# Subject: Local Initiatives Fund

# 1. Synopsis

1.1. The Local Initiatives Fund (LIF) is a flexible devolved budget for councillors to use to address issues and priorities in their wards. It is an important element of the council's community provision and helps to meet the needs of local residents. In 2023/24 each ward has an allocation of £13,000 to spend on local schemes. Councillors consider project ideas for their ward and make recommendations to the Voluntary and Community Sector Committee for formal approval.

# 2. Recommendations

- 2.1. To consider the new proposals and changes to previous proposals submitted by ward councillors as set out in Appendix A and to agree these proposals in principle subject to the Corporate Director of Community Engagement and Wellbeing being satisfied that the necessary checks have been made and any other issues resolved.
- 2.2. To note the declarations of interest made by councillors due to having a connection with organisations that they are recommending funding for. These are detailed at paragraph 4.3.
- 2.3. To continue with delegated authority to the Corporate Director Community Engagement and Wellbeing, in consultation with the Executive Member for Homes and Communities, to make changes to the use of previously awarded funding.

- 2.4. To note that further applications received for projects addressing the cost of living crisis up to the value of £1000 will continue to be considered by officers on an ongoing basis in between VCS Committees but will not be funded from the Local Initiatives Fund budget subject to sufficient extra funding being available. This is detailed at paragraph 3.11.
- 2.5. To note that authority was delegated to the Corporate Director Community Engagement and Wellbeing, in consultation with the Executive Member for Homes and Communities, to award funding to projects related to the Coronation of King Charles III.

# 3. Background

- 3.1. The Local Initiatives Fund enables councillors to respond directly to priorities in their ward that lie outside of current mainstream funding programmes and might not otherwise receive funding. It helps them to address the needs of local residents and suggest improvements to local services/facilities or new schemes that will enhance the area.
- 3.2. The Community Partnerships Team in the Community Engagement and Wellbeing Directorate is responsible for managing the Local Initiatives Fund in liaison with ward councillors and members of the Voluntary and Community Sector (VCS) Committee. The team ensures that funds are used appropriately and for the purpose for which they are allocated.
- 3.3. The VCS Committee's terms of reference include 'To be responsible for the allocation of the Islington Community Fund including...allocating the Local Initiatives Fund having regard to the recommendations of the relevant ward members/relevant ward partnership or neighbourhood group and on the basis that the funding will be allocated equally among the 16 wards making up the council's area'.
- 3.4. The VCS Committee in April 2011 agreed that each ward councillor should be given a notional allocation of the Local Initiatives Fund (i.e. divided equally between the councillors elected for each ward). In 2016/17, £15,000 was available to each ward; therefore the notional allocation for each councillor was £5,000.
- 3.5. In January 2017, the Voluntary and Community Sector Committee agreed that in order to address the issue of recruiting and retaining support for ward partnerships, an incentive payment of £1,000 per annum would be paid to each ward partnership co-ordinator and that £1,000 per annum be set aside from each ward partnership Local Initiatives Fund budget to fund this support.
- 3.6. In 2021/22, the annual Local Initiatives Fund budget was therefore £225,000. This was £14,000 per ward apart from the Bunhill and Clerkenwell ward budgets which were each £14,500.
- 3.7. In March 2022, it was agreed that two new ward partnership co-ordinator posts needed to be created. An additional ward partnership co-ordinator was recruited to the Finsbury ward partnership due to the additional workload involved in dealing Page 4

- with two wards. In May 2022, the number of wards in Islington increased from 16 to 17 which meant that a further ward partnership co-ordinator was recruited.
- 3.8. Due to the increased amount spent on honorariums/ incentive payments to cordinators and the larger number of wards, the amount of funding available in each ward budget in 2023/24 for local schemes is £13,000. This means there is a reduction of the overall LIF budget from £240,000 to £238,000. Of this £238,000, £17,000 is spent on honorariums with £221,000 left to allocate to local schemes.
- 3.9. In November 2019, authority was delegated to the Head of Community Partnerships, to allocate funding, up to the value of £250, to activity to support Ward Partnership meetings. Awards approved under delegated authority should be reported to the next VCS Committee at which Local Initiatives Fund awards are considered. In September 2021, it was agreed that funding up to the value of £1,000 can be approved by the Head of Community Partnerships and Corporate Director Community Engagement and Wellbeing for activity to support Ward Partnership meetings.
- 3.10. Due to the challenges being faced by the cost of living crisis, the decision was made to open up LIF for applications during the winter period (Oct 2022-March 2023) to ensure that voluntary and community sector organisations were able to respond on the ground to the crisis, and that funding was awarded and processed promptly to support the sector during this difficult time.
- 3.11. In early March 2023, it was decided that any further applications received for projects addressing the cost of living crisis would continue to be prioritised beyond the end of March but would not be funded from the Local Initiatives Fund budget. £20,000 of extra funding from the North London Waste Authority was set aside to fund any further cost of living crisis related proposals received. From 23 March to 2 June, £11,355 of this extra funding was allocated to 11 applications leaving £8,645 still to be allocated. These applications were not considered by ward councillors but by officers in the Community Partnerships team. The maximum that can be applied for under this process is now £1000. The relevant ward councillors have been informed of any decisions made for projects related to their ward. These awards are listed in Appendix A for information only.

