129 INTRODUCTIONS AND PROCEDURE (Item A1)

Councillor Diner welcomed everyone to the meeting and officers and members introduced themselves. The procedure for the conduct of the meeting was outlined.

130 APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE (Item A2)

Apologies for absence were received from Councillor Khan.

131 DECLARATIONS OF SUBSTITUTE MEMBERS (Item A3)

Councillor Ward substituted for Councillor Khan.

132 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST (Item A4)

Councillor Aysegul stated that she was the ward councillor for Highbury East.

133 ORDER OF BUSINESS (Item A5)

The order of business was as the agenda.

134 MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING (Item A6)

RESOLVED

That the minutes of the meeting held on the 13 September 2016 be confirmed as a correct record and the Chair be authorised to sign them.

135 LAUGHTERAMA, Highbury Fields, N7 - APPLICATION FOR A NEW PREMISES LICENCE - THIS ITEM HAS BEEN WITHDRAWN (Item B1)

The Sub-Committee noted that this item had been withdrawn.

136 274-276 Highbury New Park, N5 2LH - NEW APPLICATION FOR PREMISES LICENCE (Item B2)

The licensing officer reported that conditions 6 and 7 should be merged to read as one condition and conditions 3 and 4 could be deleted as they had been repeated in condition 10. An additional condition regarding the display of notices should be included as a proposed condition as indicated in the operating schedule.

The interested party stated that since the shop had been closed the streets were very quiet. There had been no more problems with youths in the area. He considered that cars would

be outside late at night and people would cause trouble. He stated that he would prefer the licence not to be granted but if it was the licence be restricted from 8am to 8pm rather than the 16 hours requested.

In response to questions he stated that when the shop was open previously there had been trouble from youths hanging around outside the shop. Since the shop had closed the area had been very quiet. He stated that, although he would rather that the licence was not granted, he considered 7am was very early when there were schools nearby.

The applicant's representative reported that this shop had been licensed for many years and planning permission had been granted for the replacement building with two shops beneath. The shop was not currently open. The hours requested were within police and this would be a local shop catering for people in the locality. The hours proposed in the morning would enable customers on the way to work to purchase alcohol and they could also buy alcohol in the evening. 11pm was a time recognised as appropriate and the representative asked that the licence be granted for this time. There was no evidence of nuisance, crime and disorder. Police had agreed a CCTV condition. The licensee had held a licence in Copenhagen Street with no difficulties. If the licence was granted the designated premises supervisor would be at the shop most of the time. There were generally two people employed in the premises. They would operate Challenge 25, they would have CCTV inside and outside which would assist if there were problems. There had been a petition of support with 70 signatures. The licensing objectives would be promoted if the licence was granted with proposed conditions.

In response to questions it was reported that the licensing consultants offered training. The shutters were electric which it was considered may be quieter than previously. The area of floor space used for storing alcohol was indicated to members of the Sub-Committee. Local people had visited and supported the shop. The applicant's representative stated that there may be some flexibility regarding the early morning taking into account resident concerns. This was a local community store and was not a nightclub or bar. The proposed hour of 7am would be useful for customers who wished to purchase alcohol on the way to work. The representative did not know of any issues in the area regarding street drinkers. Street drinkers often looked for high strength beers which would not be sold.

In summary, the local resident stated that he considered that 16 hours for the sale of alcohol were excessive. The spirits were just inside the door where customers walked in. He did not disagree with a convenience store but considered the sale of alcohol was a problem.

The applicant's representative stated that spirits were located behind the counter. There may be some flexibility regarding the start time for the sale of alcohol but he asked that the licence be granted as sought. The licensee would promote the licensing objectives but if there were problems there was the review process. This premises had been licensed for many years previously.

RESOLVED

- 1) That the application for a new premises licence in respect of 274-276 Highbury New Park, N5 2LH be granted to allow:-
 - a) The premises to sell alcohol, off supplies, from Monday to Sunday from 8am until 11pm.
 - b) Opening hours from 7am until 11pm.
- 2) Conditions on page 112 of the agenda shall be applied to the licence with the following amendments:-

- Deletion of conditions 3 and 4 (to be replaced by condition 10).
- Conditions 6 and 7 to be merged as one condition.
- The addition of the following condition. Clear and legible notices will be prominently displayed to remind customers to leave quietly and have regard to our neighbours.

REASONS FOR DECISION

The Sub-Committee listened to all the evidence and submissions and read all the material. The Sub-Committee reached the decision having given consideration to the Licensing Act 2003, as amended, and its regulations, the national guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.

