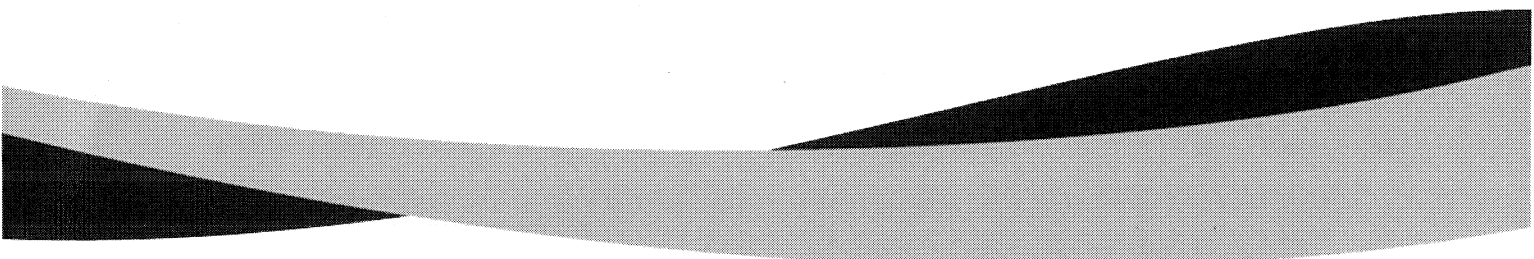

Re: RED SEA, 196A SEVEN SISTERS ROAD, LONDON, N4 3NX

1. Synopsis

- 1.1 This is an application for a new premise licence under the Licensing Act 2003.
- 1.2 The new application is for:
 - Recorded music, anything of similar description namely Karaoke, and the sale of alcohol on Sunday to Thursday 09:00 until Midnight, and Friday and Saturday from 09:00 until 01:00 the day following.
 - Late night refreshment from 23:00 until Midnight, and Friday and Saturday from 23:00 until 01:00 the day following.

3. Background

3.1 Papers are attached as follows:-

Appendix 1: application form;

Appendix 2: representations;

Appendix 3: suggested conditions and map of premises location.

3.2 This is an amended version of an application originally submitted on 17 November 2014. The original application was for Recorded music, anything of similar description namely Karaoke, the sale of alcohol on Sunday, and late night refreshment until 04:00 each day.

3.3 All the representations submitted were subject to the original application, although the amended application was re-advertised by notice on the premises as the original notice did not comply with the regulations.

3.4 The premises has been subject to a number of multi-agency visits prior to making the first application, the most concerning aspect of these visits was the tendency of the management of the premises to lock people inside the premises until the very early hours with metal shutters down. This was all captured on the Council CCTV cameras and was also reported to the Fire Brigade. A joint visit was conducted by all agencies on the 20 September 2014.

3.5 The premises were warned about their requirements under the Fire Regulatory Reform Order, but no licensable activities were witness by officers. In addition the Local Police Inspector attended Highbury Magistrates on 17th December using powers under the ASB Act to close the premises for 24 hours on the 16th December before being granted a further 3 month closure order by the courts on 17th.

3.6 The applicants did meet with the Police prior to amending the application now that this closure notice has expired. The Police have responded that in principle if the licence was to be issued with all the agreed suggested conditions, they could not support a licence with hours later than 23:00 or midnight at the latest on Friday and Saturday.

4. Planning Implications

4.1 The application concerns the sale of alcohol at what is stated as being a social club, which would fall under a sui generis use class. Records indicate that the lawful use of the premise is as a cafe/shop under use class A3/A1. The use as a social club would require planning permission and it would therefore appear to be unauthorised under planning.

5 Recommendations

5.1 To determine the application for a new premises licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.

5.2 If the Committee grants the application it should be subject to:

- i. conditions prepared by the Licensing Officer which are consistent with the Operating Schedule (see appendix 3)
- ii. any conditions deemed appropriate by the Committee to promote the four licensing objectives.(see appendix 3)
- iii. any conditions deemed necessary by the Committee to promote the four licensing objectives.

6 Conclusion and reasons for recommendations

6.1 The Council is required to consider this application in the light of all relevant information, and if approval is given, it may attach such conditions as appropriate to promote the licensing objectives.

M Describe the steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives:

a) General – all four licensing objectives (b, c, d and e) (please read guidance note 9)

Red sea (Bar & Cafe) Limited has procedures and policies leading to strive its business model in-order to achieve its objectives.

The managers of the company are well experienced in various trading activities. Mr. Merhawi Berhe, the managing director of the company has worked with Starbucks and other high street branded cafes and bars and his experience stood out with merits to perform well in our company that we are intending to establish as a formidable and decent bar and cafe.

The secretary of the company who is also the DPS has various training in the fields of Alcohol trading and security. He is dedicated to bring all the necessary discipline and required adherence to the councils trading policies and he in constant contact with police and other interested community group for consultation and advice. He has a good interpersonal relationships with neighbours and customers and this has already gained him a considerable appreciation and backing by the immediate nearby residents for what we intending to do.

The company has deployed all the necessary staff training, policies, procedures, equipment, told and finance to make sure that we do business with the intention of preventing of crime and disorder, maintain public safety (including fire safety), avoid and dedicate to prevent a public nuisance and also dedicate ourselves to protect children from any harm.

We are fully aware of the density of population in the vicinity of Finsbury area and we choose to operate here based on our extensive experience and awareness of the community, residents and the police and local authority needs.

We have the capacity to perform well in public protection, controlling crowds, insulating and air conditioning our premises, sound prove for any noise reduction and banning drugs and overall protecting the community and children at all times. The premises have various notices, well insulated and maintained. It has also all required fire exits and well maintained even surface floor with all round fire drills and hose clearly visible exits and instructions at all times.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

Our staff are taking few courses on door supervision and we are intending to deploy correctly registered door supervisors with the SIA who are will display the correct name badge and intending to use at a ratio to be agreed by the Police and Local Authority.

