54 <u>INTRODUCTIONS AND PROCEDURE (Item A1)</u>

Councillor Flora Williamson welcomed everyone to the meeting and officers and members introduced themselves. The procedure for the conduct of the meeting was outlined and those present were informed that the procedure was detailed in the papers.

55 APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE (Item A2)

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors Gill and Erdogan.

59 MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING (Item A6) RESOLVED

That the minutes of the meeting held on the 23 April 2015 be confirmed as an accurate record of proceedings and the Chair be authorised to sign them.

THE FLYING SCOTSMAN, 2-4 CALEDONIAN ROAD, N1 9DT - SEXUAL ESTABLISHMENT LICENCE APPLICATION (Item B1)

The applicant reported that they had submitted a planning application to redevelop the business and create a gastro venue. In the meantime, it was necessary to keep trading in order to meet the cost of redevelopment. The premises were Grade 2 listed and obtaining planning consent was taking longer than anticipated. Facilities had been improved over the past six years and money had been invested in the premises.

In response to questions it was noted that it would be more profitable if planning permission was received, however it may be necessary to use the current structure if there was a long delay. The applicant reported that incidents have been reduced over the years. The area had previously been a drug area. They had an SIA trained supervisor on site and they worked closely with the police and the licensing team. £24,000 had been spent on CCTV. Football crowds were the greatest problem. A formal risk assessment was carried out annually and one was also carried out weekly to review the bookings that week. There was also a quarterly audit. This was a very small premises and it was considered that only one door staff member was sufficient. Upgrades had been made to the facilities for performers

which now included changing rooms and toilets. Performers had a point of liaison. There were alternative exits and CCTV was managed by the reception area 24 hourly. Performers had an induction process. An agency supplied the dancers. Cash was used and not credit card. They were looking to have two trained SIA registered staff. They did not want door staff to have a big visual presence as they considered this could be inflammatory. It was expected that by next year there would be a change in their operation. Staff were trained to manage clientele. Football fans were not allowed to chant or to block the pavement. Crowds were not a problem except on match days and this was not an issue related to sexual entertainment. The Sub-Committee noted that there were no SIA staff inside the premises but there were signs up regarding the performers and if there were any problems the door staff would be called. Staff were experienced and were trained to deal with issues. There were not usually any problems. The most difficult problem to control were customers using mobile phones to take photos of performers. Situations were managed before they became a problem. The premises were usually quiet except on Fridays and Saturdays and there were less problems here than at other public houses in the area. Football crowds would always be an issue.

RESOLVED

- a) That the application for the renewal of a sex establishment licence in respect of The Flying Scotsman, 2-4 Caledonian Road, N1 be granted.
- b) That the conditions of the previous licence shall be applied to the licence with the following addition.
 - That the SEV risk assessment be sent to the licensing team for inspection.

REASONS FOR DECISION

The Sub-Committee considered the written and oral submissions put forward by the applicant. The Sub-Committee heard evidence that the applicant's long term strategy was to remove sexual entertainment from the venue but that there were currently issues with planning and that the applicant needed the revenue to continue until the planning issues were resolved. The Sub-Committee also heard evidence that a risk assessment was reviewed annually and that there was a quarterly audit by Head Office. There was also a weekly risk assessment particularly in relation to local football matches. The Sub-Committee heard evidence that an extra member of staff was being trained to SIA standards.

The Sub-Committee noted that this was a renewal application and was satisfied that the applicant had demonstrated high standards of management, a management structure capable of operating the venue and the ability to adhere to the standard conditions for sex establishments.

The Sub-Committee noted that the licensing authority had not received any complaints about the venue and the police had not made any representations.

The Sub-Committee noted the representations from local residents in relation to patrons congregating outside the premises but considered that this would be addressed by the additional SIA qualified member of staff.

The Sub-Committee considered that it was appropriate to attach the authority's standard conditions for sexual entertainment venues to the grant of the licence with the previously agreed condition and with the additional condition detailed above. The Sub-Committee had concerns regarding the welfare of the performers and was satisfied that the additional condition would address these concerns.

61 <u>FYEO, 23 CITY ROAD, EC1Y 1AG - SEXUAL ESTABLISHMENT LICENCE APPLICATION (Item B2)</u>

The licensing officer reported that a special treatment licence for this premises had been granted on Monday 15 June.

The applicant reported that this was a luxurious purpose built premises. There were no dimly lit booths. Tesco and Travelodge had put in testimonials stating that they had no problems with the premises. Noise disturbance was not an issue with this site. Customers used the City Road entrance. Taxis were brought to the door for customers and performers. Customers waited inside the premises to ensure no noise disturbance. If dancers brought cars they would be escorted to their vehicles by a member of staff. This was not a residential area. This was a licence renewal. The premises had a high standard of management. There had been no complaints and no responsible authority objections. There were suitable facilities for customers and dancers.

In response to questions it was noted that the deputy and general manager liaised with the dancers if there were any issues. All dancers were taken through an induction process and a meeting was held with the dancers on a monthly basis. There were four door staff to approximately 60-80 customers; one outside, two inside and one checking the booths. Bookings were reviewed weekly to ensure the correct number of door supervisors were employed. Facilities for dancers had been maintained, there was an induction held on a regular basis and dancers had stylists. The venue was for over 18s but Challenge 21 was operated. A general risk assessment was carried out every six months. A minimum of two door supervisors were employed. The applicants had applied for a new licence for a similar venue in Twickenham. Twickenham had a nil policy and the licence had not been granted. It was noted that there was a trained masseuse on the premises, registered with the Authority. She wore a uniform and it was quite clear that she acted as a masseuse and was not a dancer.

RESOLVED

- a) That the application for the renewal of a sex establishment licence in respect of For Your Eyes Only, 23 City Road, EC1Y 1AG be granted.
- b) That the conditions of the previous licence shall be applied to the licence.

REASONS FOR DECISION

The Sub-Committee considered the written and oral submissions put forward by the applicant. The Sub-Committee heard evidence that the premises were a purpose built venue. The Sub-Committee noted that the licensing authority had not received any complaints about the venue and the police had not made any representations. Performers were escorted to car or a taxi and customers also remain in the venue whilst awaiting taxis to minimise disturbance. The Sub-Committee noted the letters from Tesco and the nearby Travelodge in support. The Sub-Committee noted that at busy periods four SIA staff were employed, one of whom specifically patrols the private booths. The Sub-Committee heard evidence that, as well as weekly risk assessments, a general risk assessment was undertaken every six months. The Sub-Committee noted that the masseuse employed at the premises was qualified and registered with the Authority and completely separate from the performers.

The Sub-Committee was satisfied, that in accordance with the Authority's policy, the applicant demonstrated high standards of management, a management structure capable of operating the venue and the ability to adhere to the standard conditions for sex establishments.

The Sub-Committee noted that the objection was made in relation to the renewal application for a special treatment licence which came before the Licensing Regulatory Committee on the 15 June 2015 and was granted.

The Sub-Committee considered that it was appropriate to attach the authority's standard conditions for sexual entertainment venues and the previously agreed additional condition, to the grant of the licence.

62 <u>INTRODUCTIONS AND PROCEDURE (Item A1)</u>

Councillor Flora Williamson welcomed everyone to the meeting and officers and members introduced themselves. The procedure for the conduct of the meeting was outlined and those present were informed that the procedure was detailed in the papers.

63 APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE (Item A2)

Apologies for absence were received from Councillor Erdogan.

64 <u>DECLARATIONS OF SUBSTITUTE MEMBERS (Item A3)</u>

Councillor Diner substituted for Councillor Erdogan. Councillor Picknell substituted for Councillor Williamson for Item B1 – Pistachio and Pickle.

66 ORDER OF BUSINESS (Item A5)

The order of business was as the agenda.

67 <u>PISTACHIO AND PICKLE DAIRY, 6 CAMDEN PASSAGE, N1 8ED - APPLICATION FOR A NEW PREMISES LICENCE (Item B1)</u>

The licensing officer reported that the premises were to be open until 10pm and there had been 9 resident objections.

