# 117 <u>MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING (Item A6)</u>

#### **RESOLVED**

That the minutes of the meeting on the 23 February and the 24 May 2016 be confirmed as a correct record and the Chair be authorised to sign them.

# 118 <u>KOJIMA, 100 ISLINGTON HIGH STREET, N1 8EG - NEW PREMISES LICENCE (Item B1)</u>

The licensing officer reported that three additional conditions and an amendment to condition 3 had been agreed between the residents and the applicant. These were tabled and would be interleaved with the agenda papers.

A local resident, speaking on behalf of the objectors, stated that this was not a good location for off sales as it was a highly residential area. They were concerned about the licence if the premises were sold. There needed to be a restricted display area to be conditioned. There was a concern that drinks from the chilled cabinet would be consumed immediately. They asked if the sale of the business could be linked to shareholdings by the applicant. The interested party stated that some residents did not want any expansion of

alcohol in the area. Some residents considered a display area of 15% to be an acceptable figure. They requested that should a licence be granted it would only be granted until 8pm.

The applicant's representative agreed to add a condition regarding a shareholding of 25% remaining in the name of Mr Mossman. This was a small shop, it was hoped to create a vintage look and products would be displayed around the premises. The applicant was living in the residential flat above. The applicant's representative stated that he would accept 8pm rather than a refusal of the licence, although he would prefer 9pm. There had been no objections from the police or the noise team. As this was an off licence it was considered there would be less effect. Alcohol would be ancillary to the use as a Japanese retail shop. In the lease it was stated that alcohol could only be sold by Mr Mossman. 15% for display space for alcohol would be agreeable. Alcohol sold would be at high cost. There were many pubs and bars in the area where people were more likely to buy alcohol at a cheaper price. He stated that the premises would not be entering a late night economy. These premises were an exception in that alcohol was ancillary and this would be conditioned. They would continue to talk to residents.

The applicant stated that he was passionate about the area and had watched the decline in antique shops. He wished his shop to be a Japanese cultural experience. He would require the chiller as customers may wish white wines to be for their meal at home. The premises were not focussed on alcohol and would set an example of diversity in the area. He was very anxious to make the business work.

In response to questions, the applicant agreed for off sales to be in sealed containers. An email address could be made available for residents.

#### **RESOLVED**

- That the application for a new premises licence for Kojima, 100 Islington High Street,
   N1 8EG be granted to permit:
  - a) The sale of alcohol, off the premises only, from 11:00 to 21:00 on Monday to Saturday and from 11:00 until 20:00 hours on Sunday.
  - b) Opening hours from 11:00 to 21:00 hours on Monday to Saturday and from 11:00 until 20:00 hours on Sunday.
- 2) Conditions as detailed on page 36 shall be applied to the licence with the following amendments:-
  - Condition 3 to read. Products shall be strictly limited to sake, shochu, Japanese wine, Japanese whisky and bottled or canned craft beers.

#### Additional conditions.

- No more than 15% of the front of house trading area shall be used for the display of alcoholic drinks.
- The sale of alcohol shall be ancillary to the premises operating as a shop selling Japanese cooking equipment, food and drink.
- The premises licence cannot be transferred, save for to subsidiary to parent companies of the premises licence holder and will cease to be in force if Mr Mossman's shareholding drops below 25%.

#### **REASON FOR DECISION**

The Sub-Committee listened to all the evidence and submissions and read all the material. The Sub-Committee reached the decision having given consideration to the Licensing Act

2003, as amended, and its regulations, the national guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.

The Sub-Committee took into consideration Licensing Policy 2 and 13.20 – 13.39 of the Home Office Guidance. The premises fall under the Angel and Upper Street cumulative impact area. Licensing policy 2 creates a rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises licences that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, unless an applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact or otherwise impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives.

There were four local resident objections. There had been no representations made by the responsible authorities. The Sub-Committee noted that the hours sought were within the hours specified in licensing policy 8.

The applicant stated that the shop was to provide items of cultural and culinary relevance to people interested in Japan and the Japanese community.

The Sub-Committee heard evidence that alcohol sales would be ancillary to the shop selling Japanese cooking equipment, food and drink. These were a small premises measuring 435 sq feet. No more than 15% of the front of house trading area would be used for the display of alcohol. The Sub-Committee noted that Mr Mossman would be living above the premises and that the business was not alcohol led and that the alcohol that was displayed would be entirely Japanese and of specialist interest.

New conditions were agreed during the course of the hearing and the lead representative of the residents described the discussions as fruitful.