CCTV is installed and working to the satisfaction of the Police and Local Authority and we are contacting constantly with PC Richard Padwell for guidance. We have procedures in place to make sure that all instances of crime and disorder will be reported to the police and the CCTV records will be kept and we will make sure all police requirements be complied with at all times.

We have a procedure in place to make sure that all bottles (other than those where it is not intended that the contents are consumed direct from the bottle) will be made of plastic; If glass bottles are used, the contents will be decanted into plastic or toughened glass. We have trained staff not to admit any customers carrying open or sealed bottles or glasses to the premises at any time. We do not permit our customers to take open containers of alcoholic or soft drinks from the premises and all bottles and glasses will be removed from public areas as soon as they are finished with or empty.

Our capacity consideration will be given to setting capacity limits to prevent overcrowding which could lead to crime and disorder; This capacity figure will be based on advice from the Police, Fire or local authority and we have already a limit of 50. At times we will deploy a door supervisor to ensure the capacity limits are controlled.

c) Public safety

While we have measures to prevent the crime and disorder, we have also a responsibility and a policy to prevent the public, our staff have enough training and awareness and our business is clearly made a notice prevent drug use and an anti drug policy agreed by the Police and local authority will be in force In addition Crime prevention notices will be displayed warning customers of the prevalence which may target them, eg "bags should not be left unattended", "watch out for pick-pockets" of crime with a detailed "customer code of conduct" poster will be displayed warning customers that if they act in an inappropriate manner, they could be barred from all licensed premises in the vicinity and we have a policy no admissions for children.

Our Fire exist are clearly marked and always kept to the required level of safety and we make sure that all exit doors will be easily openable without the use of a key, card, code or similar means and will be available for egress while the public are on the premises; Means of escape will be maintained unobstructed, immediately available and clearly identifiable; Exit doors will be regularly checked to ensure they function satisfactorily. Records of these checks will be kept and produced on request.

We have adequate and appropriate supply of first aid equipment and materials will be available on the premises in order to maintain staff and public safety. There is also a clean water available for all the public use at all times. Our lighting system and the electricity and gas in the premises are certified and checked annually to make sure that there is adequate lighting and the functionality is appropriate to keep public and customer safety.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

We have also measures directed at preventing public and neighbourhood from nuisance. Noise or vibration will not be audible at the façade of any noise sensitive premises; Doors and windows will be kept closed whenever necessary; Noise limiters on amplification equipment will be used Prominent, clear and legible notices will be displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly; The use of explosives, pyrotechnics and fireworks of a similar nature which could cause disturbance in surrounding areas will be restricted; The placing of bottles into receptacles outside the premises will take place at times that will minimise disturbance to nearby properties; For the final hour of opening the music will be discernibly quieter; The playing of live or recorded music in garden areas of the premises will not be permitted after a specified time (please specify time); Noxious smells from licensed premises will not cause a nuisance to nearby properties; Premises will be adequately vented to prevent nuisance from noxious smells; Flashing or bright lights on or outside licensed premises will not cause a nuisance to nearby properties A "no smoking at the bar" rule will be enforced; A crime prevention policy agreed by the police and Licensing Authority will be in place; A sufficient number of suitable receptacles for refuse storage will be provided. These will have properly fitted covers; The receptacles will be maintained in a clean condition; Nearby streets will be monitored after 11pm to ensure that patrons are not littering the streets and/or residents' property or causing a nuisance to residents; Patrons will be prevented from eating and drinking immediately outside the premises after 11pm; Any queues inside or outside the premises will be monitored by a member of staff to ensure compliance with the licensing objectives

e) The protection of children from harm

We are engaged in preventing children from any premises with known associations with heavy or binge or underage drinking, drugs, or any activity or entertainment of a clearly adult or sexual nature.

In our premises, access will not be permitted for children under 18 years and we make sure any under 18s will be asked for ID to confirm their age and not allow them to either enter or use the premises. We will also advice them not to stand outside the premises and avoid being nuisance to the public. We will advice them not to visit the area as it might not be suitable for their leisure and we intend to take to protect children from harm A "no smoking at the bar" rule will be enforced.



The shop is clearly marked with various exit areas and enough lighting. As it is based on assisting individuals as its main ethos, every one is very friendly and helpful with one another.

The shop has a policy of no children and no smoking inside or within the vicinity of the premises.

When we started, we have renovated the shop and barred even Kat users well before the ban legislation introduced.

With reference to the above application, I am writing to inform you that the Metropolitan Police, as a Responsible Authority, will be objecting to this application as it is our belief that if granted the application would undermine the Licensing Objectives, being the Prevention of Crime and Disorder.

The venue is situated in the designated 'Finsbury Park/Holloway Cumulative Impact Area'; a locality where there is traditionally high crime and disorder. There are over twenty licensed premises within a 250m radius of your proposed venue. Islington has almost double the national average of licensed premises per resident, and this is why the Police supported the implementation of the Council's Cumulative Impact Policy. This large number of licensed premises and the issues associated with these impacts greatly on the Police and all other emergency service's resources.

The crimes associated with your venue over the last few months are an excellent example of why the cumulative impact zone was originally introduced. The following information is taken from police crime reports, 'the venue' being 196A Seven Sisters Road – Sham Café.

August 2014 – at 0455 am. Offence alleged - ABH

A heavily intoxicated male is involved in a fight at the venue, he is punched in the face, resulting in two loose teeth.

August 2014 – at 0200 am. Offence alleged – GBH

The victim arrives at the venue, (by his own admission) very drunk. He becomes involved in an argument during which he is punched in the face, receives cuts to his hand and is threatened by a male armed with a bottle.