Three local residents spoke in objection to the application. It was stated that this was in a cumulative impact zone that already had eight licensed premises between the Camden Head and the York public house. Concern was expressed that future occupiers could use the licence but not as a cheese shop. Concerns were raised regarding an on and off licence and considered that the food allowed with alcohol should be defined as a substantial or main meal. It was stated that there would be 16 persons on the first floor in a very small area and there would be noise escape from the windows on this floor. Concern was also expressed about the overlooking from customers into the houses opposite. It was considered that the pavement outside was too narrow to eat and drink outside and was a significant reduction, in terms of space, for pedestrians and for local residents. It was further stated that there should be no off sales and no eating outside. It was reported that similar licensed premises in the vicinity removed their outside tables and chairs at 6pm. The number of licensed premises had to be limited and this application should be refused.

Councillor Klute considered that it was inevitable that people from the premises would spill out onto the pavement. He stated that he had sought legal advice and the application could be refused on grounds of the number of premises in the area, the proximity of residents and

the special feature of the narrow passageway. He considered that there could not be eight customers outside the premises, at the tables and chairs, without obstruction. It was inevitable that alcohol caused people to make more noise. This was a very good cheese shop but including the sale of alcohol created an intensification of use. If the licence was granted the use of the tables and chairs until 6pm in line with other premises seemed reasonable.

In response to questions it was noted that footfall and noise had increased in Camden Passage over the years and it was difficult to use front rooms with the noise. Residents reported that Coffeeworks and Applestat did not sell alcohol. This was the narrowest part of Camden Passage and was the reason why Applestat was refused.

The applicants reported that the cheese shop was a welcome addition to the area. Alcohol was ancillary to food and customers would not be able to drink alcohol unless they were eating. They did not want to compromise the existing passageway and would be happy to take in tables and chairs at 6pm. There had been no representations from the licensing authority, the police or other responsible authorities. They stated that they may be able to put film over the first floor window to prevent overlooking. They would be willing to consider restricting the number of tables and chairs outside. The premises could not end up as a wine bar as cheese would need to be sold with alcohol. Wines and fortified wine would be sold at the premises with some bottled craft beers. They would not sell spirits or beers on tap. They could reduce outside the tables and chairs outside to two with four people. Sales of alcohol only would be refused. Music was background only. The number of people that could be accommodated on the first floor was 16. This could be restricted if necessary. The applicants were concerned that planning permission may not be granted for an air conditioning unit as the premises was situated in a conservation area. They had followed the correct consultation process but had not held a meeting with residents to discuss the application.

In summary, the interested parties considered that this was too small a premises for this use. This was the wrong location for this type of premises, the street was too small and it would impact on residents at both the front and the rear of the premises. Appestat had been refused and it was considered that this should remain as a cheese shop without alcohol.

The applicant stated that this premises had a unique offering. It was unlike Appestat and wine would be paired with cheese. The applicant stated that there was no intention of turning the shop into a wine bar.

RESOLVED that

- a) the application for a new premises licence in respect of Pistachio and Pickle Dairy, 6 Camden Passage, N1 8ED be granted:-
- i) To permit the premises to sell alcohol, on and off the premises, from 10 am to 10.30 pm on Monday to Saturday and 10 am to 10 pm on Sunday.
- ii) Opening hours to be from 10 am to 10.30 pm on Monday to Saturday and 10 am to 10 pm on Sunday.
- b) Conditions as outlined in appendix 3 as detailed on page 34 of the agenda with the following additions shall be applied to the licence.
 - Tables and chairs outside shall be cleared away at 6pm.
 - Tables shall be restricted to two outside the premises with two people seated at each table.
 - Customers on the first floor shall be limited to 12 people, excluding staff.

REASONS FOR DECISION

The Sub-Committee listened to all the evidence and submissions and read all the material. The Sub-Committee reached the decision having given consideration to the Licensing Act 2003, as amended, and its regulations, the national guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.

The Sub-Committee took into consideration Licensing Policy 2. The premises fall under the Angel and Upper Street cumulative impact area. Licensing policy 2 creates a rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises licences that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, unless an applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact or otherwise impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives.

The Sub-Committee heard from the residents that there were already eight licensed premises between the Camden Head and the York public houses and granting this application would add to the cumulative impact. The premises were situated along a particularly narrow passageway and having tables and chairs outside the shop would restrict the access for pedestrians. There were concerns expressed that the application was for full on and off sales and residents asked that if granted there be no off sales and tables and chairs be removed at 6pm in keeping with neighbouring licences. There were also concerns regarding noise escape from the first floor windows and the number of customers to be accommodated in a limited space.

The applicant confirmed that the intention of the business was to provide an alcohol drink with a cheese plate and would not be a wine bar and the sale of alcohol would be ancillary to the sale of cheese platters. The applicants conceded to the removal of tables and chairs at 6pm and a limit of 2 tables with 4 people seated to reduce the noise impact on residents and footfall for pedestrians. There would be a limited number of covers. Music would only be background.

The Sub-Committee noted that there were no representations from responsible authorities.

The Sub-Committee noted that the premises were in close proximity to residential premises. The applicant had made concessions to the application by agreeing to limit the number of tables and chairs outside and would liaise with residents to address concerns raised regarding noise and privacy issues.

The Sub-Committee considered that the premises were within the exceptions to the cumulative impact policy detailed in licensing policy 2. This was a small premises with a capacity of 50 or less, the operating hours were within the hours specified in licensing policy 8 and the premises were not alcohol led. The Sub-Committee was satisfied that the agreed conditions would prevent future use as a wine bar only. The Sub-Committee therefore considered that the operation of the premises would not add to the cumulative impact or otherwise impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives.

Note of the Sub-Committee

The Sub-Committee expects the applicant to work with residents to reduce overlooking and noise from the first floor windows at the front and rear of the premises.

68 OLDROYD, 344 UPPER STREET, N1 0PD - APPLICATION FOR A NEW PREMISES LICENCE (Item B2)

The licensing officer reported that additional papers had been circulated by the applicant. These would be interleaved with the agenda papers.

A local resident spoke against the application. She had concerns regarding the off sales proposal. It was proposed that space had been made available for ten people to consume alcohol without a meal and she requested that alcohol was served with a main or substantial meal throughout the premises. She raised concerns regarding outside seating as this was a very busy part of Upper Street for pedestrians and cyclists. She stated that there should be no tables outside, no off sales and a full on licence that was qualified to include meals and the whole of the ground floor.

The applicant's representative reported that the application was within the framework hours in licensing policy 8. Conditions had been agreed with the police and noise officer following consultation. The police had been in agreement with condition 2, which allowed for 10 persons on the ground floor to have alcohol with no food. A letter had been sent to residents but no response had been received. Off sales were tightly restricted and external seating would be controlled with an application to the highways department. He considered that the application, with conditions in place, would not add to the cumulative impact and the responsible authorities had agreed with this. The premises had a capacity of less than 50 people, was food led and the hours sought were within the framework policy hours in licensing policy 8. It was hoped that the restaurant would be a popular addition to the area.

In response to questions it was noted that the promotion of the licensing objectives in the application form were reflected in the schedule of conditions. There were 40 covers and 10 people in the bar area. The first floor was laid out as a restaurant. Off sales were required for wine sold with a take away meal and for service to the tables and chairs area. It was considered that the application fell within the exceptions to the policy however, if there was a need for compromise, condition 2 could be amended.

RESOLVED that

- a) the application for a new premises licence in respect of Oldroyd, 344 Upper Street, N1 be granted:-
- iii) To permit the premises to sell alcohol, on and off sales from Sunday to Thursday from 10 am until 11pm and on Fridays and Saturdays from 10 am until midnight.
- iv) To allow the provision of late night refreshment on Fridays and Saturdays from 11pm to midnight.
- v) Proposed opening hours to be: Sundays to Thursdays from 10am until 11.30 pm and Fridays and Saturdays form 10 am until half past midnight.
- b) conditions as outlined in appendix 3 as detailed on page 68 of the agenda with the following amendment shall be applied to the licence.

Condition 2 to read. The supply of alcohol at the premises shall only be to persons taking a table meal or have booked a table meal and are drinking prior to their meal on the ground floor. The ground floor customers shall be limited to 10 persons waiting to eat and consumption of alcohol by customers shall be ancillary to their meal.

REASONS FOR DECISION

The Sub-Committee listened to all the evidence and submissions and read all the material. The Sub-Committee reached the decision having given consideration to the Licensing Act 2003, as amended, and its regulations, the national guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.

The Sub-Committee took into consideration Licensing Policy 2. The premises fall under the Angel and Upper Street cumulative impact area. Licensing policy 2 creates a rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises licences that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, unless an applicant can demonstrate why the

operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact or otherwise impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives.