The Sub-Committee considered that the granting of the new premises licence with the agreed conditions was unlikely to impact on the existing cumulative impact in the area. The Sub-Committee considered that it was in the public interest, proportionate and appropriate to the promotion of the licensing objectives to grant the licence.

# 1. Synopsis

- 1.1 This is an application for the variation of a premise licence under the Licensing Act 2003.
- 1.2 The application is to extend:
  - a) The permitted times for the sale of alcohol, for consumption off the premises, to between 08:00 and 23:00, Sunday to Thursday, and between 08:00 and 00:00 on Friday and Saturday.
  - b) The opening hours to between 07:00 and 23:00, Sunday to Thursday, and between 07:00 and 00:00 on Friday and Saturday.
- 1.3 The premises is currently licensed to:
  - a) Sell alcohol, for consumption off the premises, between 11:00 and 23:00, Sunday to Saturday.
  - b) Open between 08:00 and 23:00, Sunday to Saturday.

# 3. Background

3.1 Papers are attached as follows:-

Appendix 1: application form, including current licence;

Appendix 2: representations;

Appendix 3: map of premises location.

- 3.2 The licensee was first granted a licence for these premises by the Licensing Sub-Committee on 23 February 2016. The original application sought permission to sell alcohol, for consumption off the premises, between 8:00 and 23:00 hours. The committee determined to grant a licence to allow alcohol to be sold between 11:00 and 20:00 hours. The licensee appealed this decision, however, prior to determination at the Magistrates Court, agreed with the Licensing Service by way of 'Consent Order' dated 12 June 2016 to the grant of a modified licence to allow alcohol to be sold between 11am and 11pm.
- 3.3 The premises is located in the Clerkenwell Cumulative Impact Policy Area.
- 3.4 The applicant has proposed no additional measures in their operating schedule to promote the licensing objectives.

# 4. Planning Implications

- 4.1 Planning has reported in respect of the original application for a new licence:
- 4.2 "This property was granted planning permission for the change of use of ground floor & basement from tailors to restaurant in connection with existing café at no. 379, (Ref:960330) granted on 21/06/1996. Condition 2 stated that the hours were permitted from 8.00am to

midnight on any day. The current use is lawful and therefore, I do not wish to object on this basis."

4.3 It should be noted that the new proposed opening hours are outside the permitted hours for planning.

#### 5 Recommendations

- 5.1 To determine the application for a variation of the premises licence under Section 34 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 5.2 To consider that this address is in a Saturation or "Cumulative Impact Policy" of Islington. This special policy creates a rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises licences, club premises certificates, or variation applications that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, unless the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact or otherwise impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 5.3 If the Committee grants the application it should be subject to:
  - i. conditions of the existing premises (see appendix 1).
  - ii. any additional conditions deemed appropriate by the Committee to promote the four licensing objectives.

#### 6 Conclusion and reasons for recommendations

6.1 The Council is required to consider this application in the light of all relevant information, and if approval is given, it may attach such conditions as appropriate to promote the licensing objectives.

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
  - a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
  - b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

There are further 'Mandatory conditions' applicable to licences authorising the supply of alcohol. A full list of the current mandatory conditions is available from the licensing pages on Islington's web site, <a href="www.islington.gov.uk">www.islington.gov.uk</a>. This list is subject to change by order of the Secretary of State and licensees and other responsible persons are advised to ensure they are aware of the latest conditions.

# Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

- Notices shall be prominently displayed at the entrance and at the point of sale stating that CCTV is in use, "Challenge 25" proof of age scheme is in operation and the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003 regarding underage and proxy purchases of alcohol.
- Notices shall be displayed advising customers of the permitted hours for the sale of alcohol.
- 3. All staff shall be trained for their role on induction and at regular intervals of six months thereafter. Training shall include identifying persons under 25, making a challenge, acceptable proof of age, making and recording a refusal, avoiding conflict and responsible alcohol retailing.
- 4. Written training records shall be kept.
- 5. The premises licence holder shall actively engage with and work with the police safer neighbourhood team, or equivalent.
- 6. A hard back incident book shall be kept and made available to police and authorised council officers in which shall be recorded all instances of criminality, antisocial behaviour, abuse of staff, incidents where police are called and other significant incidents.
- 7. A notice shall be prominently displayed by the front doors advising customers that they are in an area subject to a Designated Public Place Order and should not drink in the street and must surrender any open alcoholic drink to a police officer on demand or face arrest and a fine on conviction.
- 8. Management and staff shall discourage persons drinking or loitering outside the shop.
- 9. Notices shall be prominently displayed by the exit asking customers to respect nearby residents and to leave quietly, to dispose of litter responsibly, not to loiter outside the shop and not to drink in the street as they are within an area subject to a Designated Public Place Order.
- 10. The shop front shall be kept tidy at all times and shall be swept at close.
- 11. No deliveries shall be received or removals of rubbish take place between 20:00 and 07:00.
- 12. The "Challenge 25" proof of age policy shall be operated and only a photographic driving licence, valid passport or proof of age cards with the bearer's photograph and the PASS logo/hologram on it will be accepted as proof of age. A hard back refusals record will be kept and made available to police or council officers on request.
- 13. Alcohol shall not be served to persons who are intoxicated.

