

PREMISES LICENCE VARIATION APPLICATION

RE: LE PECHE MIGNON, 6 RONALDS ROAD, LONDON N5 1XH

- 1. Synopsis
 - 1.1 This is an application for the variation of a premise licence under the Licensing Act 2003.
 - 1.2 The premises currently benefits from a licence allowing:
 - The provision off sales of alcohol from 08:00 until 20:00 Monday to Saturday and from 08:00 to 17:00 Sunday;
 - Opening hours from 08:00 until 20:00 Monday to Saturday and from 08:00 to 17:00 Sunday.
 - 1.3 The variation application is to allow:
 - The provision on and off sales of alcohol from 11:00 until 22:00 Monday to Sunday;
 - Opening hours from 07:30 until 22:30 Monday to Sunday. (The opening hours were amended by the applicant to allow a drinking up time)

- 3.2 The premises are NOT located in any Cumulative Impact Area, but it was mistakenly identified as being located in the Holloway and Finsbury Park Cumulative Impact Area as stated in the letter to residents.
- 3.3 The premises has held a licence for the sale of alcohol since July 2007.
- 3.4 This application received five representations from local residents. Four of the representations are from two residential addresses. One representation was withdrawn after the applicant wrote to the residents addressing their concerns. Copies of the representations are attached as Appendix 3 and the letter to the residents from the applicant is attached as Appendix 4.

4. Planning Implications

4.1 The Planning Department confirm there is no relevant planning history at this site and there are currently no planning enforcement investigations.

5 Recommendations

- 5.1 To determine the application for a variation of the premises licence under Section 34 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 5.2 If the Committee grants the application it should be subject to:
 - conditions prepared by the Licensing Officer which are consistent with the Operating Schedule (see appendix 4)
 - ii. any conditions deemed appropriate by the Committee to promote the four licensing objectives.(see appendix 4)

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

- No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
 - at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- All door supervisors shall be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.
- 4. The admission of children to the exhibition of a film shall be restricted in accordance with the recommendation of a film classification body as defined in the Video Recordings Act 1984 or Islington Council acting as the licensing authority where it has given notice in section 20(3) of the Licensing Act 2003.

There are further 'Mandatory conditions' applicable to licences authorising the supply of alcohol. A full list of the current mandatory conditions is available from the licensing pages on Islington's web site, www.islington.gov.uk. This list is subject to change by order of the Secretary of State and licensees and other responsible persons are advised to ensure they are aware of the latest conditions.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

- 1. The premises shall enforce a proof of age scheme, which is approved by the Licensing Authority and by the Local Police.
- The premises shall have a maximum capacity of 20.
- There shall be no deliveries of alcohol between the hours of 18:00 and 08:00 the following day.
- 4. The premises shall be a member of the local shop watch.
- Staff shall be trained to use fire-fighting equipment.

I am a resident of Horsell road and I object to the change in the licence to Le Peche Mignon, Ground Floor Shop at 6 Ronalds Road.

My objection is on the grounds of the prevention of a public nuisance and also the protection of children from harm. This shop is in a residential road and there is already a problem with people taking drinks from the local pub The Horatia and sitting drinking at the corner of Ronalds Road and Horsell Road where there are low walls to sit on. The clear purpose of this extension is the extended sale of alcohol and this would, in my view, result in an increased public nuisance, particularly when the licence extends to 22:00 hrs.

I have a further ground for objection which is the increased exposure of young people to alcohol. We have sufficient outlets for alcohol already in the neighbourhood, and an additional one, particularly in a residential street, would result in young people having further access to alcohol. This is already a significant health issue among young people in the UK and further consumption should not be encouraged by the council. For health implications see:

Re: Comment against Premises Licence Application Variation, submitted by Le Peche Mignon, Ground Floor Shop at 6 Ronalds Road, Islington, London N5 1XH.

At present the Le Peche Mignon is only selling alcohol to be consumed off the premises.

Of special concern is the application to allow for alcohol consumption on the premises until 22:00.

The Le Peche Mignon usually closes at about 17:30.

