned with the provision of juke boxes and the provision of drinking water. As a result of strong recommendations from the police and licensing team the applicant subsequently provided a more detailed operating schedule.
- 3. The proposal, if approved, will result in the style of the premises changing from a family friendly restaurant to a vertical drink establishment operated by a company that specialises in producing and selling high strength craft beer.
- 4. Whilst it is appreciated that there is a demand for high strength craft beers the operational objectives of Brewdog are incompatible with the objectives of a cumulative impact area.
- 5. The council and police have put significant resources into managing the night time economy in this area to minimise the negative impacts on local residents and partner agencies. Converting these premises to a drinking establishment will undermine any positive impacts as there will be the potential for up to another 120 people consuming high strength alcohol to add to the cumulative burden in terms of alcohol related crime, disorder, nuisance and antisocial behaviour
- 6. Observations in other Brewdog premises in London revealed:
 - a. Loud raucous customers encouraging each other to neck full glasses of beer
 - Poorly managed dispersal of customers over an 30 minute period allowing customers to continue lively conversations outside the premises
 - c. Drunk customer crossing the road causing a lorry to brake sharply to avoid a collision
 - d. Evidence of poor housekeeping: uncollected glasses, dirty WC facilities and graffiti
 - e. Food, although offered in some premises, did not appear to be consumed in any of the premises visited
- The premises are located in an alcohol crime and disorder hotspot and the style of operation will add to the cumulative burden already experienced in this part of the borough.

Recommendation

I am of the opinion that the proposal to remove conditions 5 and 6 from the premises licence will enable the premises style of operation to change from a restaurant to that of a busy bar selling high strength beer.

This proposal will undermine the licensing objectives and I recommend that the application is refused.

- In the event of noise nuisance from amplified sound being witnessed by an authorised officer, the licensee shall appoint a noise consultant registered with the Institute of Acoustics or Association of Noise Consultants to prepare a scheme of sound insulation and noise control measures, which shall include the installation of a noise limiting device, to prevent persons in the neighbourhood from being unreasonably disturbed by noise of amplified sound from the premises. The scheme shall be submitted for approval by the Council, and the approved scheme fully implemented to the satisfaction of the Council and the licensee notified in writing accordingly, prior to the premises being used for regulated entertainment.

I object to this application.

The premises are within the Angel and Upper Street Cumulative Impact Area and they form part of the ground floor of a building in a complex which is mainly residential flats which are either side. above, and at the rear.

Looking at this section of Essex Road within 100metres there are already 8 premises which can sell alcohol without food and this would be the 9th. They are, The Diner, Prague, Barrio North, The Kings Head, The Old Queens Head, Thumbs Up Off licence, Wenlock and Essex and The Winchester. This does not bring into the equation the bars overlooking Islington Green and along Upper Street.

I appreciate that Giraffe which formerly traded in the premises had a licence but that was granted before the cumulative impact policy came into force. Further ,Giraffe's licence was a restaurant licence and it was a wholly different type of establishment to that proposed by Brew Dog. Giraffe was a child friendly, family friendly restaurant. Brew Dog is a drinking venue aimed, mainly I would suggest, at young, strong beer drinkers.

Brew Dog started as a Scottish brewery and has now also become a retail operation. They specialise in strong beer, their own headline beer has strengths which span fro 3.8% ABV to 5.6% ABV and the majority are at the top end. They also brew amplified ale which ranges from 7.2% AB to 16.5% ABV. This is what will be sold if the application is granted, together with other craft beers from around the world.

The drinkers will no doubt wish to smoke which they will have to do under the windows of the residential flats. They may wish to purchase the products to take away to continue drinking later on the streets, or in the parks or on residents' door steps.

There is already more than enough drunkenness and antisocial behaviour in this part of Islington and however well run Brew Dog may be, they will add to it. Essex Road is the wrong location for this type of operation.

Given that the premises are in the Angel and in the Upper Street Cumulative Impact Area, I object to this application.

In this part of Essex Road there are already eight premises selling alcohol without food; namely the Diner, Prague, Barrio North, the Kings Head, the Old Queens Head, the Thumbs Up Off licence, the Wenlock and Essex and the Winchester, plus those overlooking Islington Green and of course those immediately along Upper Street.

I believe, like the Council, that it is important to uphold the Cumulative Impact Area at the Angel, both to reduce alcohol-associated ASB and as importantly, again as the Council itself wishes, to minimise the negative health impacts of alcohol on residents & visitors, and of course the associated on-costs to police and health services.