The applicant stated that this was an application for a local convenience store to serve the local community.

The Sub-Committee noted the suggested conditions of approval consistent with the operating schedule and the conditions agreed with the police.

The Sub-Committee noted that the hours sought were within the hours specified in licensing policy 8. The Sub-Committee noted that the representations regarding the hours of operation made by the resident who attended the meeting and noted that the applicant's willingness to be flexible with regard to the hours sought for the sale of alcohol in the morning.

The Sub-Committee concluded that the granting of the new licence, with the conditions and the later start time for the sale of alcohol, would promote the licensing objectives.

The Sub-Committee considered licensing policy 4 regarding shops selling alcohol, licensing policies 7 and 8 regarding hours and licensing policy 25 regarding the sale of alcohol to children.

YENI ADANA, 25-27 GREEN LANES, N16 9BS - APPLICATION FOR A NEW PREMISES LICENCE (Item B3)

The licensing officer reported that conditions 13 and 26 had been duplicated.

The licensing authority stated that the premises were not in a cumulative impact area. The authority would not wish the premises to be used as a bar. Customers would be eating food with alcohol. They had no objection to the hours as these had been the same hours as previous licence. There would be no eating or drinking outside the premises. They held no complaints regarding noise nuisance. The take away hours were until 5am although these had not been used fully previously due to noise restrictions.

The applicant's representative stated that this was a restaurant serving Turkish cuisine that had seating available for 50 people. There had been a previous licence but this had not been transferred when the company had been dissolved in June 2016. The licensee was currently still paying staff for covering the night shift but closing at 11pm. The applicant was not asking for more hours than the previous licence holder and 30 conditions were proposed for the licence, 15 of which had been agreed by the noise team. It was stated that the four interested parties were referring to the previous owner in their representations. Full refurbishment of the premises had been carried out including new soundproofing. A planning application was to be submitted although it was noted that planning and licensing

were separate regimes. There were 12 staff employed by the premises but 7 staff would lose their jobs if the licence was not granted.

In response to questions it was noted that staff would ensure that alcohol was not taken off the premises. It was noted that the applicant had spoken to the interested parties and they all thought that this application had been submitted by the previous owner.

RESOLVED

- 1) That the application for a new premises licence, in respect of Yeni Adana, 25-27 Green Lanes, N16 9BS, be granted to allow:-
 - a) The supply of alcohol, for consumption on the premises from Sunday to Thursdays from 11am until 1am hours and Friday and Saturday from 11 am until 2 am Friday and Saturday.
 - b) The provision of late night refreshment, Mondays to Sundays from 11pm until 5am.
 - c) The premises to be open from 8am until 5am Monday to Sunday.
- 2) That the conditions outlined in appendix 4 and detailed on pages 142 and 143 of the agenda be applied to the licence.

REASONS FOR DECISION

The Sub-Committee listened to all the evidence and submissions and read all the material. The Sub-Committee reached the decision having given consideration to the Licensing Act 2003, as amended, and its regulations, the national guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.

The Sub-Committee noted four local residents had made representations which were included in the report. A representation had been submitted by the Licensing Authority.

The Sub-Committee noted that the premises were not in a cumulative impact area. The Sub-Committee also noted that there had been a previous licence at the premises for the same hours applied for but this had lapsed in June 2016. The premises had since been refurbished which included new soundproofing works. The Sub-Committee noted that the applicant had spoken with the residents who had made representations.

The Sub-Committee noted that the conditions proposed by the licensing authority, namely, that alcohol sales would be ancillary to food and customers were not permitted to eat and drink outside, were agreed.

The Sub-Committee concluded that with the additional conditions, including conditions proposed by the noise team, the licensing objectives would be promoted.

The Sub-Committee took into consideration Licensing Policy 18 regarding noise, 7 and 8 regarding licensing hours, licensing policy 19 regarding deliveries and collection and 20 regarding smoking, drinking and eating outside.

1. Synopsis

1.1 This is an application for a new premise licence under the Licensing Act 2003.

1.2 The new application is to:

- Allow the supply of 'off' sales of alcohol 24 hours daily
- Allow opening hours 24 hours daily

NB: Please note that following comments from the Police, the applicant amended the above hours so that the hours now sought are;

- Allow the supply of 'off' sales of alcohol from 08:00 until 23:00 daily
- Allow opening hours from 06:00 until 23:00 daily

3. Background

3.1 Papers are attached as follows:-

Appendix 2: representations;

Appendix 3: suggested conditions and map of premises location.