# 4. LIF Awards 2023/24

4.1. Occasionally projects do not proceed as planned and funding is returned to ward budgets or the use of a grant has to be changed.

In March, we learned of the cancellation of the Angel Canal Festival which was due to be held on 3 September and which had been recommended for funding of £2,500 by the St Peter's and Canalside councillors. The reason cited by the Canal and River Trust was 'the economic climate, together with a continuing real-terms cut in the Trust's Government funding, has forced our charity to review all of its costs'. This £2,500 has been returned to the St Peter's and Canalside budget for Page 5

reallocation. A smaller scale version of the festival will now be run on 3 September and the accountable body will be the Islington Boat Club.

In April 2020, £1,500 was awarded to Andover Community Centre to kit out a Men in Sheds project at the rear of the centre to engage isolated men in the Finsbury Park area. This project was first delayed due to Covid and then there was scaffolding in the garden area for the block which ruled out access to the shed and gardens. This £1500 has been returned to the Finsbury Park budget for reallocation.

In August 2021, £750 was awarded to Community Toolbank (now called Things in Common) to set up a free tool lending service on Priory Green Estate. There was an underspend of £400 due to the delay in the time that the funding was approved and when the insurance policy was renewed with their broker. In the interceding time they managed to get further funding, against which they posted the insurance costs. The other funds for website and engagement were spent. This £400 has been returned to the Barnsbury budget for reallocation.

In April 2023, £500 was awarded under delegated authority to a Coronation street party on St John's Grove in early May which was subsequently cancelled. This funding was paid out to the Toy Project (the accountable body) but has been returned in time for this Committee so the details of this party are not listed in Appendix A.

Residual amounts of 2022/23 funding from 13 wards totalling £7,886 have also been added back into the ward budgets.

Two changes in the use of previously awarded funding have been agreed by councillors and are listed in Appendix A:

- £1374 was awarded by Canonbury and St Peter's in February 2020 to the Friends of Rotherfield School for a 'Gaspard the Fox' show, a 'Fun Run' and a 'Food and Culture evening' which were to be held between March and July 2020. These events were cancelled due to Covid restrictions in place at the time. The funding will now mainly be spent on a summer fete on 7 July 2023.
- £1000 was awarded in March 2022 to Highbury Quadrant TRA for a fun day which did not take place. This unused £1000 will now be spent on the creation of three meadows, a bee bank and small shrub habitat area on Birchmore Walk instead (a project being run in partnership with the LBI Housing Community Gardening Team). An additional £1000 has been allocated to this project by the Highbury councillors in this round meaning that a total of £2,000 LIF has been allocated to this project.

These amendments to the ward budgets are reflected in the budget summary on the last page of Appendix A. In total, £12,286 has been returned to the ward budgets in this round. This increases the amount available to allocate in 2023/24 from £221,000 to £233,286.

4.2. Since the last VCS Committee in March 2023, 64 applications for the Local Initiatives Fund have been received. Another 9 cost of living crisis related applications have been received which were fully covered by the additional NLWA funding. 2 further applications were funded by both LIF and NLWA. This means a total of 75 applications have been received since the last VCS Committee in March 2023.

Four of the 66 LIF applications were related to Ward Partnership activity, were recommended for funding and then formally agreed by the Head of Community Partnerships / Corporate Director of Community Engagement and Wellbeing under delegated authority. These four applications totalling £698 are listed in Appendix A for information only.

Two of the 66 LIF applications were related to the King's Coronation and were approved under delegated authority by the Corporate Director Community Engagement and Wellbeing, in consultation with the Executive Member for Homes and Communities. One of these projects didn't take place so is not listed in Appendix A. The other project is listed in Appendix A for information only.