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- 14. The DPS shall undertake routine monitoring of the refusals records and record that this is being done.
- 15. Emergency lighting and fire extinguishers shall be installed. The fire exit shall be kept free of any impediment or obstacle at all time of the operating hours.
- 16. Suitable signage will be displayed at the point of exit advising customers leave the premises quietly.
- 17. Any alcohol must be sold by DPS or a person authorised by the DPS at all times.
- 18. No Super strength beer, lagers, ciders or spirit mixtures of 5.5% ABV (alcohol by volume) or above shall be sold at the premises, except for premium beers and ciders supplied in glass bottles
- 19. No more than 15% of the sales area shall be used at any one time for the sale, exposure for sale, or display of alcohol
- 20. CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained in agreement with the Police. Maintained means that the system will be regularly serviced (at least once a year) and checked every two weeks to ensure that it is storing images correctly and a log kept and signed by a supervisor to this effect. The system will provide identifiable full frontal head and shoulder image of everyone entering the premises and will operate in any light conditions within the premises. The system will cover the full exterior of the premises and shall record in real time, date and time stamped and will operate whilst the premises is open for licensable activities. The recordings will be kept for a minimum of 31 days and copies will be made available to an Authorised officer or a police officer (subject to the Data protection Act 1998) within 24hrs of any request free of charge. There will always be a member of staff on duty who can operate the system, to allow officers to view recordings and if required by a Police Officer, provide a copy of images immediately free of charge to assist in the immediate investigation of offences. If the system malfunctions and will not be operating for longer than one day of business then Police must be informed.
- 21. Outside of permitted hours for the sale of alcohol, all alcohol on display is to be secured behind locked shutters/screens/grills or secured behind locked cabinet doors.
- 22. There shall be no sales of spirits in vessels of 30cl or less.
- 23. Customers shall not be permitted to open or consume alcoholic products on the premises.

#### **Issues of Concern**

- The premises are located within the Clerkenwell Cumulative Impact policy area. The
  onus is on the applicant to demonstrate that these premises will not add to the
  cumulative impact. The applicant has not done this in the operating schedule. In my
  opinion that the proposed application will add to the cumulative impact.
- 2. The licensing authority receives regular complaints from local residents and businesses about the impact of licensed businesses in the area. Licensing officers regularly visit the area and have worked with local licensed operators to minimise the impact their businesses have on the local environment, for example through the successful introduction of the "reduce the strength" campaign. There is a specific concern about the impact of street drinking in the area, who typically arrive in the area early and consume alcohol on the street and in the local parks. These drinkers are associated with antisocial and criminal behaviour such as fighting, public urination and littering. Despite being aware of the local street drinking issue the applicant has not indicated how extending the sale of alcohol from 8am 5 mornings each week will not add to the cumulative impact.
- 3. The application is outside framework hours set out in the Licensing Policy 8. Adherence to the framework hours is one of the measures that applicants can include in there operating schedules to promote the licensing objectives. The applicant has not indicated in the operating schedule why these framework hours are not necessary to promote the licensing objectives nor have they suggested any alternative proposals. This is of concern given that the applicant is fully aware of the sensitive nature of the area that his premises is located having had previous engagement with the Police, Licensing Authority and Licensing Committee.