3.2 Twelve representations were received in respect of this application. Eleven in opposition to the application and one in support. Subsequent to the changes to the times of the application, one of the representors withdrew their representation.

3.3 These premises are located in the Junction Area of Archway Cumulative Impact, therefore the Licensing Committee will need to consider Licensing Policy 2, which states that there is a presumption of refusal unless the Committee is satisfied that there will be no adverse cumulative impact on the licensing objectives.

3.4 This premises held a licence for the off sales of alcohol 24 hours daily and late night refreshment from 23:00 until 05:00, until it was surrendered in October 2016. A transfer application came in soon after, however, it was received too late to be accepted. (Note: the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003 allow for transfer applications to be accepted up to 28 days after a premises licence has been surrendered).

4. Planning Implications

4.1 The planning department state their records indicate that these premises has been operating as A1 (shop use) with '24 hours of opening' since June 2008.

4.2 The planning department confirm that there are currently no enforcement investigations affecting these premises.

5. Recommendations

5.1 To determine the application for a new premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.

- 5.2 If the Committee grants the application it should be subject to:
- i. conditions prepared by the Licensing Officer which are consistent with the Operating Schedule (see appendix 3)
 - ii. any conditions deemed appropriate by the Committee to promote the four licensing objectives.

5 Conclusion and reasons for recommendations

- 6.1 The Council is required to consider this application in the light of all relevant information, and if approval is given, it may attach such conditions as appropriate to promote the licensing objectives.

a) General

These premises are a new acquisition which previously had a twenty four hour premises licence operating as a convenience store with an off licence facility. The previous owner left the premises due to accumulated debt and in the process surrendered the premises licence. The applicant wishes to operate the premises in the same vein as before.

b) The Prevention of Crime & Disorder

CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. The system will enable frontal identification of every person entering the premises. The system shall record in real time and operate whilst the premises are open for licensable activities. Recordings shall be kept available for a minimum of 31 days. Recordings shall be made available to an authorised officer or a police officer (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998) within 24 hours of any request.

All instances of crime and disorder shall be reported to the police.

An incident book shall be used to record all instances of public order.

The holder of the premises licence shall subscribe to and participate fully in the local Pub/Club/Shop Watch Scheme.

The sale of intoxicating liquor will not be made to persons where there are grounds to believe that the sale will result in crime or disorder.

c) Public Safety

We will endeavour to insure that the premises are safe both staff and the general public, a fire risk assessment will be taken.

Archway has more than enough places to get alcohol. In fact, it has been designated an alcohol saturation zone and as a resident, I can vouch for the "saturation" and the impact it has on my life.

I wish to object on the following grounds:

Archway is one of the crime hotspots in Islington.

I believe, therefore, that granting this application for a licence the sale of alcohol will be against the objectives of the Licensing Policy: prevention of crime and disorder, the prevention of public nuisance, public safety and the protection of children from harm.

Whilst it may not be a normal consideration of such applications, I would also like to point out that the Archway area is seeing a considerable amount of change at present.

Our current Licensing Policy also points out that the Archway area has one of the highest concentrations of off licences of any ward in the Borough, with an average of one off-licence per 317 residents. The Policy therefore has designated it an area of cumulative impact and saturation. As such there should not be another licence granted. It is widely recognised that as the density of licensed premises increases, so does the number of alcohol related ambulance call outs and incidents of alcohol related crime and disorder.

Dear Carol,

I am writing to request that you refuse granting of any alcohol licence to the premises at 42 Junction Road N19.

After years of granting the majority of local shops an alcohol licence - including our local newsagents (now called " Bargain Booze"), Archway has been designated an alcohol saturation zone. We need an actual reduction of premises selling alcohol and especially these Mini Mart style stores that do not add anything new to the local retail offering. They all sell the same type of cheap food that is not required which is proven by the failure of Jimmy's despite opening 24 hours.

The type of stores flourishing and improving the area, providing what local residents want do not sell alcohol (deli, cafes, fish shop, green grocer, international supermarket).

These type of shops selling alcohol, and especially this one at 42 Junction Road has historically and repeatedly attracted suspect clientele and anti social behaviour, I'm sure the police will have it all on record. We do not need more crime and disorder in the area.