The interested parties reported that they objected to the application on the grounds of cumulative impact. They had particular concerns regarding the application seeking off sales of alcohol and the number of customers on the ground floor that would be allowed to consume alcohol without a meal. They requested that alcohol be served with a main or substantial meal throughout the premises. They also considered that a tables and chairs licence should not be granted as this would obstruct the pavement.

The applicant stated that this premises was a restaurant with capacity of less than 50 persons and within the licensing policy framework hours. Off sales would be tightly restricted to the table and chairs area and only sealed wine with a take away meal. He applicant had consulted with the police and the noise team and agreed the conditions proposed in the agenda. The applicant had responded to the interested parties and invited them to meet to address their concerns but they had not responded. The concerns raised about the external seating area was controlled by separate legislation and was a matter for the highways department.

The Sub-Committee noted that there were no objections from the responsible authorities.

The Sub-Committee considered that the premises were within the exceptions to the cumulative impact policy detailed in licensing policy 2. This was a small premises with a capacity of 50 or less, the operating hours were within the hours specified in licensing policy 8 and the premises were not alcohol led. The Sub-Committee was satisfied that, with the conditions proposed and with the amendment to the proposed condition 2, the operation of the premises would not add to the cumulative impact or otherwise impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives.

69 BONE DADDIES, 10 BALDWIN STREET, EC1V 9NU - APPLICATION FOR A NEW PREMISES LICENCE (Item B3)

The licensing officer reported that there had been one response to the notice of hearing and the resident still required that the meeting be held. Hours had been reduced to framework hours.

The applicant's representative reported that this was to be a Japanese Ramen restaurant. As recorded music had been applied for from 11pm until midnight on Fridays and Saturdays, noise conditions had been agreed with the noise officer and would be added to the licence if granted. Noise conditions were tabled and would be interleaved with the agenda papers. This was a restaurant but music would be above background levels. Windows did not open and the restaurant was air conditioned. There was to be no external drinking. Hours had been amended to start at 11am on Sunday although midday could be agreed. It was a food led premises and fell within the exception to the cumulative impact policy. The licensing authority agreed that the application was policy compliant.

In response to questions, it was stated that music was slightly above the background level at the other three Bone Daddy restaurants and the noise officer was happy with the additional conditions as the restaurant was situated in a modern building with double glazing. The applicant would like the flexibility for the bar area. The capacity was for 65 persons in the restaurant and another 10 to 15 in the bar area. The police had agreed 15 people in the bar area. A plan indicating the revised hatched area could be resubmitted.

RESOLVED that:

a) The application for a new premises licence in respect of Bone Daddies, 10 Baldwin Street, EC1V 9NU be granted:-

- vi) To permit the premises to sell alcohol on and off the premises from 11 am to 11pm on Sundays to Thursdays and 11 am to midnight on Fridays and Saturdays.
- vii) To allow the provision of late night refreshment from 11pm to midnight on Fridays and Saturdays.
- viii) To allow the provision of recorded music from 11pm to midnight on Fridays and Saturdays.
 - The proposed opening hours are 11am to 11pm on Sundays to Thursdays and 11am to midnight on Fridays and Saturdays.
- b) Conditions as outlined in appendix 3 as detailed on page 106 of the agenda with the following amendment and addition shall be applied to the licence.
- Condition 2 to read. The supply of alcohol at the premises shall only be to persons taking a table meal or have booked a table meal and are drinking prior to their meal on the bar area. The bar area customers shall be limited to 15 persons waiting to eat and consumption of alcohol by customers shall be ancillary to their meal.

Additional noise conditions.

- On receipt of a substantiated noise complaint an assessment of sound insulation will be undertaken and appropriate improvement works and noise control measures carried out, so as to ensure that music and people noise generated within the licensed premises meets with the Council's noise criteria within noise sensitive premises to the satisfaction of the Council's Noise Team, in writing, before any regulated entertainment takes place.
- During the hours that regulated entertainment takes place, windows shall be closed and doors closed so far as reasonably practicable.

70 LOVES COMPANY, UNIT 1, 104-122 CITY ROAD, EC1V 2NR -REVIEW OF PREMISES LICENCE (Item B4)

The licensing officer reported that a licence variation had been issued adding the conditions detailed on page 146 of the report.

The licensing authority had submitted the review following concerns regarding the standards of management. She summarised events that had led to the review and stated that there had been a couple of unsatisfactory visits in both February and March. A police closure notice was issued in April following breaches of the licence conditions. She reported that she had been informed today that the noise limiter had been calibrated, copies of the training plan had been made available, staff were to go on a personal licence course at the end of the month and changes had been made to the CCTV, although this had not been checked. Progress was being made but it was suggested that a suspension of the licence up to one month would be appropriate in order to allow outstanding measures to be put in place. However, this would depend on the evidence given by the licensee at the meeting.

In response to questions, the licensing authority stated that the management structure had been a key issue. The designated premises supervisor and other staff had reasonable experience. A management structure was now in place and the licensing authority considered that communication may have been the main issue.

The police supported the review. CCTV had not been working in April but they had now been assured that a new system had been fitted and upgraded. The police would need to see that this was in full working order and of sufficient quality. The police stated that they would like to see the training plan up and running and considered a suspension was appropriate to see this work carried out. It was noted that combustible material stored beneath the escape stairway was still an ongoing problem.

The applicant's representative reported that improvements had been made but accepted that these had been at a slow pace. It was recognised that one month would assist the designated premises supervisor to put these measures in place. Copies of safety and fire certificates were now available and demonstrated compliance. It was accepted that the rubbish under the fire escape was still an issue but this was to be boxed in. A training template had been devised and two employees were to take the personal licence course in July. A one month suspension was proportionate and would tie in with ensuring these measures were in place. CCTV had been upgraded and the police would be invited to check this, together with the search and drugs policies. The noise limiter was now secured and boxed. The premises had been sub-let to an independent DJ which had caused problems.

In response to questions it was noted that if issues had been dealt with more speedily the premises would not have been reviewed. The licensee accepted that it was a mistake not to have engaged with responsible authorities. Contractors had been carrying out ongoing work and certificates had now been provided. There was a daily checklist. Staff received ongoing training on licensing issues.

In summation the licensing authority stated that conditions 1 and 10, Annex 2 of the licence were duplicated and could be deleted.

RESOLVED that:-

- a) The premises licence in respect of Loves Company, Unit 1, 104-122 City Road, EC1 be suspended for a period of one month.
- b) Conditions 1 and 10, Annex 2, of the current premises licence shall be deleted from the licence.

REASONS FOR DECISION

The Sub-Committee listened to all the evidence and submissions and read all the material. The Sub-Committee reached the decision having given consideration to the Licensing Act 2003, as amended, and its regulations, the national guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.

The Sub-Committee noted that licensing officers had made two visits to the premises in February 2015 to check compliance with licence conditions and the visits were found to be unsatisfactory with a number of conditions not being complied with resulting in the issue of a section 19 closure notice. Two further visits in March 2015 and one in April 2015 also proved unsatisfactory resulting in the issue of a closure notice detailing the breaches. The breaches included CCTV not working, failure to provide copies of fire and safety certificates and staff training records. The Sub-Committee noted that noise conditions had been breached resulting in an abatement notice being served on the licensee.

The Sub-Committee noted that the licensee initially failed to engage with licensing officers but subsequently did submit a variation application and conditions regarding CCTV and noise were attached to the licence in agreement with the responsible authorities. Visits made by officers to the licensed premises in June 2015 confirmed that improvements had taken place. The designated premises supervisor had produced copies of a training plan, fire and safety certificates and confirmed that CCTV was in good working order although it had not yet been checked by the police. As a result, the licensing authority revised the recommendation and suggested that a suspension of the licence for up to one month would be appropriate to allow for outstanding issues to be resolved and for inspections to take place.

The Sub-Committee heard from the designated premises supervisor's representative that progress was now being made and it was recognised that a one month suspension would allow the measures required to be put in place. A training template and certificates had been provided and two members of staff would be taking the personal licence course at the end of July, CCTV had been upgraded and the noise limiter was now secured and boxed.

The Sub-Committee also noted that as a result of the recent variation of the premises licence, when additional conditions were attached, the duplicate conditions relating to CCTV and noise could be deleted.

Taking the above into consideration, the Sub-Committee decided that a suspension of the licence for a period of one month would enable the licensee to put all the outstanding measures in place and allow for inspections to be carried out by the responsible authorities. In reaching their decision, the Sub-Committee took into particular consideration licensing policy 30 regarding review of premises licences and considered the decision was appropriate and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives.