September 2014 – at 0530 am. Offence alleged – ABH

The victim becomes involved in an argument inside the venue which eventually calms, he walks out of the venue to smoke and is confronted by who he states is the owner, Mr Zaid BERAKI. He alleges that Mr BERAKI, during the ensuing argument slaps him in the face causing cuts.

November 2014 – at 0055 am. Offence – Common Assault.

Mr Zaid BERAKI calls police alleging that he has been assaulted. During the initial investigation he refuses to assist police in looking for the suspect. Later in the ongoing investigation he refuses to provide the police with a statement, bringing the investigation to a close.

Putting aside the numerous non-disclosable police intelligence reports and alleged illegal sales of alcohol at the venue; if a premises licence did exist at the premises, these four incidents alone would undoubtedly trigger a review of that said licence.

It is also interesting to note that in your supporting documentation you state that the venue is an advisory centre to families on a various number of issues. If indeed that be so, then why is a licence to sell alcohol required, let alone until 0400 am?

As a proposed licence holder we would expect to have a good working relationship with you, the fact that you refused to assist in a police investigation in the very same month you applied for a licence, does not bode well.

Quoting from your supporting documentation;

"We always consider a monthly risk assessment and Mr Zaid Beraki briefs his staff of any changes and the staff meeting conveys how to influence customer behaviour, how to reduce the opportunities for crime and disorder in order to secure the best practice in public safety and controlling disorder if any".

I would suggest that considering the level of crime taking place at your venue you may wish to seek the assistance of the police in learning, *"how to influence customer behaviour and how to reduce the opportunities for crime and disorder"*. As your monthly risk assessment meetings do not appear to be having any effect. We are here to help Mr Beraki, please make use of us.

Whilst these incidents and attitudes continue, the police strongly object to your application for a new premises licence and propose that it is refused

I write with reference to your recent submission of a draft application, and our meeting two weeks ago.

Firstly, I suggest that you draw your hours back to within the Islington Licensing Policy guidelines. That is closing at 2300 Sunday to Thursday, and midnight Friday to Saturday.

Furthermore I suggest you offer the following extensive list of conditions;

1.
CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. Maintained means that the system will be regularly serviced (at least once a year) and checked every two weeks to ensure that it is storing images correctly and a log kept and signed by a Supervisor to this effect. The system will provide an identifiable full head and shoulder image of everyone entering the premises and will operate in any light conditions within the premises. The system will cover the full exterior of the premises and shall record in real time, date and time stamped and will operate whilst the premises is open for licensable activities. The recordings will be kept for a minimum of 31 days and copies will be made available to an Authorised Officer or a Police Officer (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998) within 24hrs of any request free of charge. There will always be a member of staff on duty who can operate the system, to allow Officers to view recordings and if required by a Police Officer, provide a copy of images immediately free of charge to assist in the immediate investigation of offences. If the system malfunctions and will not be operating for longer than one day of business then Police must be informed.
2.
A. If a customer is found to be in possession of what you or your staff consider to be personal use drugs. The drugs are confiscated and sealed in a police evidence bag, timed, dated and signed by the staff member seizing. Request details of the person you are seizing the drugs from, and for your security and evidential purposes make a CCTV capture of the seizure. The customer is ejected/banned from the venue. The seized drugs are then placed in the safe. An entry is placed in the 'drug seizure log', which is also kept in the safe. This entry will detail, the time, date, person seizing and the number of the police evidence bag.
B. If a customer is found to be in possession of what you or your staff believe to be a quantity of drugs for more than just personal possession/suspected of dealing. The customer is detained and police are called. The drugs are confiscated and sealed in a police evidence bag. For your security and evidential purposes make a CCTV capture of the seizure. Make available any CCTV footage of the incident to police, as per licence conditions It is your responsibility to inform the police when you have drugs to be collected. You will need to contact officers from the local neighbourhood team in order for the drugs to be collected. Officers collecting the drugs will sign the 'drug seizure log' to state they have been removed from your safe.
3.
An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to the police or an authorised officer, which will record the following:
 - a. All crimes reported to the venue
 - b. Any complaints received
 - c. Any incidents of disorder
 - d. Any faults in the CCTV system
 - e. Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service

4.
There shall be a personal licence holder on duty on the premises at all times when the premises are authorised to sell alcohol.
5.
At least 1 SIA licensed door supervisor shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises at all times whilst it is open for business after 2100 hours on a Thursday, Friday and Saturday until 30 minutes after the venue has closed. (I suggest that for the first few weeks while customers get used to the new regime, it would be good practice to employ two SIA DS)
6.
All persons visiting or re-entering the premises after 2100 hours will be subject to a search by means of an electronic hand held wand. If the search wand is activated or at the discretion of staff, then physically searched, which will include a 'pat down search' and a full bag search. There will be at least 2 fully functional wands in use at the premises.
7.
Door Supervisors to display their SIA licence by means of a luminous arm band.
8.
All staff engaged outside the entrance to the premises, or supervising or controlling queues, shall wear high visibility yellow jackets or vests.
9.
Door Supervisors Register – A register shall be maintained recording all SIA door supervisors employed at the premises. This shall include their name, badge number, the agency they work for (if any) and the time they start and finish work.
10.
Management shall take a photocopy of all door staff SIA badges and secure them in a personnel folder and place this in the safe.
11.
All drinking vessels used in the venue shall be polycarbonate. All alcohol in glass bottles are to be decanted into polycarbonate containers or polycarbonate carafes prior to being served
12.
Customers shall enter or leave the premises by the main front door to the premises, except in the event of an emergency.
13.
Notices shall be displayed reminding patrons to use the toilets before exiting the premises.
14.
Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
15.
A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
16.
There shall be no accompanied children under 18 years on the premises at any time and no children after 23.00.

17.

A record shall be kept detailing all refused sales of alcohol. The record should include the date and time of the refused sale and the name of the member of staff who refused the sale. The record shall be available for inspection at the premises by the police or an authorised officer of the City Council at all times whilst the premises is open.