Of the remaining 60 LIF applications, one application was withdrawn, one was deferred until the second round of 2023/24, one application was not recommended for funding by ward councillors and three applications will be funded by the Community Infrastructure Levy instead leaving a total of 54 applications recommended by ward councillors.

As some wards were heavily oversubscribed for their remainder in the last round, councillors could not afford to fully fund all of the LIF applications received so some applications were part funded or fully deferred to this round. 5 of the LIF applications submitted initially in March 2023 were part or fully deferred to this round.

If the remaining 54 councillor funding recommendations are formally agreed by this VCS Committee, there will be £139,930 left in the 2023/24 budget and would mean that 59 LIF grants have been awarded in 2023/24 to date.

A list of the 54 LIF applications recommended for funding and the recommended amount for each application is set out in Appendix A.

9 of the 66 LIF applications received are from first time applicants to LIF and 6 of these have been recommended for funding (one was deferred and one was withdrawn). Four organisations are listed more than once in Appendix A (i.e. have submitted more than one application to this round).

The total amount of LIF allocated to cost of living crisis related applications between October 2022 and the March VCS Committee was £21,601. £11,355 of NLWA funding has been allocated by officers to cost of living projects since the March VCS Committee. As there is a cap of £1000 on NLWA funding applications, two cost of living applications in the round were part funded by LIF and NLWA (the NLWA amount of £2,000 for these two is included in the £11,355 above). This means the total amount allocated to cost of living crisis related applications since October 2022 is £32,956.

- 4.3. Councillors must always declare their interest if they have a connection with an organisation that they are recommending funding for. Declarations of interest have been made for the following applications reported to this Committee:
  - Cllr Valerie Bossman-Quarshie is a trustee of YMCA London City and North that has been allocated £3,000 for the Whitecross Street Party.
  - Cllr Marian Spall is the chair of Caxton House Settlement that has been allocated £3,500 for the Hillrise summer festival.
  - Cllr Michelline Ngongo ia a holding trustee of Caxton House Settlement that has been allocated £3,500 for the Hillrise summer festival.
  - Cllrs David Poyser, Michelline Ngongo and Marian Spall are the main organisers of the Hillrise summer festival that has been allocated £3,500.
  - Cllr Anjna Khurana is a trustee of Hanley Crouch Community Association that has been allocated £500 for a 50th anniversary event and £2,725 for health and well being workshops.
  - Cllr Jenny Kay is the vice-chair of the federated governing board of Newington Green Primary School that has been allocated £1,100 for geographical globes for classrooms and financial assistance for children unable to afford school trips. The PTA applied for this funding.
  - Cllr Tricia Clarke is a governor of Tufnell Park Primary School that has been allocated funding for three projects: £500 for a Coronation Bee Garden, £1000 for a computing and robotics project and £960 for outdoor play rickshaw carts.

Awards were made to the following ward partnerships for costs associated with holding ward partnership meetings or events:

- Junction Ward Partnership meeting on 29 March £22.70
- Laycock Ward Partnership meeting on 27 April £100
- St Mary's and St James' Ward Partnership fun day on 10 June £480

 Tufnell Park Ward Partnership at Hilldrop Community Centre Spring Fair on 6 May - £95

The councillors funding these costs are members of these ward partnerships and the main organisers of the meetings / events so have declared an interest in the above.

# 5. Implications

## 5.1. Financial Implications

The Local Initiatives Fund in Financial Year 2023/24 has a total of £233,286 to allocate. This is comprised of an annual budget of £221,000 and a carried forward underspend/unallocated amount of £12,286 from previous financial years. An additional £17,000 LIF budget is spent on honorarium/ incentive payments to ward partnership co-ordinators to a total of £1,000 per annum per ward. The core budget available for LIF will be £238,000.

Any recommendations for carry forwards of LIF underspends will be subject to yearly reviews of the wider financial needs of the Council. The current earmarked reserves as a consequence of previous financial year's carry forwards are sufficient to meet the funding requirements of this report.

Any loosening of monitoring procedures will need to ensure that suitable controls remain to ensure financial best practice in the Council's dealings with voluntary and community organisations.

The proposals referred to in this report can be met from budget and reserve allocations from the Local Initiatives Fund. Delays or alterations to LIF projects may increase ward underspends in Financial Year 2024/25.

Financial Year 2024/25 will start with a comprised annual budget of £221,000 and any additional carried forward underspend/unallocated. An additional £17,000 LIF budget will be spent on honorarium/ incentive payments to ward partnership coordinators to a total of £1,000 per annum per ward. The core budget available for LIF will be £238,000.