- 3.2 The premises is located within the Junction Area of Archway Cumulative Impact Policy area, adopted by the Council on 24 January 2013.
- 3.3 The application originally applied for numbers 32-34 Junction Road, however, the applicant confirmed that the actual address of the premises is 28-30 Junction Road. The premises were therefore required to extend the last date for making representations and readvertise the application on the premises and in a newspaper.
- 3.4 The Licensing Authority has received thirty three letters of representation, including letters from the Licensing Authority, the Police, Islington's Noise Service and the body responsible for Public Health.
- 3.5 The Licensing Authority also received a petition containing 529 signatures. However, the Licensing Authority is not able to accept this petition as a valid petition to opposing the application, as the petition does not comply with the rules governing petitions. The first page does not make clear what people are being asked to sign and subsequent pages do not contain the petition prayer.

4. Planning Implications

4.1 Planning have reported that the lawful planning use of this property appears to be retail (Use Class A1). The plan submitted with the application indicates that the use will remain as a retail shop.

There are no outstanding planning enforcement investigations in relation to this site.

5. Recommendations

5.1 To determine the application for a new premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.

- 5.2 If the Committee grants the application it should be subject to:
 - i. conditions prepared by the Licensing Officer which are consistent with the Operating Schedule (See appendix 3);
 - ii. conditions recommended by Responsible Authorities deemed appropriate by the Committee (see appendix 3); and
 - iii. any additional conditions deemed appropriate by the Committee to promote the four licensing objectives.

6. Conclusion and reasons for recommendations

6.1 The Council is required to consider this application in the light of all relevant information, and if approval is given, it may attach such conditions it considers appropriate to promote the licensing objectives.

The applicant is aware that the premises fall within the Archway cumulative impact area of the London Borough of Islington.

The applicant believes that, due to the steps that it will take to promote the licensing objectives, the grant of this licence will not add to the cumulative impact referred to in the London Borough of Islington licensing policy.

The applicant proposes the steps outlined in the following four licensing objectives set out below.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

- 1. The licence holder will ensure that the premises benefit from a CCTV system that operates at all times when licensable activities are taking place.
- The system will incorporate a camera covering each of the entrance doors and the main alcohol display area and will be capable of providing an image which is regarded as identification standard. The precise positions of the cameras may be agreed, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, with the police from time to time.
- 3. The system will incorporate a recording facility and any recording will be retained and stored in a suitable and secure manner for a minimum of 30 days and will be made available, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, to the police for inspection on request.
- 4. The system must be able to export recorded images to a removable means e.g. CD/DVD and have its own software enabled to allow playback/review.
- 5. A member of staff trained in the use of the CCTV system must be available at the premises at all times that the premises are open to the public.
- 6. The system will display, on any recording, the correct time and date of the recording.
- 7. All cashiers shall be instructed to record in an incident book/register:
 - All incidents of crime and disorder occurring at the premises
 - Details of occasions when the police are called to the premises

This book/register will be available for inspection by a police officer on request.

- Outside of permitted hours for the sale of alcohol, all alcohol within the trading area (this
 does not apply to the display behind the cashier counter) is to be secured behind locked
 shutters/screens/grills or secured behind locked cabinet doors.
- There shall be no self service of spirits except for spirit mixtures.

- There shall be no sale of single cans of beer, lager or cider from the premises and no sales of single bottles of beer, lager or cider in vessels of less than 500ml or more than 1500 ml.
- 11. There will be no sales/supplies of beers, ales, lagers or ciders or anything similar of 6.5% ABV or above excluding the sale of specialist branded alcoholic beverages.
- 12. The licence holder shall employ security guards at the premises if it, having regard to any advice from the police, considers it appropriate to do so.

c) Public safety

The premises licence holder will at all times maintain adequate levels of staff and security. Such staff and security levels will be disclosed, on request, to the licensing authority and police.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

Signage will be displayed at the exit of the premises requesting customers leaving the premises late at night to do so quietly and with consideration so as not to disturb nearby residents.

e) The protection of children from harm

- The premises licence holder will ensure that an age verification policy will apply to the premises whereby all cashiers will be trained to ask any customer attempting to purchase alcohol, who appears to be under the age of 25 years (or older if the licence holder so elects) to produce, before being sold alcohol, identification being a passport or photocard driving licence bearing a holographic mark or other form of identification that complies with any mandatory condition that may apply to this licence.
- 2. All staff engaged or to be engaged in the sale of alcohol on the premises shall receive the following training in age restricted sales:
 - Induction training which must be completed and documented prior to the sale of alcohol by the staff member.
 - Refresher/reinforcement training at intervals of no more than 6 months.

Training records will be available for inspection by a police officer on request.




I wish to object on the following grounds:

Archway is one of the crime hotspots in the area. Indeed, at the end of July the Police imposed a Dispersal Zone in the area.

I believe, therefore, that granting this application for a licence the sale of alcohol will be against the objectives of the Licensing Policy: prevention of crime and disorder, the prevention of public nuisance, public safety and the protection of children from harm.

Whilst it may not be a normal consideration of such applications, I would also like to point out that the Archway area is seeing a considerable amount of change at present, with building work taking place to the buildings in the Mall, which is very near to 32-34 Junction Road. And from next March work will be taking place to change the layout of the gyratory at Archway. All this adds up to a feeling of concern for safety in the area.

Our current Licensing Policy also points out that the Archway area has one of the highest concentrations of off licences of any ward in the Borough, with an average of one off-licence per 317 residents. The Policy therefore has designated it an area of cumulative impact and saturation. As such there should not be another licence granted. It is widely recognised that as the density of licensed premises increases, so does the number of alcohol related ambulance call outs and incidents of alcohol related crime and disorder.

I have just heard that Sainsbury's applied for an alcohol licence for either 32 - 34 Junction Road or 28 - 30 Junction Road in Archway, N19.

I live in

t, a road just off the Junction Road and minutes away from those addresses.

I am very concerned about this application and am totally against it. I heard from 'Better Archway' that our ward has the most alcohol licences of any ward in Islington. I have lived here since 1999, and Archway has always been a hotspot for alcohol and gambling outlets, but many of us residents have noticed that these days there are more drunks and beggars/begging drunks out on our streets than ever. I have in the past felt quite safe in the area, but that feeling has changed. And I am often disgusted by being asked for money all the time from people who surely will buy alcohol or drugs straight away or who behave otherwise in an antisocial manner. I have witnessed people hassling pedestrians for money, people hanging out around cash points in the hope for money (very intimidating!), men urinating in public areas in full view, someone vomiting in full view of everyone in our shopping area just outside the Coop pharmacy, his beer tin next to him. I have witnessed violent arguments etc. The area has become much less safe and pleasant for all of us, the adults and the many school children who pass through Archway centre every day.

It is very clear to me that Archway does not need any more alcohol licences, that any more shops or outlets that sell alcohol would harm the drinkers, any vulnerable person and the public. This is a poor, deprived area with lots of unwell people, and in my opinion the council must not give out any more alcohol or gambling licences, not even one! Not even to Sainsbury's!

I also generally don't see a need for another Sainsbury's local supermarket. We have one nearby in Holloway Road. It's more expensive than other shops, and one can't find that many products. Plus, how would they organize their deliveries? Park their delivery lorries on the bus lane? Or cram in lorries between other buildings such as Iceland? Their lorries often block the road, because they cannot get into their parking space easily as it is too tight.

We could do with a proper independent greengrocer, for example. Or a community space.

I am also appalled by the number of estate agents who have taken over most empty shops.

I think it is the council's duty to consider the community when you give out alcohol/gambling/night venues and also when you allow businesses to take over shops.

I am submitting a representation against the application for a licence to permit the sale of alcohol from the above premises. This representation is on behalf of Camden and Islington Council's Public Health Department, which as a health body is a responsible authority.