Brew Dog is a very different proposition to it's predecessor - Giraffe - which was a child and family-friendly restaurant with a restaurant licence.

Brew Dog is a venue that wishes to sell strong beers [3.8 - 16.5% ABV] to young, strong-beer drinkers, through the on- and off-licence trade. Associated behaviour such as smoking and indeed other street-based ASB [shouting, aggressive behaviour, vomiting/urinating in public, etc] will inevitably result, as seen with many other similar institutions in the immediate or nearby localities.

There is already significant ASB and drunkenness in this area and however well controlled, Brew Dog will, de facto, add to it.

The application should be refused.

I am writing to say that, as a local resident, I object to the granting of the license variation proposed by Brewdog. I consider that the license should be retained in its present form, because to grant the application would leave Brewdog as a straightforward bar without any requirement to serve alcohol as only ancillary to meals.

Brewdog was previously refused an alcohol license in Farringdon/Clerkenwell in February 20/13 with one of the main grounds being that it was the wrong place for such an establishment.

I believe that the same consideration applies to the former Giraffe site, so close to Islington Green and the Tesco supermarket.

The proposed variation is also undesirable because the immediate area is already saturated with licensed premises, namely the Winchester and Wenlock & Essex on the corners opposite, and the cocktail bar at 69 Colbrooke Row. I am advised that the residents in the section of Colbrooke Row parallel to Essex Road already suffer from noise disturbance at night from the patrons of these premises, and the variation of the license for Brewdog would increase the volume and impact of disturbance for these residents from the licensed premises. This would conflict with one of the four licensing objectives.

Like many local residents at the Angel, I oppose this Application in the Angel and Upper Street Cumulative Impact Zone by Brewdog on the basis of the following licensing objectives: namely prevention of public nuisance, crime and disorder and public safety. It should be noted that the Applicant was REFUSED a licence in Clerkenwell by Islington Council in 2013 following a similar application.

- 1. The Brewdog Application in Essex Road is in a designated area of cumulative impact and saturation at the Angel and Upper Street. Islington Council's special policy in relation to cumulative impact " creates a rebuttable presumption that applications for variation of premises licences and club premises certificates that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused". It is for the applicant to demonstrate why the operation of the premises will NOT add to the cumulative impact in the zone.
- 2. ANGEL SATURATION ZONE: The Application is for the removal of Conditions 5 and 6 of the pre existing licence to Giraffe (a family run restaurant) which conditions state that the premises must be bona

fide used for the purpose of habitually providing the customary main meal of the day or the evening or both for the accommodation of persons frequenting the premises and that alcohol shall not be sold or supplied on the premises OTHERWISE than to persons taking table meals there and for consumption by such a person as an ANCILLARY to his meal. Brewdog has built its reputation on sales of craft beers of considerable strength (3%-41%). If these Conditions are removed from the pre-existing Licence then Brewdog will be able to sell strong alcohol on and off the premises from 10am to midnight in the Angel Saturation Zone as well as its substantial online sales. There are already 8 premises selling alcohol within a very short distance of the premises including the Wenlock and Essex, the Winchester, the Diner, Prague, Barrio North, the Old Queens Head, Camden Head, the Thumbs Up off-licence and Tesco Supermarket. This part of Essex Road has considerable residential accommodation directly above and on either side of the premises which are likely to be affected. As Islington Council will have appreciated, although this Application is presented as a minor variation of the existing licence, it in fact incorporates major changes to the licence conditions.

3 PROXIMITY TO RED ROUTE: the premises are situate on a narrow pavement on the busy red route through Essex Road. If the Application is granted there is risk to the public because smokers would spill out from the premises onto the pavement causing passersby to step into the busy carriageway of the red route, which already happens outside the Winchester late at night. Rubbish left outside the premises for collection would further aggravate the problem.