18.

Patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke, shall not be permitted to take any drinks in any vessel with them.

19.

The premises licence holder shall ensure that any patrons smoking outside the premises do so in an orderly manner and are supervised by staff so as to ensure that there is no public nuisance or obstruction of the public highway.

20.

In the event that an assault is committed on the premises (or appears to have been committed) the management will immediately ensure that: (a) The police (and, where appropriate, the London Ambulance Service) are called without delay; (b) All measures that are reasonably practicable are taken to apprehend any suspects pending the arrival of the police; (c) The crime scene is preserved so as to enable a full forensic investigation to be carried out by the police; and (d) Such other measures are taken (as appropriate) to fully protect the safety of all persons present on the premises.

21.

The number of persons permitted in the premises at any one time (including staff) shall not exceed 50 persons.

The Planning & Development section have the following comments to make in relation to the above:

The application concerns the sale of alcohol at what is stated as being a social club, which would fall under a sui generis use class. Records indicate that the lawful use of the premise is as a cafe/shop under use class A3/A1. The use as a social club would require planning permission and it would therefore appear to be unauthorised. Furthermore, it is not understood why a social club, which in the supporting documentation is described as providing advice to refugees and young families on issues such as housing and benefits, would need to serve alcohol to 4am every day of the week. The planning department therefore objects to the application and has opened an enforcement case to investigate the matter further.

Please note that these comments are based solely on the information provided on the licensing application form and do not constitute a guarantee that planning permission is not required. If the applicant requires formal confirmation that no planning permission is needed for the activities described in the licence application, they are recommended to submit an application for a certificate of lawfulness under Sections 191-2 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (as amended).



I'm just wondering what steps we need to take to tackle a disturbance issue at Sham Café 196 Seven sisters rd. My husband and I live in (REDACTED INFORMATION AS TO WHERE THE RESIDENT LIVES IN RELATION TO THE CAFE) and are struggling to get to sleep due to shouting all hours of the night from customers of the café outside the premises.

I don't what licensing the café has regarding opening hours but it seems to vary a lot. Some week days it will just be closing at 5am in the morning. We have had to report 2 incidents to the police. One was on the 1st June at 6.13am in the morning where the café was just shutting up after a night of noise and the last customers were leaving. there was a group of 4 men fighting, one started saying he had a gun, at that point the café owner ran off and left them to it and the fight continued up and down the street. This morning my husband called the police at around 5.30 am as yet again there was a disturbance with people who had been in the café, they kicked a random pedestrian to the ground then headed to the shop across the road. Police went over and spoke to them, apparently there should be cctv footage of the incident so we will see what happens there.

Could you tell me what steps I need to take next please, ie do I need to be documenting and for how long?

Suggested noise conditions if Committee are minded to grant the premises licence for Sham café, 196A Seven Sisters Road

They have applied for recorded music as regulated entertainment until 04:00. If there is any intention for events at the premises involving anything other than ambient levels of sound, (there is a reference to customers wanting to dance on the application) we recommend the following noise conditions should be applied:

- The licensee shall appoint a noise consultant registered with the Institute of Acoustics or Association of Noise Consultants to prepare a scheme of sound insulation and noise control measures, to include the installation of a noise limiting device, to prevent persons in the neighbourhood from being unreasonably disturbed by noise from the premises. The scheme shall be submitted for approval by the Council and the approved scheme fully implemented to the satisfaction of the Council prior to regulated entertainments being permitted at the premises.
- The licensee shall limit sound levels so as not to exceed maximum levels to be agreed with the Council's Noise team prior to the premises being used for regulated entertainment.
- A noise limiting device shall be installed and the entertainment noise control system shall be monitored, checked and calibrated as necessary, so that the levels approved by the Council are not exceeded.
- The controls for the entertainment noise control system shall be located in a secure, lockable cupboard or similar location. The entertainment noise control system is to be

independent of control by persons other than the licensee. Access to the entertainment noise control system is to be restricted to the Licensee or a designated manager.

- The noise limiting device shall be recalibrated as necessary to ensure that sound levels do not exceed the agreed maximums.
- When regulated entertainment is provided by way of music and dancing and continues past midnight, an SIA registered door supervisor shall be employed at the premises to patrol outside to minimise any disturbance from customers arriving and departing and to supervise customers outside who may wish to smoke and assist with the dispersal of customers at closing time. The door supervisor shall work until 30 minutes after the premises closes or until all customers have left the area.
- A dispersal policy shall be implemented at the premises in agreement with the Noise Team.

The plan submitted shows no private frontage outside the premises. The application is for the consumption of alcohol on the premises only.

- Drinks shall not be permitted to be taken outside the premises at any time.
- Customers shall not be permitted to take drinks off the premises if they wish to step outside to smoke

Other suggested conditions in relation to general noise are as follows:

- All deliveries and disposal/collections of refuse shall be prohibited between the hours of 23:00 – 07:00.
- There shall be no bottling out between the hours of 23:00 – 07:00.

To whom it may concern

I would like to object to this application for the following main reason: the presence of a licensed premise in that stretch of Seven Sisters Road would make issues of street noise and agitation more acute.

The widespread young community resident in the estates around the area creates problems of noise and street safety very frequently. Both myself and some of my neighbours had to call the police in the past in order to remove young people who were shouting and drinking on the street late at night (3-4am).

A licensed premise selling alcohol and food and providing entertainment every weekday until 4am will make this problem increase. Young people will have more of a reason and a safe harbour to gather late at night, thus increasing the noise levels in the street.

Furthermore, public safety could be put into hazard by the presence of drunk people leaving late at night. Given the history of heavy catcalling and verbal assaults to women around that area, encouraging late night drinking for young men would be dangerous, and would send the wrong message to Islington citizens - that the Council is not looking after its residents.