Any recommendations to revert to previously held carry forward capping will reduce the carry forward and the money available for the LIF programme, but will improve the financial position of the Council.

### 5.2. Legal Implications

The general power of competence pursuant to Section 1 of the Localism Act 2011 provides the council with very broad powers to do anything that individuals Page 9

generally may do'. This covers the power to give grants to voluntary and community sector organisations as proposed in this report and includes anything which it considers is likely to achieve the promotion or improvement of the economic, social or environmental well-being of the whole or part of its area or all or any of the persons resident or present in that area. The provision of resources through the Local Initiatives Fund is likely to promote the social and economic well-being of Islington's residents.

The council is under a fiduciary duty to ensure that its resources are used appropriately. Where the money is allocated to outside bodies, the requirements of the procurement rules may apply. In any event it will be important to maintain current practice of ensuring that the money will be used for the purposes for which it is allocated and that individual members are made aware of the responsibility they bear in making recommendations in relation to specific groups.

The council has adopted a Code of Conduct for its members which is in Part 6 of the Constitution and is on the council's website. All members need to register their disclosable interests – both disclosable pecuniary interests and other interests that must be declared and registered as required by the council's Code of Conduct for members or by members' duty to act in conformity of the Seven Principles of Public Life.

One of the Seven Principles of Public Life is the principle of integrity, that "holders of public office must avoid placing themselves under any obligation to people or organisations that might try to influence them in their work. They should not act or take decisions in order to gain financial or other material benefits for themselves, their family or their friends. They must declare and resolve any interests and relationships."

Members' registration of personal interests should be guided by this duty. They should also give the Monitoring Officer who is responsible for the register of members' interests any information they may request in order to keep that register up to date and any other information which members consider should be entered in the register.

# 5.3. Environmental Implications and contribution to achieving a net zero carbon Islington by 2030

Some of the projects funded by the LIF grants have carbon and environmental impacts, including the use of energy, fuel, water, food & drink, materials, and printing, while events being funded may create waste or journeys that contribute to transport-related emissions if attendees drive. However, some projects also have positive environmental impacts, including planting, greening areas and local food growing. Overall, projects will be undertaken with regard with the council's goal of

achieving a net zero Islington by 2030.

### 5.4. Equalities Impact Assessment

The council must, in the exercise of its functions, have due regard to the need to eliminate discrimination, harassment and victimisation, and to advance equality of opportunity, and foster good relations, between those who share a relevant protected characteristic and those who do not share it (section 149 Equality Act 2010). The council has a duty to have due regard to the need to remove or minimise disadvantages, take steps to meet needs, in particular steps to take account of disabled persons' disabilities, and encourage people to participate in public life. The council must have due regard to the need to tackle prejudice and promote understanding.

When considering proposals the VCS Committee will take relevant equalities implications into account. The Local Initiatives Fund provides resources for local projects which directly meet the needs of local residents, many of whom are from groups with protected characteristics. It enables some of Islington's poorest communities to access community-based services and activities and allows provision to be developed locally which can reach groups of residents that may not otherwise be supported.

# 6. Conclusion and reasons for recommendations

The Local Initiatives Fund is an effective way of addressing local priorities and provides a mechanism for ward councillors to support small projects which might otherwise not be funded. Proposals submitted for approval represent a wide range of activity and will deliver significant benefit to local communities.

# Subject: Islington Community Festivals Fund Small Grants Programme 2023 - 2026

## 1. Synopsis

The Community Festivals Fund aims to support organisations based in Islington to deliver high quality, innovative, community focused festivals that are accessible to, and provide benefit for, residents across the borough and promote cultural benefit, stronger communities and partnership working.

- 1.1. At the Voluntary Community Sector Committee on 4 November 2019, it was agreed the Community Festivals Fund be changed from an annual open competition to a small grants programme, where applicants are commissioned by open competition on a three-year basis, subject to the budget being available year by year, yet still required to report annually on the previous year's activities.
- 1.2. In the event that the Community Festivals Fund is no longer affordable, the council is able to withdraw funding in the second and third years respectively.
- 1.3. The first round of Community Festivals funding under this three-year basis ran from April 2020 and ended in March 2023. Following a competitive application process, four festivals (WORD, Cally Festival, Whitecross Street Party and Angel Canal Festival) each received annual grant funding of £2,500 for the duration of the round.
- 1.4. A review of the 2020 2023 scheme informed the preparation and development for the second round of the Community Festivals Fund. There were slight revisions