The grounds for the representation are:

- Public safety
- Crime and disorder

The relevant policies in Islington's Licensing Policy

- Policy 2: Cumulative impact and saturation
- Policy 4: Shops selling alcohol

The impact of alcohol is particularly great in Islington with some of the greatest levels of alcoholrelated problems in London, including:

- The highest rate of alcohol-specific deaths in men in London
- One of the highest rates of alcohol-related hospital admissions in London
- Significantly higher levels of alcohol-related violent crime and claimants of incapacity benefit where the main medical reason for being a claimant is alcoholism
- Junction ward already has a high density of premises. Within the Lower Super Output Area (LSOA)¹ within this premise is located:
- There were 101 alcohol-related call outs in 2014/15 higher than the Islington average for ¹LSOA
- 77 alcohol specific hospital admissions in 2014/2015 higher than the Islington average for ¹LSOA
- The ¹LSOA where this store is based is ranked the 4th highest for alcohol-related ambulance callouts by ¹LSOA (1= highest and 118 = lowest) in Islington
- There are already 11 on-licenses in the ¹LSOA, equivalent to one premise for every 146 residents aged 18 and over. This is higher than the Islington average of one licenced premises per 128 residents.
- There are already 15 premises in the ¹LSOA licensed for off-sales of alcohol only, one for every 107 residents aged 18 and over (the Islington average is one per 374 residents aged 18 and over).

Harm from alcohol in the vicinity of the application

Junction Ward is an area which the evidence available demonstrates a particularly high level of alcohol harm relative to the rest of the borough. As a result the area is designated as a **cumulative impact area** in the Islington Statement of Licensing Policy 2013 to 2017. As stated in this policy: any further increase in the ease of access to alcohol in terms of the number of premises and the **hours of operation** needs to be carefully managed. The onus is also on the applicant to demonstrate how they will avoid adding to this cumulative impact.

I am concerned that if this application is granted it will increase the availability of alcohol for consumption off premises. This could lead to an increase in public nuisance, crime and disorder and impact adversely on the health of both those buying and consuming the alcohol but also the health of others who come in contact with them.

The area already has sufficient premises to meet demand and additional outlets supplying alcohol will be detrimental to the local residents in terms of noise and disturbance, anti-social behaviour and crime.

Alcohol and health

Alcohol misuse imposes a major preventable burden to health and the effect of this in Islington is felt across all health services. There is a growing body of evidence that an increased number of alcohol outlets results in significant increases in both alcohol consumption and alcohol-related harm, including injury, violence and medical harm. Evidence from a number of countries indicates reducing alcohol outlet density can have an impact on reducing violence and problem drinking. There is also strong and reasonably consistent evidence that changes in hours or days of trading can have a significant impact on volume of alcohol consumed and rates of alcohol related problems.

Islington experiences some of the highest levels of alcohol-related harm in London and the cumulative availability of alcohol is one area that is likely to be impacting on this.

Rates of alcohol related ambulance call outs per resident in the Junction area are higher than in the borough as a whole, particularly between the hours of 11pm and 5am. This suggests that the immediate impact of alcohol misuse may be experienced by visitors to the area, which is likely to correspond with the impact of alcohol misuse on crime and anti-social behaviour in the area.

There is already good availability of alcohol in the Junction area with a higher than average density as measured by the number of off licences per the number of residents aged 18 and over.

There is evidence that increased availability of alcohol, both in terms of the time period in which alcohol is available (hours of sale) and number of premises from which alcohol is available, results in an increase in alcohol-related harm. One effect of this is increased pressure and costs to the NHS. The impacts are also felt across a range of groups including the council, policing and the community as a whole.



Working in partnership

In summary the area has sufficient premises to meet demand and additional outlets supplying alcohol will only be detrimental to the local residents in terms of noise and disturbance, anti-social behaviour and crime and will significantly add to the **cumulative impact** of alcohol on residents.

We do not feel that the applicant has demonstrated how they will not add to this level of impact in line with the Cumulative Impact Policy.

Recommendations

Camden and Islington Public Health Department recommends that:

- The application for a licence to supply the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises between the hours of: 06:00 to 00:00 from Monday to Sunday is refused as it would significantly add to the cumulative impact of alcohol on the licensing objectives in this area.
- If the license is granted, Camden and Islington Public Health would support recommendations by the police regarding opening hours.

I am writing with regard to the licensing application which appeared originally for the adjacent property and has now been amended to 28-30 Junction Road.

Better Archway is aware that there is significant opposition to this application in particular, and strong opposition to additional licensing in the Archway area. It is because of the number of such premises and resultant anti-social behaviour that the area has been designated a saturation zone, permitting the rejection of new applications.

Although not a licensing issue, this application would impact on the wider plans for redevelopment as the current delivery point for these premises is to the rear of the building. Bringing large chain store trucks in here would severely restrict what could be achieved on the adjacent redevelopment area. For this reason we believe that no decisions should be made which would significantly impact the wider area until a masterplan has been agreed for the adjacent site being developed by Bode.

The applicant already operates a store at the other end of Hargrave Road and might copy the delivery method used there, of parking trucks in the bus lane at night. Even if this were legal, it would add further disturbance to an area already suffering from the noise of Iceland, Costa and Greggs, all of which deliver at the times that most people sleep, and use metal trolleys which make a great deal of noise. Deliveries to independent stores cause much less disturbance.

Accordingly we believe that the majority view is that this application should be refused.

Sainsbury's will also be the same, parking either in the bus lane in front of our building (under our bedroom windows) often causing buses to have to wait and idle, or at the back (again under bedroom windows). This will be additional not replacement noise. When smaller businesses occasionally cause a disturbance and we have spoken to them to bring it to their attention they have apologised and not done it again as they are part of the local community and they see us as customers all the time. It is the opposite with these big chains, they don't care, we are just sources of profit and faceless consumers.

So I'd like to register my objection to the granting of a licence to Sainsbury's (at either 32-34 or 28-30 Junction Road). If it was replacing the Co-op, Nisa or other supermarket for example, or their own other store around the corner, I might not be as adamant but as an additional one with a new licence I don't think it's necessary.

In the case of Archway, the key issue is that of public nuisance (deliveries and drunken behaviour) and crime and disorder, particularly late at night/early morning.

With reference to the above application, we are writing to inform you that the Metropolitan Police, as a Responsible Authority, will be objecting to this application as it is our belief that if granted the application would undermine the Licensing Objectives.

The venue is situated in the 'Archway Cumulative Impact Zone', an area which traditionally suffers from high levels of crime and disorder and there are concerns that this application will cause further policing problems in an already demanding area.

Islington has almost double the national average of licensed premises per resident, and this is why the Police supported the implementation of the Council's Cumulative Impact Policy. This large number of licensed premises and the issues associated with these impacts greatly on the Police and all other emergency services resource.

There are already over 30 Licensed Premises within a 200m radius of these premises, 9 of which are off-licenses.

The requested hours for supply of alcohol in this application are from 6am to midnight, seven days a week.

These hours immediately raised concerns for us, especially as we are aware of the association of ill health and alcohol within this specific area.

On the 8th of August 2015 I wrote an email to the applicant's representative pointing out the guideline framework for closing times of off-licences, as stipulated in The Islington Licensing Policy 2013-2017. I mentioned the cumulative impact area, the ongoing regeneration of the area, and recommended they move the start time for alcohol sales to 9am. I also stated that we would like them to adopt our comprehensive CCTV condition as shown below.

I have had no reply or even acknowledgement to my email.

It is for these reasons that we are objecting to the application, and propose that it is refused.

CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. Maintained means that the system will be regularly serviced (at least once a year) and checked every two weeks to ensure that it is storing images correctly and a log kept and signed by a Supervisor to this effect. The system will provide an

identifiable full head and shoulder image of everyone entering the premises and will operate in any light conditions within the premises. The system shall record in real time, date and time stamped and will operate whilst the premises is open for licensable activities. The recordings will be kept for a minimum of 31 days and copies will be made available to an Authorised Officer or a Police Officer (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998) within 24hrs of any request. There will always be a member of staff on duty who can operate the system, to allow Officers to view recordings and if required by a Police Officer, provide a copy of images immediately.

Issues of Concerns:

The timings of the application are of concern, the application is in a cumulative impact area and the Local authority would not support the sale of alcohol from 06:00 Monday to Sunday and would prefer to see the sale of alcohol starting no earlier than 08:00. Similarly, the Terminal hour for the sale of alcohol in the application does not fall within the suggested time for applications set out within the Licensing Policy. The Policies sets out the preferred terminal hour for off licenses as being 23:00 Monday to Sunday's.

The hours in the Policy are a guide to applicants and each application will be considered on its own merits, however, applicants for premises falling outside of the suggested hours are expected to explain in their operating schedule the arrangements they will put in place to ensure that the premises does not add to the cumulative impact.