- 4. It is questionable if the applicant has the ability to promote the licensing objective as there appears to be a distinct disregard for the licensing policy and the licensing objectives.
- 5. On 28 June 2016 the applicant signed a consent order that was lodged with Highbury Magistrates Court agreeing to the decision to grant a premises licence for the sale of alcohol from 11am to 11pm, following an appeal against the Licensing Committee's decision to grant a licence from 11am to 8pm.
- 6. Within one week of signing the consent order the applicant has submitted a variation application to extend the hours of operations outside the previously agreed hours and outside the framework hours of the Licensing Policy with no additional measures in the operating schedule to mitigate against:
  - o adding to the cumulative impact
  - o drinking in the street
  - o operating beyond framework hours

#### Recommendation

In order to promote the licensing objectives it is recommended that this application is refused unless the applicant is able to demonstrate that selling alcohol beyond the framework hours on Fridays and Saturdays night and selling alcohol Sundays to Thursdays from 8am to 11am will not add to the cumulative impact.

I am submitting this additional material further to the Licensing Authority's representation dated 19 July 2016 with respect to the variation application for the above premises.

On 25 July 2016 I contacted Islington's Community Safety Partnership Unit, Clerkenwell's Safer Neighbourhood Team and the local Greenspace Officer in respect of this application to enquire whether there were still ongoing issues with street drinkers in the vicinity. I received the following replies:

#### 27 July 2016

"Hi Simon,

The issues of ASB in that vicinity are well known and I'm sure can be evidenced. I was at a recent Clerkenwell SNT panel meeting where a local resident was attacked on St John Street by a street drinker. The Clerkenwell team made a subsequent arrest.

From my perspective I can only think that serving alcohol from 8am would exacerbate these issues further.

"Hi Simon.

Further to Johnathon's comments below, police have been receiving increasing calls to St Johns Street and the surrounding area to aggressive beggars at the location and general anti-social behaviour all of which are strongly linked to street drinking.

We have been regularly at the location over the past month moving these persons on and dealing with any criminal offences. The majority of persons stopped and spoken to were in possession of alcohol or under the influence of it. We continue to tackle this problem and it is one of our priorities. I believe that the selling of alcohol from 8 am would be counterproductive to our on-going work at the location and actively encourage street drinkers and beggars to congregate on St Johns Street earlier.

Furthermore, we receive complaints of ASB as a result of the fallout from weekends. Groups of youths hang around in the area well into the later part of the morning – urinating and just generally causing a nuisance. I believe the sale of alcohol at the location from 8am would only encourage these youths to stay in the location for longer which would have a significant impact on the local residents and possibly increase crime in the area.

Due to the reasons listed above, I strongly oppose the new licensing application. If you require any further in regards to my remarks, please do not hesitate to contact me.

Representation from Islington Public Health department on behalf of health bodies providing services in Islington

#### CITY FOOD AND WINE, 377 St John Street London EC1V 4LD

We are submitting a representation in response to the application for a variation in the licence for the above premise, which would see an increase in the hours permitted for the sale of alcohol. Specifically, the premise has applied to vary the sale of alcohol from 11am to 8am. This representation is on behalf of Islington's Public Health Department, which as a responsible authority.

The impact of alcohol is particularly great in Islington with some of the greatest levels of alcohol-related problems in London, including:

- The highest rate of alcohol-specific mortality of any London borough in 2012-14.
- The highest rate of alcohol-related hospital admissions in London in 2012-14
- The second highest rate of alcohol-specific hospital admissions in London in 2012-14
- The third highest rate of claimants of incapacity benefit where the main medical reason for being a claimant is alcoholism compared in London in 2012-14

The premise is located on St John Street, which is located in Clerkenwell ward. The location is within the Clerkenwell Cumulative Impact Area described in Islington's Licensing Policy 2013-2017. The area already experiences significant alcohol-related harm, as described below.

The grounds for the representation are:

- public safety,
- · the prevention of crime and disorder, and
- the prevention of public nuisance.

The relevant policies in Islington's Licensing Policy

- Policy 2: Cumulative impact and saturation
- Policy 4: Shops selling alcohol
- Policy 7: Licensing hours

We are concerned that if this application to extend the opening hours to 8am is granted it will increase the availability of alcohol for the consumption off premises. In particular, street drinking is a problem in the area and we are concerned that the earlier opening hours will contribute to an increase in street drinking. This could lead to an increase in public nuisance, crime and disorder and impact adversely on the health and safety of both those buying and consuming the alcohol but also the health and safety of others who come in contact with them.

This premise would add to the impact of existing licenced premises in an area which already has high density of premises. At the time of writing this representation, there were:

- Six off-licences open for 24 hours within a 100m walk<sup>1</sup> of the premises;
- 23 off-licences open for 24 hours within a 250m walk of the premises.

The area already has sufficient premises to meet demand and outlets supplying alcohol for longer hours will be detrimental to the local residents in terms of noise and disturbance, anti-social behaviour and crime.