^{4.} LICENSING POLICY: Conversion of a family restaurant serving children as well as adults into a bar serving strong alcohol 14 hours a day is contrary to Islington Council's saturation policy which I and local residents support: providing cold snacks with strong alcohol(up to 41%!) is radically different from the terms of the current licence. Islington Council has recently been successful in working with local premises to

sell and serve lower strength beers and local residents are fully supportive of the Council for taking this initiative. Granting Brewdog's Application would clearly undermine the Council's stated low alcohol policy. Like the Council, I consider it important that the Licensing Policy is adhered to to reduce alcohol related ASB and also to reduce the health impact of alcohol on local residents and visitors: Islington's own research indicates that local residents suffer very high levels of alcohol related ill health and its licensing policies should take this into consideration. There is already significant aggressive anti social behaviour in the area as anyone who walks this way late at night will be aware of: even if Brewdog agree to take steps to try and control this, consumption of alcohol at Brewdog will de facto contribute to the cumulative impact in the area. Indeed it is well established that alcohol-related anti social behaviour and crime is mostly committed away from the licensed premises where the alcohol has been consumed. We residents at the Angel are subjected to frequent antisocial behaviour abuse and public nuisance from drinkers in the Saturation Zone with loud late night drinking. Drink related incidents occur frequently, are particularly acute in warm weather and many are dealt with by local residents alone. Whilst the Applicant may attempt to provide assurances, the reality is that the grant of a variation to this existing licence to Brewdog will contribute to further aggressive anti social behaviour and public safety issues in the Angel Saturation Zone. Increased alcohol consumption in the Angel Saturation Zone has contributed significantly to increased anti social behaviour and overall loss of amenity for local residents.

^{5.} The Applicant has failed to demonstrate in its Application that the operation of Brewdog will NOT add to the cumulative impact in the Angel Saturation Zone. I therefore strongly request that the Licensing Committee refuse this Application for the reasons cited above, as it refused Brewdog's Application in the Clerkenwell cumulative impact zone in 2013.

I am writing in connection with the application from Brewdog for a variation in conditions 5 and 6 of the licence for the above premises which I oppose in strong terms.

The premises occupy part of the ground floor of a large development of flats and are close to many more flats on the opposite side of Essex Rd and many houses in Essex Rd and adjacent streets. My estimate is that there are several hundred people living within 150 metres of the premises. The area is saturated with restaurants and bars. There are seven drinking establishments in the stretch of Essex Rd between St Peters St and Packington St and many more on Islington Green and Upper St. This produces severe problems because large and noisy crowds gather outside several of these establishments on three nights of the week until the early hours to the distress and annoyance of the local residents. In addition to the noise there is sometimes disorder and frequently unseemly conduct from many of the clients. However under the current licencing conditions the restaurant Giraffe (the previous occupants) caused comparatively few problems as far as I am aware.

Conditions 5 and 6 of the current licence read as follows:

- 5. The premises must be bona fide used for the purpose of habitually providing the customary main meal at midday or in the evening, or both for the accommodation of persons frequenting the premises.
- 6. Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied on the premises otherwise than to persons taking table meals there and for consumption by such a person as an ancillary to his meal.

A variation in condition 5 would permit the proprietors to stop providing meals and provide only bar snacks. A variation in condition 6 would permit the proprietors to sell alcohol to anyone walking in from the street without them taking a meal. In other words the function of the premises would change from restaurant to pub or bar with all the problems that that entails some of which are referred to above.

Previously Brewdog applied for a licence for a Danish-style bar serving high-strength beers in Farringdon Rd. This application was refused by the council and they are obviously trying to revive the plan for different premises.

I attach, in an appendix, a summary of the council's ruling on the Faringdon Rd application and argue that the same decision be reached in this case. Essex Rd is a more densely inhabited area, is more saturated with bars and restaurants and there is far more potential for nuisance, disorder, unseemly conduct and loss of amenity than in the Faringdon Rd area. The reasons for refusing the Essex Rd application are stronger than the reasons for refusing the Faringdon Rd one.

APPENDIX.

Islington Council has published the reasons for its Licensing Committee's decision to refuse a Licence to Brewdog for a Danish-style bar serving high-strength beers, in Farringdon Rd.

The Committee has given three reasons for the decision.

First, the premises are in a "saturation" area, so the onus is on the applicant to show that it would not add to the existing problems of the area. But it had failed to do this.

"It is clear that the primary emphasis of the new business is to serve alcohol, not food and accordingly the new activities would differ significantly from those authorised by the existing licence held by the premises."

The second reason was its location.

"It is located on a particularly busy road, opening directly onto the street. It would accordingly be extremely difficult for the managers and staff of the business to monitor and manage the people leaving their premises and/or smoking on the pavement. This could result in an unnecessary obstruction to an already busy area and pose a health hazard to members of the public in that area. The Sub-Committee was not satisfied or convinced of the applicant's proposals in relation to the monitoring of smoking and the members of the public being adequately catered for on the street outside the premises after they had purchased alcohol."

Thirdly, the hours being sought were inappropriate for bar premises serving only snacks.