- to the selection and eligibility criteria whilst the overall format and framework remained broadly the same.
- 1.5. Under the Community Festivals Grants eligibility and selection criteria originally adopted in November 2019, the total funding available for this grant programme will be £10,000 per year, for the period of three consecutive years 2023 26, to deliver strategic arts-led community festivals and events that provide boroughwide benefit and will deliver against the council's equalities, place-shaping and community development agenda.
- 1.6. Festivals have been recommended for support from the Community Festivals Fund Small Grants Programme 2023 2026 based on the evidence provided by applicants that satisfactorily demonstrated and fulfilled the seven key critieria identified for the fund: cultural benefit, diversity and equality, value for money, inclusivity and accessibility, match funding and partnership, through well-managed festivals and event activities with borough-wide reach which meet the council's priorities.

## 2. Recommendations

2.1. To approve the award of Community Festival Fund grants for 2023 – 2026 to the values requested for the festival proposals submitted by four organisations as outlined in the following table:

2.2. The above dates are only indicative and may be subject to change depending on external circumstances.

## 3. Background

- 3.1. The Community Festivals Fund is a small grants programme where applicants are commissioned by open competition on a three-year basis, subject to the budget being available year by year, yet still required to report annually on the previous year's activities.
- 3.2. The total funding available for this grant programme will be £10,000 per year, for the period of three consecutive years; and the maximum grant available per application is up to £2,500 annually (total grant up to £7,500 for three years).
- 3.3. The first round of Community Festivals funding under this three-year basis ran from April 2020 and ended in March 2023. Following a competitive application process, four festivals (WORD, Cally Festival, Whitecross Street Party and Angel Canal Festival) each received annual grant funding of £2,500 for the duration of the round.
- 3.4. A review of the 2020 2023 scheme informed the preparation and development for the second round of the Community Festivals Fund.
- 3.5. An evaluation of the outcomes of the Community Festivals Fund 2020 2023 funding round indicated that the grants programme has been successful in fulfilling

- the expected criteria especially relating to borough-wide benefits, community cohesion, inclusivity, access, cultural benefit and partnership working.
- 3.6. There were slight revisions to the selection and eligibility criteria whilst the overall format and framework remained broadly the same.
- 3.7. The Community Festivals Fund budget for 2023 24 is currently confirmed as £10,000.
- 3.7.1. The council can only guarantee the second and third instalments of the grant as long as sufficient funds are available. In the event that the Community Festivals Fund is no longer affordable, the council is able to withdraw funding in years two and three respectively. It is possible that the indicative amounts allocated to successful organisations may therefore be reduced for future years.
- 3.7.2. The council will pay the grant to successful applicants to the programme 2023-2026 in accordance with the payment conditions as set out in the grant agreement letter which read as follows:
  - a) The first payment of the Grant for the period April 2023 to March 2024 will be paid in advance, and subject to receipt of the signed Grant Offer Letter.

You will also need to send evidence of the following:

- Venue permission
- Proof of Public Liability Insurance
- Relevant entertainment licenses
- Template audience/participant survey
- Update on plans to liaise with the Council for stalls and marketing relevant to the Council.
- b) The second payment (period April 2024 to March 2025) and the third payment\* (period April 2025 to March 2026) of the Grant are conditional on the council receiving and approving any additional monitoring information we have asked for and proof of match investment annually.
- c) \*The third payment will be released in two instalments of 75% and 25% of the total annual amount due subject to the conditions listed in the payment schedule below.
- d) Please note the dates listed in the payment schedule are the dates by which we expect you to submit your invoice and the information to meet the relevant conditions. The dates do not indicate when we will send a

payment. It will normally take up to 30 working days to process and release funds.