I am concerned about the the late night use of garden area of Le Peche Mignon. Our garden and back of the house, as well as the front of our house are close to the back garden of Le Peche Mignon. At present we hear patrons of the cafe talking, babies crying, children getting excited, cups and plates being put on tables and cleared away in the garden of Le Peche Mignon and this stops before 17:30. Were the use of the garden of Le Peche Mignon extended later it would be a real nuisance to us. This is a residential area where many small outdoor spaces abut. We all need a bit of peace to wind down and recover in the evenings and early nights. People sitting out in the garden of Le Peche Mignon and consuming alcohol would bring unrest and pressure to these small outside spaces. The nuisance that I expect stems both from the business activity in this constricted space extending into the evening and night, as well as from the fact that people will be drinking alcohol and thus become less inhibited and raise their voices, have merry arguments and loud conversations accompanied by bursts of loud laughter. All of this is a severe disturbance to the residential neighbourhood.

Since the garden of Le Peche Mignon is so close to our property, I fear we would not only experience the disturbance originating from the evening and early night use of their garden in our outside space, but also inside our house. I fear that we would have to keep our windows closed in an attempt to avoid the bustle from the garden of Le Peche Mignon. And I expect that even if we did keep our windows shut, we would still hear the presence of voices, laughter and so forth that would originate from the patrons of Le Peche Mignon. I fear we would have no way of getting away from the noise originating in the garden of Le Peche Mignon.

I am also concerned about the potential increase in smells: At present we are exposed to bakery smells about one to one and a half hours before the opening time of the cafe, coffee smells on

occasion at all times during the day and, often in the mornings or just before midday additional cooking smells. Clearly the ventilation of the cafe is not designed to take away the smells from neighbouring properties. If alcohol consumption was permitted on the premises I fear that the offer in the type of food on the premises might change with it and that more restaurant type cooking might occur. These smells are potentially much more intense and might be generated over a much more extended period than at present. These smells would drift over our garden and bathe us in them. It would also mean that we would not be able to freely air our house in the evening, which is quite a necessity especially in the summer. Currently, when the bakery smells drift over our property, we close our back door and windows to the back of the house, because they would otherwise suffuse our indoor spaces too.

It is also quite possible that the noise from the potential restaurant style cooking would cause a problem for us and for the residential area: Currently we hear the coffee machine and cutlery and cups on the tables; were cooking to take place at Le Peche Mignon, I expect we would hear the kitchen and cooking noises, which I expect would be much more imposing than at present. I expect the kitchen area would be to the back of the premises of Le Peche Mignon and this is where we are closest.

I am also concerned about the toilet arrangement in Le Peche Mignon. As I understand it the toilets are not inside the main area of the premises but in a separate block in the garden of Le Peche Mignon. This means that any patron wishing to use the toilets in the evening and at night will have to open the back door of the main building of Le Peche Mignon, walk to the toilet and back again. The potential for noise of the opening and closing of the doors, of noise spilling out from inside the main area of the premises whilst the door is opened and closed or left open altogether is great. This would be so all year round. And indeed, leaving the back door open could be part of ventilating the main space inside the premises, again letting smells and noise escape. The noise levels are of great concern if alcohol is served and consumed on the premises.

All of this has a strong potential to cause a nuisance to us and the other neighbours in the immediate vicinity of Le Peche Mignon and for these reasons, I hope you will deny the application to consume alcohol on the premises of Le Peche Mignon at any time.

As far as extending the hours of selling alcohol for consumption off the premises goes, I feel we have more than enough alcohol selling places in very close vicinity to Le Peche Mignon. I am concerned that people might buy alcohol and enjoy it nearby — we already find people sitting on our garden wall enjoying the coffee from Le Peche Mignon. I would not wish this to be extended to people consuming alcohol and least of all later in the evening. I am not confident that I would ask people drinking alcohol to move on and would not wish to suffer their conversations or extended phone calls (as at present on occasion), loud and clearly audible inside my house.

For these reasons I hope you will deny the application to extend the current licensing hours for the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises of Le Peche Mignon.

I want to object to the proposed change in the licensing for Le Peche Mignon to allow them to sell alcohol so late at night. We already have public nuisance issues with people hanging around in the street, particularly before and after football matches. So my objection is on the grounds of public nuisance. The issue of young people having more access to alcohol is also a concern.