Living on [REDACTED] for over 18 years, [REDACTED] these premises and the [REDACTED], in the middle of the town centre, we have first hand experience of the type of social unrest, fights, mess, violence and other anti-social behaviour that people buying and drinking alcohol on the streets causes. These premises have been a centre of such problems for many years surely it's better to encourage a different type of store that is not associated with alcohol or mini mart style business to give it the best chance of attracting non-violent and questionable behaviour.

Visit the area on a Friday/Saturday evening and/or Saturday/Sunday morning and you will see first hand the consequences. Noise and fights, crime and disorder increases significantly with drunkenness.

As more and more stores open that do not sell alcohol, various cafes, Archway Deli, Archway Fish Shop as examples, they reduce the incidence of public nuisance as the area attracts different people and creates a different vibe.

This part of Junction Road also attracts a lot of children catching buses to local schools and having easy access to alcohol at this style of Mini Mart that have been proven to be less

vigilant in who it sells alcohol to is highly undesirable. Even if they just go in to buy sweets. to be limited to going into shops that sell alcohol is again not helpful.

To refuse the licence is a better solution than trying to police the sale of alcohol to minors and other alcohol related problems later. The extra effort required by both council officers and police to manage such a high risk enterprise, especially considering its history, taking them away from more valuable activities surely is a huge waste for no benefit to the local community.

I urge you to refuse any new licence at all at this address.

Dear Carol Jones,

The Archway Town Centre Group informed me that an application for an off licence has been made for premises near Vorley Road in Archway.

As someone who lives in Archway and very close to Vorley Road I have great concerns, and I would be grateful if the council rejected that or any other application for an off licence in our area.

I have the impression that Archway and particularly the area around tube station/Post Office/Archway Tower has become worse and worse over the years regarding alcohol and drug abuse. These days one can't leave the tube station without being pestered by beggar's (who clearly want to buy more booze) or drunks. There and along Junction Road I have witnessed so much antisocial behaviour/nuisance due to alcohol: urinating in very public places or quieter corners, drunken people (clearly alcoholics, I have seen them drunk before) vomiting in broad daylight on the pavement in front of shops, visible to shoppers and their children, drunks shouting at people. I have been pestered by many and even seriously intimidated. I have even felt threatened in our local post office several times when someone drunken swayed in.

I have seen drunks sleeping it off in our local library (hunched over a table, reeking of alcohol).

I was pleased to see the 24-hours shop near Iceland close down. During evenings (I never went there at night) I saw scary people there, scary through drink.

When I come home late I have to pass the area of the potential new off licence, and that prospect scares me. I would feel frightened to go home (to Hargrave Park) in the dark.

We live in a community with many very vulnerable people, many with alcohol problems. There are many youths who live in difficult home conditions. We have a large number of mental patients or ex-patients from the mental unit in Highgate and an extraordinary amount of active alcoholics who are out in the streets, drinking in public. Who knows how many are in their homes! Alcohol causes people to commit domestic violence (I often hear people shout in their homes) that also affects the children.

I see a neighbour with drinking problems sneak out every evening just before 10pm to go to another late-night shop in Dartmouth Park Hill, and people like her (of which, I think, we have more than other areas), might be more tempted if they had another shop that even closes one hour later and will probably have much more choice of alcoholic beverages.

Archway is already a very troubled area, and I strongly object to the potential off licence near Vorley Road!

In my opinion it is the council's responsibility to support our health and wellbeing.

I hope that you will reject the application.

I am writing to comment on this Licence application on behalf of the Better Archway Forum, a community group of close to 1,000 in the Archway area.

There is considerable concern regarding the number of off-licence outlets selling alcohol in the Archway area and the consequent anti-social behaviour. It is widely considered that the proliferation of licences has led to an increase in this sort of problem, and that these outlets frequently fail to meet the licensing objectives. Underage sales, sales of fake branded alcohol and sales to those who are already drunk are all regular occurrences.

I do understand getting a 24 hour license now is very hard but still I would like to let you know on certain points of the premises as I have run the shop for over 20 years and I know all the difficulties we've had regarding a 24 hour license

If you do you grant them a 24 hour license and they will definitely need special Team after 10 o'clock as they will get a lot of trouble

And if they do not get a 24 hour license they will definitely need shutters with stronger locks to secure the off-licence section so there is no sale after hours that if they going to open 24 hours as the customers will get very aggressive being a previous 24-hour shop for a long time

The person applying for the license will not be running the shop him self he has other businesses in Chingford is planning to keep staff or give it on the management bases in my opinion very wrong move

As in my opinion those premises with alcohol can only be run with somebody to give it their full attention not sitting on the other side of London