## 4. Community Festivals Fund 2023 – 2026 Round Two

- 4.1 The Community Festivals Fund competitive application process was initiated for the second round as per the timeline attached as Appendix A.
- 4.1.1 Some small revisions have been made to the fund's application documentation to enhance partnership working, facilitate the monitoring process and improve clarity of reporting timescales. These are reflected in amendments to the payment conditions and increased detail in relevant existing clauses relating to marketing and publicity and Islington Council's presence at festivals through provision of free stalls.
- 4.1.2 In addition, selection criteria have been adapted to embed awareness of the Islington Council's Vision 30: Building a Net Zero Carbon Islington by 2030 strategy and to promote good environmental policy and practices among prospective grant applicants.
- 4.1.3 Full details of the 2023 26 eligibility and selection criteria for applications are listed at Appendix B.
- 4.2 The Community Festivals Small Grants 2023 2026 scheme was promoted through LBI Communications, on the council external website and social media, on the internal council staff intranet and in Islington Council, Councillor Updates and Children Services bulletins.
- 4.2.1 In addition, it was promoted directly at cultural sector meetings and LBI Equalitiesled community events as well as through Voluntary Action Islington news group and direct mailings to previous applicants, arts and cultural sector organisations and other third parties who had expressed an interest in the scheme via the Culture team.
- 4.2.2 Details of eligibility and selection criteria, together with application guidance notes were available on the Islington Council website. In keeping with council accessibility practice, applications were required to be made directly through the online portal. Digital and hardcopy versions of the Community Festivals Fund application form were also made available upon request.
- 4.2.3 The deadline for applications was Thursday 30 March 2023 at 12 noon.
- 4.3 The scheme received a total of 10 applications for this second round in the threeyear grant format which is equivalent to the number received in 2020 for the first

- round. The total amount requested by organisations in this funding round was £24,244. This is a slight decrease in comparison to the previous round's total request of £26,050.
- 4.3.1 Details of all applications received by the stated deadline are attached at Appendix C
- 4.4 All applications were initially assessed for shortlisting against the published eligibility criteria by officers from the Culture team. This included confirmation of organisation eligibility, evidence of governance, safeguarding provisions and borough-wide benefit.
- 4.4.1 Two applications were ineligible for the fund due to 1) their narrow target audience or limited venue capacity and 2) not offering any or sufficient additional external funding.
- 4.4.2 The eight remaining eligible applications were shortlisted and further assessed by officers from the Culture, Equalities and Community Partnerships teams against the published selection criteria.
- 4.5 Outcomes for Unsuccessful Applicants
- 4.5.1 Unsuccessful applicants who applied for funding support for smaller community events that will primarily provide benefit to hyper-local neighbourhoods or specific ward areas will be encouraged to apply to the Local Initiatives Fund and Islington Community Chest.
- 4.5.2 Additionally, unsuccessful applicants will also be signposted to alternative arts funding sources such as Arts Council England and National Lottery where relevant. This will include an invitation to attend a 'Meet the Funders' event, focussed on arts funding, jointly arranged by Islington Council and Voluntary Action Islington with representation from Arts Council England and Cripplegate Foundation.
- 4.6 Officer recommendations have been made assessing each Community Festivals Fund application received against published funding eligibility and selection criteria and on the quality of the applications.
- 4.6.1 The applications received from the four organisations outlined in the table below satisfactorily demonstrated evidence and fulfilment of the seven key critieria identified for the fund: cultural benefit, diversity and equality, value for money, inclusivity and accessibility, match funding and partnership, through well-managed festivals and event activities with borough-wide reach which meet the council's priorities.

- 4.7 Islington Community Festivals Grant Agreements for successful applicants will be informed by the contents of the application form submitted and any supplementary information requested as part of the decision-making process.
- 4.8 Community Festivals Fund 2023 2026 Grant offer letters for the four successful awardees will be prepared to reflect any additional special terms and conditions required.
- 4.9 The standard grant offer template as adapted for the Community Festivals Fund 2023 2026 is attached at Appendix D with revisions to the previous version indicated where applicable.

## 5. Implications

#### 5.1. Financial Implications

- 5.1.1. Funding available to support festivals outlined in this report is £10,000 annually. In the event that the Community Festivals Fund is no longer affordable, the Council is able to withdraw funding in years 2 and 3 respectively. It is possible that the indicative amounts allocated to successful organisations may therefore be reduced for future years.
- 5.1.2. This funding has been allocated from the Cultural Enrichment core budget.
- 5.1.3. This report recommends that the Community Festival Fund grant for 2023 2026 is allocated to the values requested from the four successful festival organisers. This is detailed in **Table 2.1** and this is within the £10,000 allocated budget.

#### 5.2. **Legal Implications**

5.2.1. There are no legal implications arising from this proposal. Under Section 2 of the Local Government Act 2000, the Council has the power to give support to organisations in the voluntary and community sector to provide services that are likely to achieve the promotion or improvement of the economic, social or environmental well-being of residents within the local authority's area.