Licensing Act 2003, – Premises Licence Application, Variation. Re: Le Péché Mignon, Ground floor shop at 6 Ronalds Road, N5 1XH

Dear Madam, Sir,

Le Péché Mignon's actual hours of opening to the public are currently 8am-5.3opm Monday to Saturday and 9am-5pm on Sundays. Le Péché Mignon offers seating both inside the café and outside in its rear garden at 6 Ronalds Road. In addition, it has a couple of benches on the pavement. The café is in operation all week and for all but a few days in the year.



The rear garden area of Le Péché Mignon is less than 15 m from the rear of 15 Horsell Road and a similar distance from the front of 15 Horsell Road (using the scale on Google Maps).

The plan above shows the proximity of Le Péché Mignon to my home.

My comments below relate to the licensing objective of the prevention of public nuisance.

My concerns are that the proposed variation to Le Péché Mignon's current licence cannot meet the council's Licensing Policy 21 in respect of "odour, smells and smoke; noise; outside drinking, eating and smoking", and Policy 22 in respect of "protecting the amenity of residents" and "undue disturbance".

So far, the council's cumulative impact policy has restricted the consumption of alcohol to many café/restaurant establishments along Holloway Road, without the use of rear gardens (if they exist for those establishments). It seems to me that the proposed variation to Le Péché Mignon's licence would be a break from the way this policy has protected residents because the café sits in an otherwise wholly residential area and uses its garden as part of its operations, including both as a seating area for customers and access to a toilet for the use of customers.

I cannot interpret from the application form what the hours of opening to the public may become if the Variation is granted without any conditions, but my objection concerns the expectation of evening opening with the consumption of alcohol accompanied with food, up to 10pm, taking place in Le Péché Mignon's garden.

At present, when the weather is good enough for Le Péché Mignon's clientele to choose to sit in the garden, there is a hubbub of conversation that passes along the backs of those properties in Ronalds Road and Horsell Road that are close to the café.

My home, at 15 Horsell Road, is within 15 metres of Le Péché Mignon, so the noise generated by this use of Le Péché Mignon's garden is clearly heard. If the licence is granted, I would expect the noise from the café to increase in duration and in perceived volume: this would be especially true for its volume in the evening as a result of alcohol-induced exuberance but also when ambient noise levels within the area bounded by Holloway, Ronalds and Horsell Roads and Fieldway Crescent have reduced significantly. Evening opening would, therefore, produce an additional, negative impact on my amenity and would be really disturbing to my family life in a way that I could not say it is at present, even though I would prefer the garden of the café not to be used for the consumption of food and beverages even under the present licence.

I do not feel it is appropriate for a business like Le Péché Mignon, that uses its garden for seating customers, to be situated in such a tight residential setting with the type of licence it has applied for. It is the only shop on its side of Ronalds Road. All other properties are residential, as they are in Horsell Road, too. Neither does any of the businesses in this stretch of Holloway Road, or Fieldway Crescent, use an outdoor area as part of its trading operations. This keeps the residential area quiet and is part of its character which would be upset by noise coming from Le Péché Mignon's garden and, I must add, an increase in the number of cars parking in Horsell Road

near my house and departing during the evening. The noises associated with such vehicles would not be aggressively antisocial, I suspect, but antisocial nonetheless.

If the garden were not used, I would not object to the consumption of alcohol at Le Péché Mignon, though I wish to say there is for my family an associated issue concerning the smells of cooking done at the café.

At present there is the daily smell of baking food starting from around 6.30am-7am and continuing off and on during opening hours. I believe there is no extraction system installed at the café to vent the smells at a high level, which there should be in my opinion. If the café is to extend its trading up to 10pm, or even into the early evening, the increase in cooking smells would be an unpleasant imposition on my home, both indoors on all floors and outside in the garden because the local air currents push them my way.

It may be worth mentioning in this context that the owner of the former launderette at 2 Ronalds Road, did install such high level extraction at the insistence of the council and this was successful in removing laundry smells that had blighted nearby properties. (There is now a ground floor flat at 2 Ronalds Road that has replaced the launderette.)