The area already has a high number of licenced premises and the density of premises in the area and alcohol related crime, and alcohol related violence in the area are very high. The Licensing Authority has been working with partners and the licence trade to tackle underage drinking, street drinking and preloading which affect residents living in the area. An additional off licence in the area will undermine this work and add to the cumulative impact.

The Licensing Authority feels that the measures proposed in the operating schedule, although comprehensive, would not sufficiently assure the Authority that the premises would not impact negatively on the night time economy in the area.

Summary and recommendations

An additional off licence selling alcohol will add to the cumulative impact.

The measures proposed by the applicant in the operating schedule are industry standard.

The applicant has not demonstrated that the application will not add to the cumulative impact therefore in order to promote the licensing objectives it is recommended that this application is refused.

If the Committee is minded to grant the application the Licensing Authority recommends the following terms and conditions;

Reducing the sale of alcohol hours to 08:00 to 23:00 Monday to Sunday

Prohibiting the sale of alcohol in excess of 6%abv

Suggested conditions of approval consistent with the operating schedule

The prevention of Crime and Disorder

- 1. The License Holder will ensure that the premises benefit from a CCTV system that operates at all times when licensable activities are taking place.
- 2. The system will incorporate a camera covering each of the entrance doors and the main display area and will be capable of providing an image which is regarded as identification standard. The precise positions of the cameras may be agreed, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, and with the Police from time to time.
- 3. The system will incorporate a recording facility and any recording will be retained and stored in a suitable and secure manner for a minimum of 30 days and will be made available, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, to the Police for inspection upon request.
- 4. The system must be able to export recorded images to a removable means e.g. CD/DVD and have is own software enabled to allow playback/review.

- 8. Outside of permitted hours for the sale of alcohol, all alcohol within the trading area (this does not apply to the display behind the cashier counter) is to be secured behind locked shutters/screens/grills or secured behind locked cabinet doors.



This special policy creates a rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises licences, club premises certificates, or variation applications that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, unless the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact or otherwise impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives.

- 6.3 If the Committee grants the application it should be subject to:
 - i. conditions prepared by the Licensing Officer which are consistent with the Operating Schedule (see appendix 4)
 - ii. any conditions deemed appropriate by the Committee to promote the four licensing objectives.(see appendix 4)

7 Conclusion and reasons for recommendations

7.1 The Council is required to consider this application in the light of all relevant information, and if approval is given, it may attach such conditions as appropriate to promote the licensing objectives.

The refusals log shall be checked and signed monthly by the designated premises supervisor and kept for a minimum of 12 months. The refusals log shall be made available for inspection by the licensing team, police or trading standards.
- 8. Signage shall be displayed at the exit requesting that customers leave the premises quietly.
- 9. No rubbish including bottles will be moved, removed or placed in an outside area on Sunday or Bank and between the hours of 22:00 and 07:00 other days of the week.
- 10. Challenge 25 will be adopted by the premises.
- 11. The licensee shall ensure that staff are trained about age restricted products and ensure that they sign to confirm that they have understood the training. The training will include the assessment of age; making a challenge; acceptable proof of age; and recording refusals. The licensee shall keep records of training and instruction given to staff and make them available for inspection upon request by the licensing team, police or trading standards.

Issues of Concern

The premises are located in the Bunhill cumulative impact area and therefore the onus is on the applicant to demonstrate that the proposal will not add to the cumulative impact.

The Licensing Authority is of the opinion that this application will add to the cumulative impact because:

- 1. Whilst the premise is situated on a busy main road, there are a significant number of residents living above and opposite the premises who could be adversely affected if the hours of operation were extended to 2am at the weekends.
- 2. A late night venue operated by the previous licence holder resulted in the council receiving a significant number of complaints about music noise from residents living above the venue and noise and disturbance by patrons outside the venue from residents living opposite.
- 3. Investigation of these complaints indicated that the premise was not designed and constructed such a way as to prevent noise breakout. The previous licence holder was unable to comply with a Noise Abatement Notice that resulted in the licence being revoked following a review application by the Noise Team.
- 4. The current operating schedule does not contain proposals that are sufficiently robust to:
 - a. Control music noise breakout
 - b. Prevent residents being disturbed by patrons outside the venue

Recommendations

In order to promote the licensing objectives it is recommended that the licensing committee refuse this application.

I am in receipt of your application to vary the licence for the above venue.

As one of the responsible authorities for the Licensing Act 2003, I am concerned of noise issues that may arise from the use of the premises and I am not wholly satisfied that the information you supplied in the prevention of public nuisance will prevent noise issues from occurring. However, I have listed below a condition that, if you agree to, can be put on your licence. I would like to lodge objections to the application by Tas Firin.

This is a well run and popular restaurant and a welcome addition to the locality.

In my opinion the current licence for alcohol and live music is reasonable. The proposed changes are contrary to Islington's Licensing Policies 1 2 and 8.

Tas Firin is located in a Cumulative Impact Zone and therefore there is a rebuttable presumption that any application for variation will usually be refused.

In my opinion, if this application was granted, it would add to the cumulative impact of the zone. Although the frontage of Tas Firin is on City Road, it backs on to densely populated residential streets and is positioned in an increasingly developed residential area with the new flats in City Garden Row, 31 storey Canaletto Towers and the Berkeley site opposite at 250 City Road.

These residential premises will be adversely affected if the music and alcohol extensions are granted as requested. Despite the protections proposed, and I can see thought has been given to this from the detail of the application, clients will be leaving the restaurant after 2.00 am with the consequent noise. No doubt bottles and refuse will be placed outside the restaurant for collection after this time which will be noisy and will disturb neighbours inevitably. Mini cabs will gather on this red route causing congestion. City Road is surprisingly busy at 2.00am.

The local quiet residential streets (Coombs, Remington and Haverstock Streets and City Garden Row in particular) are already "paying the price" of the increasing local night time economy with a steady stream of people shouting as they walk through in the early hours going from one part of Islington to another. This is particularly bad at the weekends and has lead to angry exchanges between residents and young people behaving rowdily. Having a premises open until 2.00 am nearby can only make the position worse for local residents. This loss of amenity must be taken into account.

In all the circumstances I would ask that this application is refused by the Licensing Committee.



- 3.2 The premises is currently licensed for the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises from 08:00 to 23:00 on Monday to Sunday and opening hours from 07:00 to 02:00 on Monday to Sunday.
- 3.3 The previous licensing history is:
 - a) The original premises licence was granted on 24 November 2005 as a conversion application.
 - b) On 15 December 2006 a variation application was granted for the premises to sell alcohol Monday to Sunday for 24 hours.
 - c) On 12 January 2007 the licence was transferred.
 - d) A Review application by Trading Standards was submitted on 2 August 2011 and the licence was revoked by Licensing Sub Committee on 3 November 2011.
 - e) At the same Licensing Sub Committee on 3 November 2011, the Licensing Sub Committee granted a new licence to for the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises Monday to Sunday 08:00 to 23:00.
 - f) On 12 December 2011 the licence was transferred.
 - h) On 13 February 2013 Trading Standard as a Responsible Authority reviewed the premises licence following a seizure of counterfeit and non-duty paid tobacco, sale of single cigarettes and the seizure of illicit spirits and wine.
 - i) On 18 April 2013 the Licensing Sub Committee revoked the premises licence. The decision to revoke was appealed by the licensee but the appeal was withdrawn on 3 September 2013 the day before the hearing was due to start. The premises remained unlicensed for a year and a quarter.
 - j) An application for a new premises licence was refused by Licensing Sub Committee on 8 April 2014.
 - k) On 22 July 2015 the Licensing Sub Committee granted a new premises licence to the current licensee Yavuz Mart Ltd.

- On 24 June 2015 a Late Temporary Events Notice (TENs) was submitted by Mr Yavuz, the DPS and sole director of Yavuz Mart Ltd (licensee) to extend the hours from 08:00 on 30 June 2015 until 02:30 on 5 July 2015 to coincide with the concerts in Finsbury Park. The Police objected to the Late TENs so a Counter Notice was issued. However, Licensing Officers were able to purchase alcohol on 3 July 2015 at 23:43 and on 4 July 2015 at 23:23.
- m) On 29 June 2015 a variation application to extend the permitted sale of alcohol was submitted.