# 5.3. Environmental Implications and contribution to achieving a net zero carbon Islington by 2030

- 5.3.1. The Community Festivals Fund award recommendations are unlikely to have any significant environmental implications as the total amount of funding being awarded (and overall number of events being supported) has not changed from the previous funding round 2020 2023.
- 5.3.2. For the Community Festivals Fund 2023 2026 application process, the selection criteria have been adapted to embed awareness of the Islington Council's Vision

- 30 strategy and to promote good environmental policy and practices among prospective grant applicants.
- 5.3.3. All applicants were signposted to Islington Council's Vision 30 strategy as part of the application process and expected to demonstrate that appropriate consideration was given to the environmental impact of their proposed festival.
- 5.3.4. All applicants were required to clearly demonstrate a commitment to using environmentally friendly policies and practices and to identify how these would be embedded in the delivery of the proposed festival with examples. Where an organisation had an environmental or sustainability policy in place, this was to be declared and supported by examples of how sustainable practices would be embedded within the delivery of the proposed festival.
- 5.3.5. The inclusion of a dedicated application section about environmental responsibility provided the opportunity for applicants to indicate 'source local' principles, low carbon behaviours and highlight innovative or creative climate change mitigation projects as part of their proposal.
- 5.3.6. Successful grantees will therefore have made reference to active plans to minimise waste, encourage walking/cycling, minimise car usage and facilitate other best green festival practices as part of their proposed events and activities.
- 5.3.7. By requiring all applicants to consider their proposal's environmental impact and to identify sustainable and environmentally friendly actions, a baseline for monitoring has been created.
- 5.3.8. Successful grantees will continue to receive relevant signposting to the council's Vision 30 initiatives throughout the three-year cycle of the Community Festivals Fund.
- 5.3.9. Successfully grantees will be signposted to arts and culture sector-specific information about evolving sustainability and environmentally best practice and encouraged to seek relevant accreditation where possible.
- 5.3.10. An annual review of environmental impact considerations and best environmental practice forms part of the monitoring and evaluation reporting framework for successful grantees to ensure that their festivals continue to contribute to a net zero carbon Islington by 2030.

#### 5.4. Equalities Impact Assessment

- 5.4.1. The council must, in the exercise of its functions, have due regard to the need to eliminate discrimination, harassment and victimisation, and to advance equality of opportunity, and foster good relations, between those who share a relevant protected characteristic and those who do not share it (section 149 Equality Act 2010). The council has a duty to have due regard to the need to remove or minimise disadvantages, take steps to meet needs, in particular steps to take account of disabled persons' disabilities, and encourage people to participate in public life. The council must have due regard to the need to tackle prejudice and promote understanding.
- 5.4.2. An Equalities Impact Assessment is not required in relation to this report, because the Community Festivals Fund has been designed to support Islington-based organisations to deliver high quality, innovative, community focused festivals that are accessible to, and provide benefit for, residents across the borough and promote cultural benefit, stronger communities and partnership working.
- 5.4.3. Equalities values and principles are embedded within the eligibility and selection criteria for the Community Festivals Fund. Grants are awarded upon assessment of the seven key critieria identified for the fund: cultural benefit, diversity and equality, value for money, inclusivity and accessibility, match funding and partnership, through well-managed festivals and event activities with borough-wide reach which meet the council's priorities.
- 5.4.4. It is a core requirement to satisfactorily demonstrate how grant allocation from this fund will be used to ensure accessibility and inclusivity for Islington's most disadvantaged communities, such as those from areas of high deprivation, in addition to being open and welcoming to all from across the borough.
- 5.4.5. Festival organisers must demonstrate a commitment to providing events that meet the diverse needs of local residents, many of whom have protected characteristics. Equality values and impacts must be considered by festival organisers to fully enable the broadest range of Islington residents to be involved in festivals as audiences, participants and organisers.
- 5.4.6. Organisations that are recommended for grant awards from the Community Festivals Fund are assessed on their ability to satisfactorily evidence their ability to deliver events with equality, diversity and inclusion present. This will be demonstrated through one or more targeted approaches that:
  - showcase and support creative ideas from communities who are underrepresented in or don't usually engage in arts, culture and heritage activities

- provide opportunities for local communities to experience socially engaged art relating to the environment, climate change and/or sustainability, and to health and well-being.
- give under-represented or marginalised groups opportunities to lead or facilitate arts, culture and heritage activities and/or
- increase creative employment and volunteering opportunities for underrepresented or marginalised groups
- 5.4.7. The Community Festivals Fund provides resources for arts-led community-focussed festivals that encourage local people from a range of different backgrounds to engage with a breadth of creative and cultural activities that highlight and celebrate Islington's diverse communities.