"The pre-existing licence was for a restaurant where patrons were seated at tables, being served food prepared in a kitchen whereas the licence being sought in this application is primarily for the sale of alcohol for consumption both on and off the premises and the provision of food is very much a secondary consideration."

"The Sub-Committee weighing up all the evidence referred to above, concluded that the applicant did not rebut the presumption that the operation of the premises would not add to the cumulative impact and impact adversely on the licensing objectives. The application was accordingly refused."

I believe that this exchange should be taken into account in assessing Brewdog's intention to behave in a responsible manner. Remember that the premises are in Essex Rd in a very densely populated area.

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Dead Pony Club ale breaches alcohol marketing Code

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The packaging of Dead Pony Club, a pale ale produced by BrewDog, has broken alcohol marketing rules for encouraging both anti-social behaviour and rapid drinking

The Independent Complaints Panel (ICP) considered the product following an independent audit of drinks last year, administered by Campden BRI on behalf of the Portman Group

Dead Pony Club's packaging was identified as being in potential breach of the Code for its association with bravado and immoderate consumption, and for placing undue emphasis on the strength and intoxicating effect of the alcohol in the product. The producer did not make representations to the Panel.

The Panel considered the overall impression conveyed by the product, the strength of the beer (Alc 3.8% Vol), as well as the text on the back label.

Whilst acknowledging that the beer was of a lower-than-average strength and that one bottle was well within the recommended daily unit guidelines, the ICP concluded the line on the label, 'rip it up down empty streets', associated the product with anti-social behaviour.

The ICP also concluded that the product did not promote immoderate consumption However, it did rule that the phrases 'drink fast, live fast' and 'we believe faster is better' could encourage the consumer to drink the product rapidly. Consequently, the product was found by the Panel to be in breach of Code paragraphs 3.2 (b) and (g)

Henry Ashworth, Chief Executive of the Portman Group, which provides the Secretariat for the Independent Complaints Panel, said:

"The Code rules do not exist to prevent humorous or innovative brand marketing but to make sure that humour is used responsibly. We urge producers to exercise due diligence and consult our Code Advisory Team if they are in any doubt."

A Retailer Alert Bulletin has been issued instructing licensees and retailers not to place orders for stocks of Dead Pony Club in its current packaging after 8 July 2014.



I wish to object to the application to vary the conditions 5 and 6 in the existing Licence at 29-31 Essex Road, London N1 2SA.

- Brewdog normally sells beers with varying alcohol strength, the standard beer 3.8 to 5.6 %, and amplified beers 7.2 to 16.5 %. These are really strong beers and if drunk without food is likely to get to the blood stream very quickly and persons become intoxicated very easily. The existing condition should stand in that alcohol should only be sold or supplied with a meal.
- 2. The premises is within the cumulative impact zone at the Angel and the Licensee has to show that this additional use of supplying alcohol without food would not impact on the area. This is a mixed area with already about 8 licensed premises supplying alcohol without food in the immediate vicinity and there are numerous residents in the surrounding area who will be affected by having more intoxicated persons onto the streets.
- 3. The existing Licence already allows the sale of alcohol to midnight and this will significantly impact on the area with excessive noise well past midnight and more anti social behavior.

If Islington Council were to grant this application, it would be sending out the wrong signal that it does not care about the health of its residents or the strength of alcohol being sold in the area. The Angel area is already well known as a drinking area and this could only add to the cumulative effect.

I trust that this application would be refused.

We also understand that Brewdog previously applied for a licence for a Danish-style bar serving high-strength beers in Farringdon Rd. This application was refused by the council and they are obviously trying to revive the plan for different premises.

We have seen a summary of the council's ruling on the Faringdon Rd application and it seems that the reasons for refusing the Essex Rd application are even stronger than the

reasons for refusing the Faringdon Rd one. Essex Rd is a more densely inhabited area, is more saturated with bars and there is far more potential for nuisance, disorder, unseemly conduct and loss of amenity than in the Faringdon Rd area.