Lastly, the performance of dancing, music and plays would not be monitored properly. It would be nearly impossible to control audio levels, and the venue would definitely not be sound proofed against loud music. Therefore people living in the flats directly above or around the venue would suffer greatly from loud noise, and many a sleepless night.

I do hope you will be able to take this objection into account when making a decision on whether to grant this licence or not.

I and 2 of my tenants who live at the above address met with Jeremy Corbyn MP on Friday 5th December 2014 @ 3pm to collectively object and make our complaints known on this application and all the constant and ongoing problems that our making the lives of my tenants almost unbearable due to the antisocial behaviour from many of the cafés and restaurants situated in Seven Sisters Road, around the corner from Yonge Park and from tenants living in social housing properties in Yonge Park, who are drunk and disorderly, throw rubbish, have parties to the early hours, buying drugs, urinating in front gardens, fighting and loud music!

Jeremy Corbyn MP, at our request will make an objection on our behalf, alongside myself and all the tenants living at _____

Public Nuisance:

There are already ongoing and constant problems with groups of young people, mainly young men gathering in Yonge Park, near and in the ally and hovering outside no 5 Yonge park and the police are fully aware of all these activities!

Obstructing the front gate and intimidating the tenants both male and female when they come home late in the evening.

The coming and going and slamming of car doors from the local taxi company, taking the car spaces of local residents.

They openly deal drugs on the road and from cars with their engines running until the early hours of the morning and also offer the services of prostitutes, the police are called almost on a daily basis as my tenants are exhausted from these disturbances throughout the night!

They urinate in the front gardens, throw rubbish, empty cans and often smash bottles and broken glass. The police sometimes do come and all they do is ask these groups to move on, only for a repeat the following night!

It has been noted and photos taken of these groups and it seems that these same groups of young men, also hang around outside and in the Sham Café and other cafes nearby!

Crime and Disorder

As noted above the daily open drug dealing throughout the night and sometimes during the day and the use of our front garden to gather and make lots of noise.

Fighting, shouting, raised voices, smashing bottles along Seven Sisters Road outside these so called cafes! Open drug dealing from cars with loud music and engines running throughout the night, and dealers actually speaking loudly on their mobiles!

One of my female tenants complained to them to turn the noise down and go away, she was threatened with a GUN pointed at her!!!! She called the police who are dealing with the situation, Jeremy Corbyn has been informed about this and is looking into it.

Intimidation outside the house, having to ask for permission to enter the property and having rude and sexual comments made, fearful of attack on your own doorstep is totally unacceptable!!!

Protection of Children from harm:

There are many young people, children and families living locally who do not need to be exposed to all these existing activities and problems and extending these hours will only exasperate and encourage further problems connected to drugs, prostitution and trafficking of young girls for prostitution and antisocial behaviour and disturbances!

I think the possible solution to many of these problems would be to close down these so called business's and encourage more community friendly business's to come into the area by raising the profile and not bringing it down!

With the regeneration of Finsbury Park which has been a very long time coming, surely its time that there is an investigation into business activities locally and in what way they benefit the local community!

More police presence in the area and more power given to them to enable them to deal with all this crime and disorder and support given to local residents who are having to live with all these problems on a daily basis!

At the outset I ask that my name remains anonymous for fear of repercussion. Having spoken to the People in the vicinity, I have been told that although they do want to object to this application and also complain to The Local Authority about the antisocial behaviour in the locality they are afraid that violence and harm will result if they do.

I therefore write to register my objection to the application for a premises licence at the above address. The basis for this objection is that granting a licence for a premises that for the last 5 years has been promoting the consumption of alcohol, drugs etc will not promote the licensing objectives especially the prevention of crime disorder and antisocial behaviour. Evidently, in the last 7/8 years our area has seen unprecedented levels of antisocial behaviour, including but not exclusively: Alcohol & drug abuse, Prostitution, Fly tipping, urinating on shop fronts, entrances and pavements,

vandalism, intimidating groups of people, verbal and abusive behaviour and noise pollution. What is also very important and should be emphasised is PARKING. Despite paying for a parking permit, just before 6pm there are appear to be an influx of vehicles in and around the area forcing the residents that just returned from shopping or from a hard day's work to an almost 1 mile hiking.

196 SEVEN SISTERS ROAD lies within Islington Local Authority's designated Cumulative impact areas and enabling the premises to sell and consume alcohol on or off the premises would be detrimental to its aims and objectives.

The application proposes:

Sell alcohol , whether to be consumed on the premises or elsewhere Monday to Sunday 11 to 04 the next day

Late night refreshments (i.e hot food and drink supplied Monday to Sunday 11 to 05 the next day

Recorded music Monday to Sunday 11 to 04 the next day

Performance of dancing Monday to Sunday 11 to 04 the next day

Performance of a play Monday to Sunday 11 to 04 the next day

We the residents and shop keepers in the area suffer noise nuisance, antisocial behaviour at all hours of the day and night and endure high levels of crime.

No licence should be granted within an area that evidently, crime disorder and public nuisance have already reached serious problem levels for the police , the residents and in fact has had a detrimental effect on the community as a whole .

In view of the above I urge the Licensing Authority to refuse the application

Issues of Concern

1. There has been a history of poor management and non-compliance with regulatory requirements associated with this premises for many years. It is acknowledged that the current applicant, Zaid Beraki, may not have had any previous involvement in the management of this premises and therefore his application should be judged on its merits.
2. The premises are in a cumulative impact area therefore the onus is on the applicant to demonstrate that this proposal will not undermine the licensing objective. The operating schedule fails to provide the required level of assurance.
3. The application section relating to Plays refers to games and card games.
4. The operating schedule suggests that the premises has never been the subject of a noise complaint however our records indicate that the council received 6 complaints about the noise of customers outside the premises in the earlier hours of the morning in June and July 2014.
5. The operating schedule indicates that there will be some level of control through the provision of a membership scheme and closing the premises to non-members after 11pm.
6. The operating schedule provides a lot of background information about the aims and objectives of the venue in terms of providing community based support activities. These activities will presumably take place during the day. There is very little detail about how the premises will operate outside the normal working day until 4am

Recommendation

In order to promote the licensing objectives I recommend that the application is refused.