The premises licence holder shall require the designated premises supervisor, or in his/her absence other responsible person, to keep an 'incident/refusals logbook in a bound book in which full details of all incidents are recorded. This shall include details of any refused sales and shall give details of the persons involved, incident description, time and date, actions taken and final outcome of the situation. This shall be completed as soon as possible and in any case no later than the close of business on the day of the incident. The time and date when the report was completed, and by whom, is to form part of the entry. The logbook is to be kept on the premises at all times and shall be produced to an authorised officer of the Licensing Authority or a constable when required.

- 8. Public safety risk assessments shall be carried out every 12 months and records of the risk assessments shall be kept.
- Emergency lighting, smoke detectors and fire extinguishers shall be regularly checked to ensure that they function satisfactorily and a record of the check shall be kept.
- 10. A fully functioning first aid kit shall be kept easily available at the premises.
- 11. Fire exits signage shall visible and be placed in at all fire exits.
- 12. The telephone number for the premises shall be displayed in a prominent position outside the premises so it can be read by passers-by.
- 13. Customers shall be asked to leave the customer in a good manner and not cause a disturbance.
- 14. Refuse collection shall take place on weekdays between the hours of 09:00 and 18:00 only.

- 8. If any spirits bought by the business have UK Duty Stamps that do not fluoresce under ultra-violet light, or are otherwise suspicious, the licensee shall identify the supplier to Islington Trading Standards as soon as possible.
- 9. The licensee shall adopt 'Challenge 25', the Retail of Alcohol Standards Group's advice for off-licences, and promote it through the prominent display of posters.
- 10. The licensee shall ensure that staff are trained about age restricted products and ensure that they sign to confirm that they have understood the training. The training shall include the assessment of age; making a challenge; acceptable proof of age; and recording refusals. The licensee shall keep records of training and instructions given to staff, detailing the areas covered, and make them available for inspection upon request by the licensing team, police or trading standards.

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
 - a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3. All door supervisors shall be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.
- 4. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

- 6. The responsible person shall ensure that:
 - a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:
 - i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
 - b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.
- 7. The licensee, DPS or personal licence holder making or authorizing the supply of alcohol, shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

The permitted price is the price found by applying the formula:

P=D+(DxV)

- (i)P is the permitted price.
- (ii)D is the rate of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii)V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

- 1. A working alarm system shall be installed and maintained in good working order. The alarm shall monitor all exit doors.
- 2. CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. Maintained means that the system will be regularly serviced (at least once a year) and checked every two weeks to ensure that it is storing images correctly and a log kept and signed by a Supervisor to this effect. The system will provide an identifiable full head and shoulder image of everyone entering the premises and will operate in any light conditions within the premises. The system will cover the full exterior of the premises and shall record in real time, date and time stamped and will operate whilst

Please accept this as an objection to the extension of licensing hours at 7 Days Food and Wine, 93a Stroud Green Road, from all three of the Tollington ward councillors (myself, Clir Richard Watts and Clir Jean Roger Kaseki).

We would like to object because we don't believe this extension of hours will meet the licensing objectives of preventing public nuisance.

In this area there is already an issue with street drinking. In particular the block of flats which this shop is below regularly has street drinkers sitting on the stairs at the entrance to the flats. This means when residents arrive or leave their home they often have to step over people who are drinking at the entrance of their flat. We believe that having alcohol on sale late at night so near is likely to make this situation worst.

In addition when this same premises previously had a license until 2am residents in the block of flat above the shop raised issues about noise from people hanging around outside the shop.

Also the hours being applied for full outside of the councils core hours policy.

We would therefore recommend that the committee refuses the extension of hours.

I have had the opportunity to examine the application to vary the premises licence made by the above on behalf of Trading Standards and wish to make the following representation.

- When this licence was initially granted I was supportive of the application as I had met with Tacim and his brother, Ayaz, who I understood would be involved in the management of the business, before they made the application and they impressed me with their apparent desire to take advice and be responsible licensees.
- 2. Further, I do not normally make a representation on licensed hours, as I do not regard comment on this to fall within Trading Standards' remit.
- 3. However, on this occasion I wish to object to the application and ask the Licensing Sub-Committee to reject it. My reason is that I am not satisfied that the business is being run with the high management standards required by Licensing Policy 10.
- 4. On 2nd September 2014, I took an 18 year old volunteer to the business to attempt to buy alcohol without giving proof of age (a 'Challenge 25 test purchase'). The volunteer was sold the alcohol with no proof of age being demanded by the licensee's mother who was behind the counter not an offence, but a breach of the requirement to use Challenge 25. A subsequent underage test purchase and a second Challenge 25 test were both met with refusals to sell and the licensee attended the training for off licensees put on by Trading Standards in November 2014, so this aspect does not cause me undue concern.
- 5. However, what does concern me is that I am aware of the same breaches of licence conditions on three separate occasions since the licence has been granted.
- 6. After the test purchase in September 2014, I noted that Skol Super (9% abv) was for sale in the shop in breach of the 'high strength' condition put forward by the licensee at the application stage (Annex 2, condition 3); and that the old and inadequate, cctv system was still in use six weeks after the licence had been granted (in breach of Annex 2, condition 2). I e-mailed the business reminding them that it was illegal to sell alcohol while they were in breach of licence conditions on the same day, asking that they contact me to tell me what corrective action they were taking. I sent a reminder two weeks later, as I had not heard. This did not elicit a response, although I did subsequently speak with Ayaz to ensure he was aware of my concerns.
- 7. At the recent Challenge 25 test purchase, on Thursday 9th July, I noticed two high strength beers on the shelves Carlsberg Special Brew (9%) and Oranjeboom 8.5 (8.5%) that breached the high strength condition. I informed the licensee's father that this could not

be sold and said that it should be taken off the shelves. I was also informed that the cctv was (temporarily) not working, although the business was still apparently selling alcohol. I have since been made aware that cctv footage had been required to be produced and these high strength beers were identified as breaching the condition by Licensing Officers on the previous weekend. The Licensing Officers were in the shop as the business had sold alcohol later than their licence allowed.

8. I am disappointed in the management at the business. There are few easier conditions to comply with than a 'high-strength' condition and the fact that they have consistently breached it indicates to me that they have little regard for complying with the law. I request that the application is rejected.

I believe these representations are specific and proportionate to the known trading characteristics of this retail sector and are consistent with the Islington Council Statement of Licensing Policies.

With reference to the above application, I am writing to inform you that the Metropolitan Police, as a Responsible Authority, will be objecting to this application as it is our belief that if granted the application would undermine the Licensing Objectives.

Although this venue is not within the Finsbury Park/Holloway Road Cumulative Impact Area, it is so close that it cannot fail but to have an impact. Within a 250m radius there are 24 licensed premises, five of which are Off-Licensed premises.

The hours applied for fall outside the recommended core hours within the Council Licensing Policy 2013-2017.

We also have concerns re the standards of Management at the premise, we are aware that on 3rd & 4th July 2015 Council Licensing Officers were able to allegedly purchase alcoholic drinks after the licensable hours at the premises. This matter is still under investigation. We are also aware that a formal request for CCTV footage of the two purchases was made on 5th July 2015 and yet this footage was not supplied. We understand that Mr YAVUZ informed licensing officers that the CCTV had not been working for two weeks prior to the alleged purchases. We were never informed by Mr YAVUZ that the CCTV was not working and the condition does state that the CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. We would not have agreed to the premises operating under the license if we had known that the CCTV was not going to be working for two weeks. This is totally acceptable. The CCTV is not just for crime prevention it is also to assist the licensee to prove or disprove any alleged incidents or sales within the premises and on these occasions the footage could have greatly assisted with proving or disproving the alleged after hour sales.

These incidents are not indicative of the standards of Management we require at the licensed premises within this Borough. To sell after hours on one night could be considered an error, but to do it two nights running shows a pure disregard for the licensing laws and Authorities and to add to this the fact that the CCTV was not working correctly only heightens the poor standards of Management.

In light of this I would make the recommendation that the License variation application is refused.