Suggested conditions of approval consistent with the operating schedule

- 1. All instances of crime and disorder shall be reported to the police.
- 2. An incident book shall be used to record all instances of public disorder.
- 3. The holder of the premises licence or its nominee shall subscribe to and participate fully in the local pub/club/shop watch scheme.
- 4. The licensee shall, in accordance with a risk assessment to be carried out by the DPS, provide a sufficient number of door supervisors to prevent the admission of, and ensure the departure from the premises of drunk and disorderly people or other people displaying signs of other substance abuse, without causing further disorder.
- 5. CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. The system will enable frontal identification of every person entering the premises. The system shall record in real time and operate whilst the premises are open for licensable activities. The recordings shall be kept available for a minimum of 31 days. Recordings shall be made available to an Authorised Officer or a Police Officer (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998) within 24 hours of any request.
- 6. Alcoholic and other drinks purchased from the premises may not be taken away from the immediate curtilage of the premises in open containers such as glasses or opened bottles (save for consumption in any delineated external area as shown on the plan attached to the licence).
- 7. Clear and prominent notices shall be displayed on the premises warning customers of the need to guard their property and to be aware of the operation of pickpockets, bag snatchers, etc. The notices shall advise customers to report concerns to the designated premises supervisor or the person in charge of the licensed premises.
- 8. Staff will be trained in the laws relating to under age sales, and that training shall be documented and repeated at 6 monthly intervals.
- 9. A refusals book will be maintained at the premises, and made available to an officer of a responsible authority upon request.
- 10. Safety checks shall be carried out before the admission of the public. Details of safety checks shall be kept in a Log-book on the premises. The Log-book shall be made available for inspection by authorised officers.
- 11. All exit routes shall be kept unobstructed, with non-slippery and even surfaces, free of trip hazards and clearly identified.
- 12. Where chairs and tables are provided, internal gangways shall be kept unobstructed.
- 13. All exits doors shall be maintained easily operable without the use of a key, card, code or similar means.
- 14. Exit doors shall be regularly checked to ensure that they function satisfactorily and a record of the check shall be kept.
- 15. Any removable security fastenings must be removed whenever the premises are open to the public or occupied by staff.
- 16. The edges of the treads of steps and stairways must be maintained so as to be in good condition and be conspicuous.
- 17. When disabled people are present, there must be sufficient numbers of staff and adequate arrangements must be in place to enable their safe evacuation in the event of an emergency. Disabled people on the premises must be made aware of such arrangements by staff and by the use of appropriate signage.

- 18. In the absence of adequate daylight, the lighting in any area accessible to the public shall be fully in operation when they are present.
- 19. Emergency lighting batteries are fully charged before the admission of the public.
- 20. Access for emergency vehicles must be kept clear and free from obstruction.
- 21. Adequate and appropriate supply of first aid equipment and materials must be available on the premises at all times.
- 22. There must be at least one suitably trained first-aider on duty when the public are present, and if more than one suitably trained first-aider is available, their respective duties must be clearly defined.
- 23. A first aid box will be available at the premises at all times.
- 24. The premises shall maintain an Incident Log and public liability insurance.
- 25. Noise or vibration must not emanate from the premises so as to cause a nuisance to nearby properties.
- 26. No more than 120 customers shall be permitted inside the premises at any one time.
- 27. Seating will be available for not less than 60 customers.
- 28. No more than 32 customers shall be permitted to stand in the premises whilst consuming alcohol.
- 29. No more than 28 seated customers shall be permitted in the external seating area.
- 30. Use of the external seating area shall cease at 23:00 save in respect of smokers, which will be limited to 10 customers at any one time.
- 31. Food will be available until 60 minutes before licensable activities cease.
- 32. Prominent, clear and legible notices must be displayed at all exits requesting the public to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly.
- 33. A dedicated licensed taxi/mini cab service shall be available with the premises for customers.
- 34. The emptying of bins into skips, and refuse collections will not take place between 23:00 and 07:00.
- 35. The exterior of the building shall be cleared of litter at regular intervals.
- 36. A Dispersal and Smoking Policy will be implemented and adhered to (see attached).
- 37. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 38. The licensee shall adopt the Challenge 25 and the BII National Standards Proof of Age Scheme.
- 39. The licensee shall ensure that staff are trained about age restricted products and ensure that they sign to confirm that they have understood the training. The licensee shall keep records of training and instruction given to staff.
- 40. The licensee should regularly monitor staff to check how they are dealing with young people who ask for alcohol and other age restricted products.
- 41. The licensee shall put arrangements in place to ensure that before serving alcohol to young persons, staff ask to see accredited proof of age cards e.g. Citizencard, a Passport, or UK Driving Licence bearing the photograph and date of birth of the bearer.
- 42. The licensee and staff should note any refusals to sell to young people in a refusals log. The refusals log shall be checked and signed monthly by the designated premises supervisor. The refusals log shall be made available for inspection by the licensing team, police or trading standards.
- 43. Any outside area used by customers wishing to smoke shall be covered by the CCTV system which will be installed at the premises.