#### Alcohol and health

Alcohol misuse imposes a major preventable burden to health and the effect of this in Islington is felt across all health services.

There is a growing body of evidence that an increased number of alcohol outlets results in significant increases in both alcohol consumption and alcohol-related harm, including injury, violence and Page 27

medical harm. Evidence from a number of countries indicates reducing alcohol outlet density can have an impact on reducing violence and problem drinking. There is also evidence that changes in hours or days of trading can have a significant impact on volume of alcohol consumed and rates of alcohol related problems.<sup>3,4,5,6,7</sup>.

### Impact of alcohol on health in Islington

The impact of alcohol on health in Islington is particularly severe. Alcohol-specific hospital admissions are those which are wholly related to alcohol (e.g. alcoholic liver disease or alcohol overdose) and thus reflect acute harm. Islington has the second highest rate in London for hospital admissions where alcohol is the specific cause of admission. The rate is also significantly worse than England.

## Harm from alcohol in the vicinity of City Food and Wine, 377 St John Street London EC1V 4LD

#### Ambulance callouts

The data on alcohol-related ambulance callouts reflect where the ambulance attended, not where the individual lives, and therefore includes people who live outside the borough but who come into Islington to work, socialise, etc. Alcohol related ambulance call-outs highlighted the immediate harms of alcohol on health and thus the risk to physical safety that alcohol causes. The London Ambulance Service records the callout at Lower Super Output Area (LSOA) level, a geographical area in which an average 1,500 residents live. The LSOA in which City Food and Wine is located (E01002727), experienced 23 alcohol-related ambulance callouts in 2014/15, The rate of alcohol related ambulance call outs per resident in the LOSA is significantly higher than the borough average. In the area within a 250 m radius of this off license there were 42 alcohol related ambulance callouts.

# Street drinking

Street drinking has been reported as a problem in the immediate area. As well as the harm that drinking has to the individual, street drinking can have a negative impact upon the quality of life of residents and local businesses. Problems identified by surveys, conducted elsewhere in London and other English cities, include littering, noise, urination, intimidation and disorderly conduct of those under the influence of alcohol. Street drinkers are a group who are particularly vulnerable to alcohol-related harm, and there are concerns that extension to hours of licensed premises will further increase alcohol availability in this area and increase potential harm.

According to qualitative work by alcohol concern,<sup>8</sup> the preferred drinks of street drinkers is white cider or super-strength lager (9%);drinks which liver specialists report cause the most problems in dependent drinkers.<sup>9</sup> Increased hours of alcohol sales are associated with an increase in alcohol-related harm.<sup>11</sup>

We have concerns that granting the premise earlier opening hours will further increase alcohol availability in this area and for this particular group.

#### Conclusion

Islington experiences some of the highest levels of alcohol-related harm in London and the cumulative availability of alcohol is one area that is likely to be impacting on this.

There is already high availability of alcohol in the area around City Food and Wine, 377 St John Street London EC1V 4LD.

There is evidence that increased availability of alcohol in terms of the time period in which alcohol is available (hours of sale) results in an increase in alcohol-related harm, and increases impact on a number of front line services.

There are concerns about street drinking in this area of Islington. Increasing the hours of alcohol availability at this off-licence will increase availability of supply. This could have detrimental impacts both in terms of public safety and crime and disorder.

#### Recommendation

Islington's Public Health Department would request the proposed extension to the hours of the licence to supply alcohol at City Food and Wine, 377 St John Street London EC1V 4LD be refused on the grounds that there is already sufficient supply in an area which already experiences high levels of alcohol-related harm. If the Committee does decide to grant the extension, Public Health would ask the committee to consider additional conditions to restrict sales of high strength alcohol at this off-licence.

> Local newsagents and corner shops are disappearing in favour of cafes, bars and convenience stores all of which have licenses to sell alcohol. While it can be argued that these add to the interest and amenity of the area they can be at the expense of the residential community and raise issues of noise at night and problems of on the street drinking.

>

> I live in the residential terrace opposite the proposed application. We sleep at the the front of the houses and experience a high degree of ambient noise from the street at the best of times. There is a local problem with on the street drinking - particularly in the summer months, on Rosebery Avenue, St John Street and in the local squares. At times there have been issues which can be intimidating and have involved the police. Some local residents are vulnerable and have both mental health and alcohol related issues. I cannot think that an available source of alcohol from 8 in the morning to 11pm for 7 days a week can be a positive thing. I would hope that this concern could be taken into account.