Suggested conditions of approval consistent with the operating schedule

1. A number of premises staff shall be send on door supervision courses.
2. The licence holder shall deploy correctly registered door supervisors with the SIA who are will display the correct name badge and intending to use at a ratio to be agreed by the Police and Local Authority.
3. CCTV is installed and working to the satisfaction of the Police. The premise shall have procedures in place to make sure that all instances of crime and disorder will be reported to the police and the CCTV records will be kept and we will make sure all police requirements be complied with at all times.
4. The licence shall have procedures in place to make sure that all bottles (other than those where it is not intended that the contents are consumed direct from the bottle) will be made of plastics.
5. Where glass bottles are used, the contents will be decanted into plastic or toughened glass.
6. Staff shall be trained not to admit any customers carrying open or sealed bottles or glasses to the premises at any time.
7. The premises shall not permit our customers to take open containers of alcoholic or soft drinks from the premises and all bottles and glasses will be removed from public areas as soon as they are finished with or empty.
8. The capacity limit at the premises shall be restricted to 50 persons.
9. While we have measures to prevent the crime and disorder, we have also a responsibility and a policy to prevent the public, our staff have enough training and awareness and our business is clearly made a notice prevent drug use and an anti-drug policy agreed by the Police and local authority will be in force In addition Crime prevention notices will be displayed warning customers of the prevalence which may target them, eg "bags should not be left unattended", "watch out for pick-pockets" of crime with a detailed "customer code of conduct" poster will be displayed warning customers that if they act in an inappropriate manner, they could be barred from all licensed premises in the vicinity and we have a policy no admissions for children.
10. Our Fire exist are clearly marked and always kept to the required level of safety and we make sure that all exit doors will be easily open able without the use of a key, card, code or similar means and will be available for egress while the public are on the premises; Means of escape will be maintained unobstructed, immediately available and clearly identifiable; Exit doors will be regularly checked to ensure they function satisfactorily. Records of these checks will be kept and produced on request.
11. The licence holder will have adequate and appropriate supply of first aid equipment and materials will be available on the premises in order to maintain staff and public safety. There is also a clean water available for all the public use at all times.
12. Our lighting system and the electricity and gas in the premises are certified and checked annually to make sure that there is adequate lighting and the functionality is appropriate to keep public and customer safety.
13. The licence holder shall have also measures directed at preventing public and neighbourhood from nuisance. Noise or vibration will not be audible at the façade of any noise sensitive premises; Doors and windows will be kept closed whenever necessary.

14. Noise limiters on amplification equipment will be used Prominent, clear and legible notices will be displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly.
15. The use of explosives, pyrotechnics and fireworks of a similar nature which could cause disturbance in surrounding areas will be restricted.
16. The placing of bottles into receptacles outside the premises will take place at times that will minimise disturbance to nearby properties;
17. For the final hour of opening the music will be discernibly quieter.
18. The playing of live or recorded music in garden areas of the premises will not be permitted after a specified time (please specify time).
19. Noxious smells from licensed premises will not cause a nuisance to nearby properties;
20. Premises will be adequately vented to prevent nuisance from noxious smells.
21. Flashing or bright lights on or outside licensed premises will not cause a nuisance to nearby properties.
22. A "no smoking at the bar" rule will be enforced.
23. A crime prevention policy agreed by the police and Licensing Authority will be in place; A sufficient number of suitable receptacles for refuse storage will be provided. These will have properly fitted covers; The receptacles will be maintained in a clean condition.
24. Nearby streets will be monitored after 11pm to ensure that patrons are not littering the streets and/or residents' property or causing a nuisance to residents.
25. Patrons will be prevented from eating and drinking immediately outside the premises after 11pm.
26. Any queues inside or outside the premises will be monitored by a member of staff to ensure compliance with the licensing objectives
27. The premises shall be engaged in preventing children from any premises with known associations with heavy or binge or underage drinking, drugs, or any activity or entertainment of a clearly adult or sexual nature.
28. Access shall not be permitted for children under 18 years and The licence holder make sure any under 18s will be asked for ID to confirm their age and not allow them to either enter or use the premises.
29. Patrons shall be advised not to stand outside the premises and avoid being nuisance to the public.
30. Patrons shall be advised not to visit the area as it might not be suitable for their leisure and the licence holder intend to take to protect children from harm.
31. A "no smoking at the bar" rule will be enforced.

Conditions proposed by the Metropolitan Police

32. CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. Maintained means that the system will be regularly serviced (at least once a year) and checked every two weeks to ensure that it is storing images correctly and a log kept and signed by a Supervisor to this effect. The system will provide an identifiable full head and shoulder image of everyone entering the premises and will operate in any light conditions within the premises. The system will cover the full exterior of the premises and shall record in real time, date and time stamped and will operate whilst the premises is open for licensable activities. The recordings will be kept for a minimum of 31 days and copies will be made available to an Authorised Officer or a Police Officer (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998) within 24hrs of any request free of charge. There will always be a member of staff on duty who can operate the system, to allow Officers to view recordings and if required by a Police Officer, provide a

copy of images immediately free of charge to assist in the immediate investigation of offences. If the system malfunctions and will not be operating for longer than one day of business then Police must be informed.