- 44. The outside area shall be monitored by staff or door staff (when employed) at all times it is in use.
- 45. The area will be cleaned regularly.
- 46. Suitable receptacles shall be provided for smokers to dispose of cigarette butts.
- 47. Signs will be displayed in the area requesting customers keep noise to a minimum.
- 48. Patrons who disregard signage and verbal instructions regarding noise will be asked to move inside and/or leave the premises.
- 49. Open containers of alcohol shall not be permitted to be taken beyond the boundary of the outside area.
- 50. At the end of the evening management and staff will assist with the orderly and gradual dispersal of patrons.
- 51. Staff Members (including door personnel when employed) will advise patrons to leave the premises quickly and quietly out of respect for our neighbours.
- 52. Notices will be displayed requesting our customers to leave quietly and in an orderly manner out of consideration to neighbours and their attention will be drawn to these notices by members of staff.
- 53. We will ensure the removal of all bottles and drinking receptacles from any patron before exiting the premises (this does not apply in the case of consumption in any delineated external drinking area).
- 54. We will actively discourage our customers from assembling outside the premises at the end of the evening.

Conditions proposed by the Noise Service

- In the event of noise nuisance from amplified sound being witnessed by an authorised officer, the licensee shall appoint a noise consultant registered with the Institute of Acoustics or Association of Noise Consultants to prepare a scheme of sound insulation and noise control measures, which shall include the installation of a noise limiting device, to prevent persons in the neighbourhood from being unreasonably disturbed by noise of amplified sound from the premises. The scheme shall be submitted for approval by the Council, and the approved scheme fully implemented to the satisfaction of the Council and the licensee notified in writing accordingly, prior to the premises being used for regulated entertainment.
- 56. The entertainment noise control system shall be monitored, checked and calibrated as necessary, so that the approved levels by the Council are not exceeded.
- 57. The controls for the entertainment noise control system shall be located in a secure, lockable cupboard or similar location. The entertainment noise control system is to be independent of control by persons other than the licensee. Access to the entertainment noise control system is to be restricted to the Licensee or a designated manager.
- 58. Doors and windows to the premises will be kept closed, so far as practicable, at all times when noise generating regulated entertainment is taking place i.e. live and recorded music.
- 59. A registered door supervisor shall be employed outside on Friday and Saturday nights at the rate of one per 100 customers' capacity at the premises in order to supervise customers outside and assist with the dispersal of customers at closing time.
- 60. The door supervisor shall remain on duty outside until all customers have left the area.
- 61. Bottling out from the premises is prohibited between 23:00 hours and 07:00 hours.
- 62. The premises shall close 30 minutes after the last sale of alcohol.
- 63. The contact telephone number for the premises licence holder/designated premises supervisor/duty manager shall be displayed inside the premises or immediately outside the premises such that it is clearly visible from outside without the need to enter the premises.

- 64. There shall be no deliveries or collections between the hours of 23:00 07:00.
- 65. Any off sales shall be made in sealed containers.
- 66. No drinks shall be permitted in any outside area after 22:30.
- 67. No more than 4 tables and 16 chairs shall be permitted on the public highway in line with the permit issues by Islington Council.





With reference to the above application, I am writing to inform you that the Metropolitan Police, as a Responsible Authority, will be objecting to this application as it is our belief that if granted the application would undermine the Licensing Objectives, being the Prevention of Crime and Disorder.

This venue is located in the Bunhill Cumulative Impact Zone, an area identified in the Islington Council Licensing Police 2013 – 2017 as one of high crime. Between 1st April 2013 and 31st March 2014 there were 2541 recorded crimes, including high levels of Assaults and Antisocial Behaviour.

History/ Venue:

This is a location which is currently an unlicensed premises, therefore is no licensing history for police to consider. However, the area around Old Street station suffers from a considerable amount of Anti-Social behaviour and attracts street drinkers who beg for money.

The venue is also underground and not obvious to passing emergency services. This in itself may cause issues as police will not be able to monitor the venue without actually going under the roundabout to it. Finally, in 2008 the Mayor of London banned all drinking on the Underground. The application requests an off-licence which may encourage customers to drink on the London Underground which is now a crime.

This is the second application made by the current applicant. As an agreement could not be reached, the previous application was sent to Licensing sub-Committee on Tuesday 25th November 2014 where the applicant failed to attend the meeting. The Committee refused this application.