Issues of Concern

1. The premises are locate just outside the boundary of a cumulative impact area, so there is no rebuttable presumption of refusal, however there are 4 off licences within 250 meters of the premises:

- 2. A considerable amount of resources are being deployed to deal with alcohol related crime and disorder and another late night premises selling alcohol in this area could undermine the work of the Police, Local Authority and Late Night Levy Team.
- 3. The operating schedule provides no new measures to mitigate against the impact of late night alcohol sales other than requiring notices to be displayed requesting customers to leave quietly. The current premises have a condition requiring staff to ask customers to leave quietly.
- 4. There are concerns about the management of the premises and the compliance with the current conditions attached to the premises licence. Licensing and Trading

- Officers have observed that high strength beer, lager and cider are displayed for sale at the premises on three occasions contrary to licence conditions.
- Officers were informed by the licensee that the CCTV was not working at the premises for two weeks contrary to a condition on the licence requiring a working CCTV condition.
- 6. Officers have observed several fridges containing beer, lager and cider and an aisle of wine on display that do not have locked grills, screens or cabinet doors to prevent access by customers to alcohol.
- 7. When Licensing Officers visited the premises on 10 July they noted that there were no notices displayed regarding Challenge 25, a contact telephone number nor notices asking customers to leave quietly as required under the licence
- 8. The Licensing authority expects high standards of management for all of their licences premises. Currently this premises are not being run to that high standard as it is failing to meet minimum standards of compliance with the premises licence conditions.

I am submitting a representation against the application to vary a licence to permit the sale of alcohol between the hours of 08:00 and 02:00 at the above premises. This representation is on behalf of Islington Council's Public Health department, which as a health body is a responsible authority.

The grounds for the representation are:

- Public safety
- Crime and disorder

The relevant policy in Islington's Licensing Policy:

- Policy 2: Cumulative impact and saturation
- Policy 8: Framework Hours

The impact of alcohol in Islington

Islington suffers from some of the greatest levels of alcohol-related health harm in London. The residents of the borough have the highest rate of admissions for alcohol-related conditions in London, significantly higher than both the London and the UK-wide average. Alcohol also contributes to the early death of Islington residents with significantly higher levels of mortality from chronic liver disease than the London average and an average of 12 months of life lost due to alcohol in men and 5 months in women.

Alcohol also significantly **harms children** in the borough, Islington has the fifth highest rate of alcohol-specific admissions in the under 18s in London and had 63 alcohol-related ambulance call-outs in 2012/13.

Alcohol significantly **contributes to crime** in the borough. Islington has the fourth highest rate of alcohol-related crime in London with alcohol resulting in more than 1,500 violent crimes and 37 sexual crimes in the borough a year.

Availability of alcohol in the vicinity of the application

The area of this application has sufficient premises to meet demand and additional outlets supplying alcohol will only be detrimental to the local residents in terms of noise and disturbance, anti-social behaviour and crime and will significantly add to the cumulative impact of alcohol on residents.

This area already has a **high density of premises**. Within the Lower Super Output Area (LSOA)¹ which this application refers to there are 8 off-licences, equivalent to one off-licence for every 246 residents aged 18 and over.

Harm from alcohol in the vicinity of the application

Finsbury Park Ward, to which this application relates is an area which the evidence available demonstrates a particularly high level of alcohol harm relative to the rest of the borough. As written in the Statement of Licensing policy: any further increase in the ease of access to alcohol in terms of the number of premises and the **hours of operation** needs to be carefully managed.

The 2012 Annual Public Health Report found that the area in which this premises is located had a high density of licensed premises, a high rate of alcohol-related ambulance callouts, and a high rate of alcohol-related crime.

Data on alcohol-related ambulance callouts show that this LSOA has a significantly higher rate of alcohol relate ambulance call-outs than the borough average. In 2014/15, over half of these call-outs happened between 11pm and 5am indicating alcohol related harm increasing where alcohol is available after 11pm. This is significantly higher than the borough average and this LSOA is eighth (out of 118 LSOAs) in Islington for alcohol-related ambulance call-outs.

Each of these ambulance call-outs is an indicator that public safety has been compromised by alcohol and many are related to crime and disorder. Local analysis indicates that **ambulance callouts increase as the number of licensed premises increases**. Across Islington, 53% of alcohol-related callouts resulted in conveying a person to hospital, and 6% resulted in assistance being given at the scene or conveyed to an NHS walk-in centre. This represents a substantial use of health services. The pattern of alcohol-related ambulance callouts corresponds with the pattern of alcohol-related crime in Islington.

Recommendation

Based on the evidence available Islington Public Health Department recommend that:

- The application to vary a licence to supply alcohol is refused as it would significantly add to the cumulative impact of alcohol on the licensing objectives.
- Where the panel is minded to grant the application that the following conditions be added to the license:
 - o Hours be limited to framework hours for off-licences
 - That a condition be added to the license that apart from 'premium' priced products no beer, lager or cider of ABV of 6.5% or above are sold.

Suggested conditions of approval consistent with the current premises licence

- 1. A working alarm system shall be installed and maintained in good working order. The alarm shall monitor all exit doors.
- 2. CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. Maintained means that the system will be regularly serviced (at least once a year) and checked every two weeks to ensure that it is storing images correctly and a log kept and signed by a Supervisor to this effect. The system will provide an identifiable full head and shoulder image of everyone entering the premises and will operate in any light conditions within the premises. The system will cover the full exterior of the premises and shall record in real time, date and time stamped and will operate whilst the premises is open for licensable activities. The recordings will be kept for a minimum of 31 days and copies will be made available to an Authorised Officer or a Police Officer (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998) within 24hrs of any request free of charge. There will always be a member of staff on duty who can operate the system, to allow Officers to view recordings and if required by a Police Officer, provide a copy of images immediately free of charge.
- 3. No high strength beer, lager or cider of 5.5% abv or above shall be sold.
- 4. Outside of the hours authorised for the sale of alcohol, all alcohol within the trading area is to be secured behind locked grills, locked screens or locked cabinet doors so as to prevent access to the alcohol by customers or staff.
- 5. There shall be two members of staff present on the premises after 22:00.
- 6. Only the owner and manager shall purchase age restricted goods from the cash and carry.
- 7. Stall shall be trained to check the legitimacy of any alcohol purchased using UV lights and checking for anything unusual or suspicious.
- 8. Public safety risk assessments shall be carried out every 12 months and records of the risk assessments shall be kept.
- 9. Emergency lighting, smoke detectors and fire extinguishers shall be regularly checked to ensure that they function satisfactorily and a record of the check shall be kept.
- 10. A fully functioning first aid kit shall be kept easily available at the premises.
- 11. Fire exits signage shall visible and be placed in at all fire exits.
- 12. The telephone number for the premises shall be displayed in a prominent position outside the premises so it can be read by passers-by.
- 13. Customers shall be asked to leave the customer in a good manner and not cause a disturbance.
- 14. Refuse collection shall take place on weekdays between the hours of 09:00 and 18:00 only.
- 1. The licensee and staff should note any refusals in a refusals log. The refusals log shall be kept at the premises for no less than 12 months.
- 2. No alcoholic goods will ever be purchased or taken from persons calling to the shop.
- 3. No spirits shall be purchased in a resealed box, without appropriate checks being made first.
- 4. The licensee will immediately report to Trading Standards any instance of a caller to the shop attempting to sell alcohol or tobacco.
- 5. Only alcoholic drinks which are detailed on invoices will be purchased or accepted as part of a 'free' offer. Invoices (or copies) for all alcoholic goods on the premises will be made available to officers from the council, police or HMRC upon request.
- 6. A stock control system will be introduced, so that the licensee can quickly identify where and when alcoholic goods have been purchased.

- 7. An ultra-violet light will be available at the premises for the purpose of checking the UK Duty Stamp on spirits as soon as practical after they have been purchased.
- 8. If any spirits bought by the business have UK Duty Stamps that do not fluoresce under ultra-violet light, or are otherwise suspicious, the licensee shall identify the supplier to Islington Trading Standards as soon as possible.
- 9. The licensee shall adopt 'Challenge 25', the Retail of Alcohol Standards Group's advice for off-licences, and promote it through the prominent display of posters.
- 10. The licensee shall ensure that staff are trained about age restricted products and ensure that they sign to confirm that they have understood the training. The training shall include the assessment of age; making a challenge; acceptable proof of age; and recording refusals. The licensee shall keep records of training and instructions given to staff, detailing the areas covered, and make them available for inspection upon request by the licensing team, police or trading standards.
- 11. The licensee shall put arrangements in place to ensure that before serving alcohol to persons they believe to be less than 25, staff ask to see accredited proof of age: that is, proof of age cards carrying the 'PASS' logo (and no others), a Passport, or UK Driving Licence bearing the photograph and date of birth of the bearer.
- 12. The licensee shall require staff to note any refusals to sell to young people in a refusals log. The refusals log shall be checked and signed monthly by the designated premises supervisor. The refusals log shall be made available for inspection upon request by the licensing team, police or trading standards.