33. If a customer is found to be in possession of what you or your staff consider to be personal use drugs. The drugs are confiscated and sealed in a police evidence bag, timed, dated and signed by the staff member seizing. Request details of the person you are seizing the drugs from, and for your security and evidential purposes make a CCTV capture of the seizure. The customer is ejected/banned from the venue. The seized drugs are then placed in the safe. An entry is placed in the 'drug seizure log', which is also kept in the safe. This entry will detail, the time, date, person seizing and the number of the police evidence bag.
34. If a customer is found to be in possession of what you or your staff believe to be a quantity of drugs for more than just personal possession/suspected of dealing. The customer is detained and police are called. The drugs are confiscated and sealed in a police evidence bag. For your security and evidential purposes make a CCTV capture of the seizure. Make available any CCTV footage of the incident to police, as per licence conditions
35. It is your responsibility to inform the police when you have drugs to be collected. You will need to contact officers from the local neighbourhood team in order for the drugs to be collected.
36. Officers collecting the drugs will sign the 'drug seizure log' to state they have been removed from your safe.
37. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to the police or an authorised officer, which will record the following:
 - a. All crimes reported to the venue
 - b. Any complaints received
 - c. Any incidents of disorder
 - d. Any faults in the CCTV system
 - e. Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service
38. There shall be a personal licence holder on duty on the premises at all times when the premises are authorised to sell alcohol.
39. At least 1 SIA licensed door supervisor shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises at all times whilst it is open for business after 2100 hours on a Thursday, Friday and Saturday until 30 minutes after the venue has closed. (I suggest that for the first few weeks while customers get used to the new regime, it would be good practice to employ two SIA DS)
40. All persons visiting or re-entering the premises after 2100 hours will be subject to a search by means of an electronic hand held wand. If the search wand is activated or at the discretion of staff, then physically searched, which will include a 'pat down search' and a full bag search. There will be at least 2 fully functional wands in use at the premises.
41. Door Supervisors to display their SIA licence by means of a luminous arm band.
42. All staff engaged outside the entrance to the premises, or supervising or controlling queues, shall wear high visibility yellow jackets or vests.
43. Door Supervisors Register – A register shall be maintained recording all SIA door supervisors employed at the premises. This shall include their name, badge number, the agency they work for (if any) and the time they start and finish work.
44. Management shall take a photocopy of all door staff SIA badges and secure them in a personnel folder and place this in the safe.

45. All drinking vessels used in the venue shall be polycarbonate. All alcohol in glass bottles are to be decanted into polycarbonate containers or polycarbonate carafes prior to being served
46. Customers shall enter or leave the premises by the main front door to the premises, except in the event of an emergency.
47. Notices shall be displayed reminding patrons to use the toilets before exiting the premises.
48. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
49. A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
50. There shall be no accompanied children under 18 years on the premises at any time and no children after 23.00.
51. A record shall be kept detailing all refused sales of alcohol. The record should include the date and time of the refused sale and the name of the member of staff who refused the sale. The record shall be available for inspection at the premises by the police or an authorised officer of the City Council at all times whilst the premises is open.
52. Patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke, shall not be permitted to take any drinks in any vessel with them.
53. The premises licence holder shall ensure that any patrons smoking outside the premises do so in an orderly manner and are supervised by staff so as to ensure that there is no public nuisance or obstruction of the public highway.
54. In the event that an assault is committed on the premises (or appears to have been committed) the management will immediately ensure that: (a) The police (and, where appropriate, the London Ambulance Service) are called without delay; (b) All measures that are reasonably practicable are taken to apprehend any suspects pending the arrival of the police; (c) The crime scene is preserved so as to enable a full forensic investigation to be carried out by the police; and (d) Such other measures are taken (as appropriate) to fully protect the safety of all persons present on the premises.
55. The number of persons permitted in the premises at any one time (including staff) shall not exceed 50 persons.