Since the refusal, there has been limited engagement with the applicant, as it is felt that this new application is not significantly different from the original application.

Application:

The current application is only slightly improved: there has been some consideration as to the operation of the business, the main aspect being the service of alcohol between 0800 hours and 1000 hours as ancillary to a table meal. This is not acceptable as this indicates that during the rest of the opening hours, the venue will be a bar.

I have spoken with the applicant's agent at some length to explain that I feel this application is for a bar with some food service, not a restaurant with some alcohol. This is evidenced by the applicant's refusal to add conditions which indicate that all alcohol sales will be made as part of a substantial table meal.

The agent argues that the menu will be hotdogs and burgers with side orders and possibly oysters and that these are substantial table meals. I disagree and contend that this is still a bar application, albeit that the customers may be seated. If these foodstuffs are 'substantial' I would also have expected the applicant to make provision for customer toilets on the premises. Instead they are relying on Old Street Station public toilets.

It is noted that the applicant offers a time-limited condition which is appreciated as it allows for a review after 12 months of operation. However, in the meantime, there is a considerable amount of opportunity to fail to promote the licensing objectives.

There is still little evidence of consideration of the Licensing Policy 2013 – 2017. The applicant offers few Conditions to promote the licensing objectives and has not provided police with a business plan of any substance to allow an informed positive decision to be made.

Communication:

There has been increased communication with the applicants agent since the last application, however discussions has stalled over the real use of the venue. Police feel that the application is still a bar with some food. Police will consider any further information if it can be supplied. This information would be in the form of a more comprehensive business plan.

Hours Applied for:

Although the licensable hours are within those recommended by the Licensing Police 2013 – 2017, there is not a clear business case for requesting alcohol sales at 0800 hours, especially considering the number of street drinkers in the proximity

Conditions:

The applicant has offered more Conditions as noted above. Police still feel that the Conditions do not reflect the true nature of the business. The 'general description' is still restaurant/oyster bar, however I cannot see how the conditions offered meet the needs of a restaurant.

Summary:

The applicant has provided Police with a resume of the manager/ DPS. The whole resume relates to bars and licensed premises, not restaurants.

Finally, the main issue under discussion is whether this application is for a bar or a restaurant and therefore whether the applicant is being completely honest as to their intentions. There are two questions:

- 1) What is a Restaurant?
- 2) What is a Meal?

The Oxford English Dictionary states:

Restaurant – 'a place where people pay to sit and eat meals that are cooked and served on the premises' Meal – 'any of the regular occasions in the day when a reasonably large amount of food is eaten'

The brief menus supplied indicate that the 'meals' available are hotdogs, burgers (and side dishes) and oysters. These dishes do not meet the definition above. If they do, however meet this definition, I would have expected provision to be made for toilets in the premises, however customers are expected to use the Old Street Station toilets and there is no guarantee that they will be in operation as the applicant has no control over this. It would mean customers relieving themselves in Old Street Station which would indicate a Public Nuisance. I believe this evidence strongly indicates the venue will primarily be a bar, which not suitable in this location for the reasons explained above.

It is for the above reasons that we are objecting to the application and propose that it is refused.

REASONS FOR DECISION

The applicant and the legal representative were not in attendance at the meeting. An email had been sent to the licensing team in the afternoon requesting an adjournment. The applicant was advised to attend the meeting to make the request for an adjournment to the Sub-Committee.

The applicant did not provide any grounds for an adjournment and the Sub-Committee decided not to adjourn as it was not necessary to do so in the public interest.

The Sub-Committee received updated information from the licensing officer, the police and the environmental health team and read all the material. The Sub-Committee reached the decision having given consideration to the Licensing Act 2003, as amended, and its regulations, the national guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.

The Sub-Committee noted that the applicant had indicated earlier in the day that off sales would be removed from the application. Discussions with trading standards had led to them withdrawing their objection. The police referred to discussions during the day and that there was confusion as to whether the venue was to be a restaurant or bar. The environmental health officer raised concerns about major anti-social behaviour at Old Street and the problem with public urination which had not been addressed by the applicant in the operating schedule. The officer stated that the plans show 60 covers in the restaurant but no provision of a toilet within the premises.

The Sub-Committee noted that the applicant had failed to produce a detailed operating schedule in accordance with licensing policy 9 and there was insufficient information before the Sub-Committee.