The other problem is the back storeroom is not fireproof it's just a shared made with plywood that needs to be knocked down and re-done so it can be fireproof as the premises do not have any place to store alcohol that was the advice given to me on my last inspection by the Fire Brigade

The information that I have provided is for no gain but just pure love as I have run the business for the last 20 years I know the area very well and I know what it requires and running those premises with a alcohol license it's not going to be easy job the only reason I survived and only had one problem of under age sale was that I was there I lot of times and I hired very good staff

I hope the information I have provided will help thank you

Suggested conditions of approval consistent with the operating schedule

1. All instances of crime and disorder shall be reported to the police.
2. An incident book shall be used to record all instances of public disorder.
3. The holder of the premises licence shall subscribe to and participate fully in the local Pub/Club/ShopWatch Scheme.
4. The sale of intoxicating liquor will not be made to persons where there are grounds to believe that the sale will result in crime or disorder.
5. The premises licence holder will endeavour to insure that the premises are safe both staff and the general public, a fire risk assessment will be taken.
6. Noise and vibration must not emanate from the premises so as to cause a nuisance to nearby properties.
7. Prominent clear and legible notices must be displayed at all exits requesting the public to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and nearby area quietly.
8. The licensee shall regularly monitor staff to check how they are dealing with young people who ask for alcohol and other age restricted products.

Conditions proposed by Trading Standards – Accepted

9. No alcoholic goods or tobacco products will ever be purchased or taken from persons calling to the shop.
10. The licensee will immediately report to Trading Standards any instance of a caller to the shop attempting to sell alcohol or tobacco products.
11. No spirits shall be purchased in a resealed box, without thorough checks being made to ensure it is legal to sell.
12. Only alcoholic drinks which are detailed on invoices will be purchased or accepted as part of a 'free' offer. Invoices (or copies) for all alcoholic goods on the premises will be made available to officers from the council, police or HMRC upon request.
13. An ultra-violet light will be available at the premises for the purpose of checking the UK Duty Stamp on spirits as soon as practical after they have been purchased.
14. The licensee shall adopt 'Challenge 25', the Retail of Alcohol Standards Group's advice for off-licences, and promote it through the prominent display of posters.
15. The licensee shall ensure that staff are trained on relevant matters including the conditions on the premises licence; age restricted products; and (if they are ever left in charge of the shop) the operation of the CCTV system and how to deal with visits from authorised officers. The licensee shall keep records of training and instructions given to staff, detailing the areas covered, and make them available for inspection upon request by authorised officers. Staff shall sign to confirm that they have received and understood the training.
16. Age-restricted products training shall cover the following steps: the assessment of age; how and when to challenge for proof of age; acceptable proof of age and how to check it; and recording refusals.

17. The licensee shall put arrangements in place to ensure that before serving alcohol to persons they believe to be less than 25, staff ask to see accredited proof of age: that is, proof of age cards carrying the 'PASS' logo (and no others), a Passport, or UK Driving Licence bearing the photograph and date of birth of the bearer.
18. The licensee shall require staff to note any refusals to sell to young people in a refusals log. The refusals log shall be checked and signed monthly by the designated premises supervisor. The refusals log shall be made available for inspection upon request by the licensing team, police or trading standards

Conditions proposed by the Police - Accepted

19. CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. Maintained means that the system will be regularly serviced (at least once a year) and checked every two weeks to ensure that it is storing images correctly and a log kept and signed by a Supervisor to this effect. The system will provide an identifiable full head and shoulder image of everyone entering the premises and will operate in any light conditions within the premises. The system will cover the full exterior of the premises and shall record in real time, date and time stamped and will operate whilst the premises is open for licensable activities. The recordings will be kept for a minimum of 31 days and copies will be made available to an Authorised Officer or a Police Officer (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998) within 24hrs of any request free of charge. There will always be a member of staff on duty who can operate the system, to allow Officers to view recordings and if required by a Police Officer, provide a copy of images immediately free of charge to assist in the immediate investigation of offences. If the system malfunctions and will not be operating for longer than one day of business then Police must be informed.
20. No super strength beer, lagers, ciders or spirit mixtures of 6.5% ABV or above shall be sold at the premises
21. No more than 15% of the sales area shall be used at any one time for the sale, exposure for sale, or display of alcohol.
22. All fridges and areas containing alcohol will be under lockable shutters and/or blinds and access to shutters/blinds will be under management control to ensure that alcohol shall not be on display during non – licensable hours.