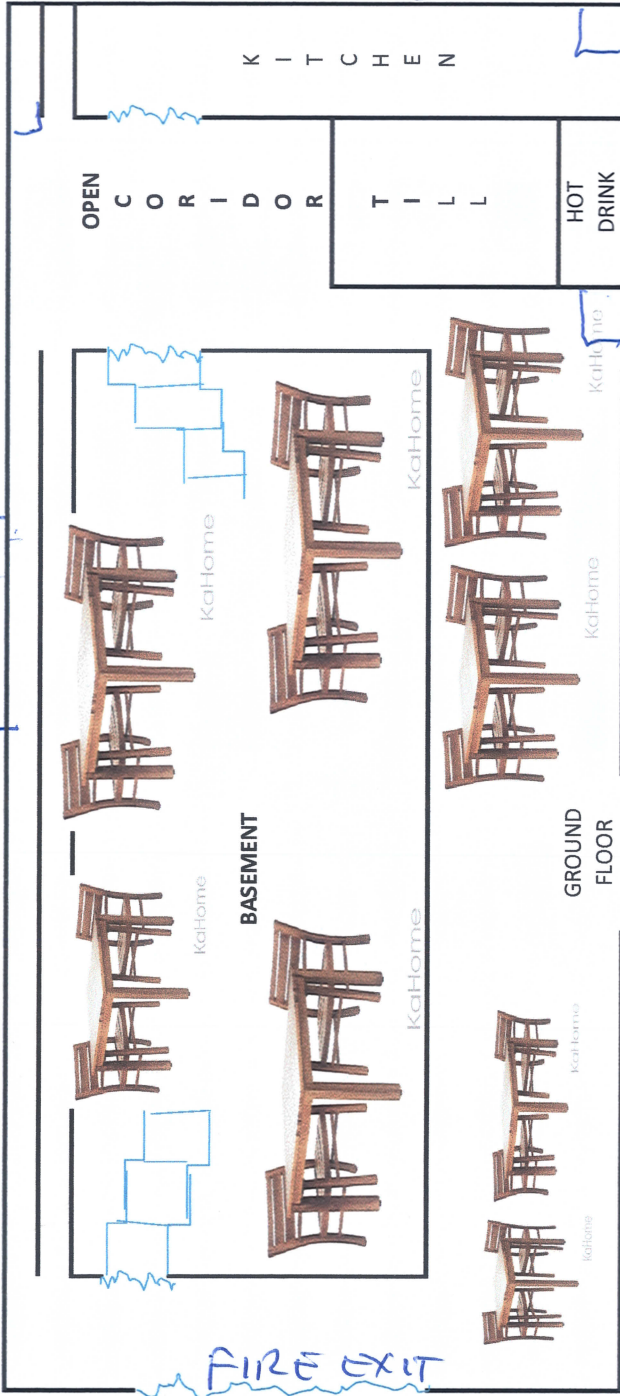

57. The licensee shall limit sound levels so as not to exceed maximum levels to be agreed with the Council's Noise team prior to the premises being used for regulated entertainment.
58. A noise limiting device shall be installed and the entertainment noise control system shall be monitored, checked and calibrated as necessary, so that the levels approved by the Council are not exceeded.
59. The controls for the entertainment noise control system shall be located in a secure, lockable cupboard or similar location. The entertainment noise control system is to be independent of control by persons other than the licensee. Access to the entertainment noise control system is to be restricted to the Licensee or a designated manager.

60. The noise limiting device shall be recalibrated as necessary to ensure that sound levels do not exceed the agreed maximums.
61. When regulated entertainment is provided by way of music and dancing and continues past midnight, an SIA registered door supervisor shall be employed at the premises to patrol outside to minimise any disturbance from customers arriving and departing and to supervise customers outside who may wish to smoke and assist with the dispersal of customers at closing time. The door supervisor shall work until 30 minutes after the premises closes or until all customers have left the area.
62. A dispersal policy shall be implemented at the premises in agreement with the Noise Team.
63. Drinks shall not be permitted to be taken outside the premises at any time.
64. Customers shall not be permitted to take drinks off the premises if they wish to step outside to smoke
65. All deliveries and disposal/collections of refuse shall be prohibited between the hours of 23:00 – 07:00.
66. There shall be no bottling out between the hours of 23:00 – 07:00.

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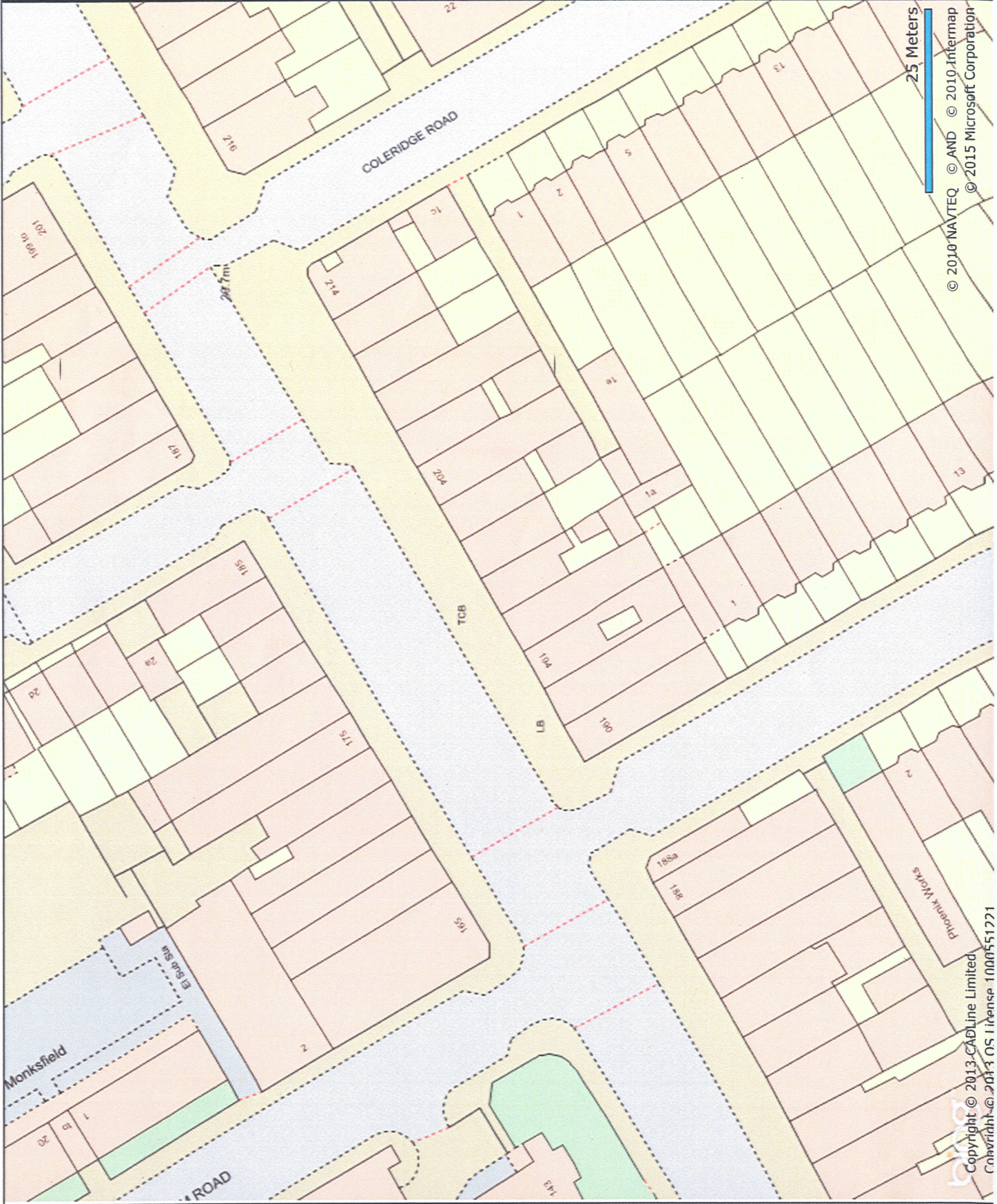


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Islington Borough