The Sub-Committee took into consideration Licensing policy 2. The premises fall under the Bunhill and Clerkenwell cumulative impact area. Licensing policy 2 creates a rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises licences that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, unless an applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact or otherwise impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives. The applicant failed to rebut the presumption. The Sub-Committee refused the application as the applicant failed to demonstrate that the licensing objectives would be upheld.

4. Planning Implications

4.1 Planning have reported that, "The application concerns the sale of alcohol at a ground floor fish and chip shop, which would fall under use class A5. There are no historical planning applications for the site, but historical photos suggest that, on the balance of probabilities, this is the lawful use of the land. There are no ongoing enforcement investigations relating to the land. As such, the planning department has no objections to the application."

5 Recommendations

- To consider that this address is in the Saturation or "Cumulative Impact Policy" of Islington. We currently have 4 existing restaurants, trading under the name Kerbisher & Malt. They all have a strong reputation – you can read more about them on our website, www.kerbisher.co.uk

Our application is to allow us to serve alcohol (beer and wine, not spirits) to customers who dine in the restaurant. They will be required to be seated and eating a main meal. We do not have a bar area and we will not serve anyone who is not seated and eating a meal, nor we will we be licensed to sell alcohol to take away customers. We also operate a challenge 21 scheme.

We are not a drinking establishment (A4 property use) and, as a former resident of the area (Amwell St), I would concur with the representations that point out that there are enough of these type of properties in the area already.

Dear Islington Licensing

As the Chairman of our local residents association - The Wilmington Square Society, I have been made aware that a recent application for a new license has been submitted for 59-61 Rosebery Avenue.

As a committee we strongly urge you to reject such a licence on the grounds of there being far too many other such establishments in the area and there not being neither a demand or need for another.

The property in question is located in what we believe to be a very precarious location where one currently already struggles to pass a group of oncoming pedestrians or parents with children without the need to step onto the road to make way. Having an establishment that will attract drinkers and ultimately smokers who will congregate outside the premises will only increase the risk of a serious incident with pedestrians having to use the road to pass such an establishment. It is also very close to a busy pedestrian crossing.

As residents who are only a street away from the proposed site we have already had to deal with a high number of anti-social incidents in the area in which most occasions alcohol has been a factor. We urge you to speak with the local safer neighbourhoods team and Islington Parks Patrol who will be sure to inform you of the issues we have had to deal with over the last few years in regards to anti-social behaviour taking place in Wilmington Square after dark. Such an establishment will only be providing further individuals who will see it as a place to continue the party, something as residents we find would be ill-advised for Islington Council to allow.

We understand there was a decision by Islington Council to not issue further licences in the borough, is that no longer the case?

We really do hope you take the views of local residents into account and decide to reject the proposed license application.

We urge the licensing authority to refuse.


The last thing the area needs is another licensed premises, more people encouraged to drink, more rowdy behaviour or more people wanting to 'spend a penny'.

- 1. The licence holder shall ensure that all staff are fully trained on the Licensing Act 2003.
- 2. CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. Maintained means that the system will be regularly serviced (at least once a year) and checked every two weeks to ensure that it is storing images correctly and a log kept and signed by a Supervisor to this effect. The system will provide an identifiable full frontal head and shoulder image of everyone entering the premises and will operate in any light conditions within the premises. The system will cover the full exterior of the premises and shall record in real time, date and time stamped and will operate whilst the premises is open for licensable activities. The recordings will be kept for a minimum of 31 days and copies will be made available to an Authorised Officer or a Police Officer (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998) within 24hrs of any request free of charge. There will always be a member of staff on duty who can operate the system, to allow Officers to view recordings and if required by a Police Officer, provide a copy of images immediately free of charge to assist in the immediate investigation of offences.
- 3. All instances of crime and disorder shall be reported to the police.
- 4. An incident book shall be used to record all instances of public disorder.
- 5. The provision of alcohol at the premises shall be ancillary to the sale of hot food.
- 6. No vertical drinking shall be allowed at the premises.
- 7. The holder of the premises licence shall subscribe to and participate fully in the local pub/club/shop watch scheme.
- 8. All exit routes shall be kept unobstructed, with non-slippery and even surfaces, free of trip hazards and clearly identified.
- 9. The lighting in any area accessible to the public shall be fully in operation when they are present.
- 10. Refuse such as bottles must be placed into receptacles outside the premises at times that will minimise the disturbance to nearby properties.
- 11. The contact telephone number for the premises licence holder/designated premises supervisor/duty manager shall be displayed inside the premises or immediately outside the premises such that it is clearly visible from outside without the need to enter the premises.



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