Before a variation to the licence is decided, I ask that the council considers both noise and smell in a joined-up way. From a resident's point of view, the two are part and parcel of the effect the variation to the licence that has been applied for would have on nearby residents.

I ask the council to refuse the application in its current form.

Dear Resident,

We received a copy of your representation sent to the Licensing Department of Islington Council against the variation to our current alcohol licence and wanted to write to you to address the issues in the representations.

We note that you have the following concerns which relate to the four licensing objectives. I will summarise below:

- Late night noise including use of the garden
- Increase exposure of young people to alcohol
- People hanging around in the local area
- Increase in smells
- Increase of car traffic to local area

Whilst we recognise the points you list are clearly genuinely held concerns from a local resident we would like to reassure you that we are also locals (we live above the premises) with a young family so it is in our interest to ensure that the variation to the licence does not negatively impact on our neighbourhood in any way.

Le Péché Mignon is owned by husband and wife team Ludovic Blind and Mairead Gallagher. We started out in Ronalds Road in December 2006 and have been licensed for off sales of alcohol since August 2007. Our focus has always been to serve the best products Europe has to offer. We search out food from small, quality producers. We sell larder items like coffee, oil, preserves and also fresh goods such as cheese, cured meats, bread and pastries. Coffee and pastries are our biggest sellers and the majority of all our sales are take away. We also currently sell, for off sales only, a wonderful selection of organic and biodynamic wines from the leading wine importer Les Caves de Pyrene and beer from local microbreweries. Our wine list champions small, independent winemakers. We offer a small café menu for either take away or to enjoy around our communal table. Weather permitting, we have a few seats outside in our back garden. We decided to apply to change our licence to include on sales as offering a glass of wine or beer to enjoy alongside our current menu seemed like a natural progression.

Over the past 12 years we have come to know our clientele very well and our business will never be alcohol led. In the first instance we are very small and do not have the space. Secondly, given the specialist nature of the wine and beer we sell our offering would only really appeal to natural wine enthusiasts. We have been selling off sales for almost 11 years and have never had a problem. Our team of staff is well trained to protect young people and the cost would be prohibitive. With regards to football and the impact us selling alcohol would have on match days we have gained lots of experience with match day crowds. We have a small, loyal football crowd but it is mostly families and those wanting to avoid the crowds. Alcohol would only be sold with food from our menu and given our size we are not able to accommodate large groups.

We know that the conditions offered in the application are satisfactory because no responsible authority representations were received in connection with this application. A responsible authority includes various local authority bodies including the Police, Trading Standards, Environmental Health, The licensing department itself, Public Health, Safeguarding children, the licensing enforcement department and Planning.

We assume you are aware of the various other licensed premises in our local area, all of which have licensed trading hours in excess of those we have requested.

The very robust list of licensing conditions offered within the licensing application (as listed below) address all four of the licensing objectives and are designed to prevent any problems - the framing of the conditions also follow preferred wording recommended by Islington Licensing department/Police:

One of the main concerns raised in correspondence (people hanging around drinking in the local area) relate in the main to potential incidents that would occur away from our premises and therefore outside our direct control and would in any case be normally associated with persons already intoxicated. People have access to cheap alcohol at any number of outlets in the area. Our offering does not fall into this category and our staff would ensure that alcohol is not served to those that are clearly inebriated.

Specifically to the concerns raised we say:

- Late night noise from the garden Our application at 22:00 which is well within the framework hours.
- Increase exposure of young people to alcohol We have opted to adopt and promote Challenge 25 to ensure we protect young people. We will only be selling specialist wine and beer. Children and minors are accompanied by parents.
- People hanging around in the local area see above.

- Increase in smells There will be no change to our current café menu. Size again is limited and we have no capacity or desire to start producing elaborate restaurant style food. The ethos of Le Péché Mignon is simple food.
- Increase of car traffic to local area Our clientele is 90% repeat local customers who live nearby and have no need to drive. Current parking restrictions in Ronalds Road would be enough of a deterrent.

We hope the comments and observations detailed above will dispel the fears you anticipate. If this is the case we would respectfully invite you to withdraw your representation. However should we be able to assist you further we would be happy to correspond again via the local authority.