## 6. Conclusion and reasons for recommendations

6.1. The Community Festivals Fund provides an opportunity for the Council to support four local organisations to develop and deliver a broad range of events that will provide borough-wide benefit for local residents. Officer recommendations have been made assessing each application against established eligibility and funding criteria and on the quality of the applications.

## **Appendix B**

Islington Community Festivals Fund 2023 - 2026 Eligibility and Selection Criteria

Before making an <u>application</u> to the Community Festivals Fund, please read this guidance on Eligibility and Selection Criteria.

Applicants are strongly encouraged to read the following eligibility and selection criteria. We will be looking to fund and work in partnership with organisations that can help us to achieve the priorities outlined below.

### **Eligibility Criteria**

- Funding is restricted to arts, culture, voluntary, community and faith organisations based in Islington.
- Organisations can only apply for funding for one festival in the three-year grant round.
- Each festival will be eligible for one award. Where a number of organisations are contributing different elements of a festival, they should work together to submit one application.
- Community Festivals Fund applicants must show they have secured external funding for their event and will not be solely reliant on funding from Islington Council.
- Festival applications must demonstrate how they will provide borough-wide benefit for Islington residents.
- The following are **not** eligible for funding: events of a party political nature; events promoting a religious doctrine; fundraising events, including fundraising for charities; events viewed as offensive or defamatory; profit-making organisations; individuals.
- Small community events primarily of benefit to local neighbourhoods or specific ward areas are **not** eligible to apply to the Community Festivals Fund but can contact <u>LocalInitiativesFund@islington.gov.uk</u> to discuss eligibility to apply for <u>Local</u> <u>Initiatives Funding</u>.

Eligible constituted organisations can apply must fulfil the following criteria:

- Have a written governing document or constitution
- Have a governing body with at least three unrelated members
- Have a UK-based bank or building society account in the name of the organisation, with a minimum of two unrelated signatories

- The organisation must have been active for at least one year and can produce annual accounts for a whole year
- Have safeguarding policies for working with children and vulnerable adults in place

Organisations should also note the following conditions for funding:

- The organisation must not have two years of late submissions to the Charity Commission/Companies House within the last two completed financial years
- The organisation must not have two years of net current liabilities within the two most recent completed financial years
- Organisations where Trustees are paid are not eligible unless evidence of approval is provided from The Charity Commission and/or this arrangement is referenced in the governing document

**Unconstituted groups** or organisations who are unable to meet **all** of the above criteria are eligible to apply for Community Festivals funding under the following condition:

 Must be able to nominate an Islington-based constituted organisation that can accept a grant on your behalf

If you are unsure whether your organisation is eligible, please do not hesitate to contact us by emailing <u>culture@islington.gov.uk</u>.

#### **Selection Criteria**

The Community Festivals Fund aims to support organisations based in Islington to deliver high quality, innovative, community focused festivals that benefit our residents and promote community cohesion, access, cultural benefit and partnership working.

Applicants will need to show that the proposed event meets <u>all</u> of the following funding criteria and compliance conditions. These form the basis for assessment of Islington Community Festivals fund applications:

- Cultural Benefit
- Equality and Diversity
- Value for Money
- Inclusive and Accessible
- Are well-managed
- Match Funding
- Demonstrate partnership working
- Licensing and Public Protection

Please see below for expanded guidance notes for each individual selection criterion.

#### 1. Cultural Benefit

Events will need to deliver high quality and community focused activities that:

- maximise access to and participation in cultural activities
- celebrate Islington's diversity
- improve, animate and interpret the physical environment
- promote community cohesion and a sense of place.

#### 2. Equality and Diversity

Festivals will promote community involvement and encourage people from a range of different backgrounds to participate. Festivals will recognise and value Islington's diverse communities, promote good relationships between people of different backgrounds and lifestyles and contribute to the Council's commitment to making Islington a fairer place for people to live, where discrimination and inequality are addressed.

These values will be visible in event programming by:

- ensuring that participating artists or components of the festival reflect and are attractive to the diversity of local people, cultures and lifestyles in Islington
- involving local people to define festival aims and objectives
- promoting understanding, tolerance and cohesion.

#### 3. Value for Money

Islington Council is committed to providing value for money in all its services. Event costs should be realistic and clearly itemised with income matching expenditure. If you have organised festivals in previous years, you can provide evidence of their success (e.g. press cuttings, photographs and any evaluation reports).

### 4. Well-managed

The festival organiser(s) will need to demonstrate that the event will be well managed; that appropriate consideration has been given to the impact and safety of their festival **including** its environmental impact with reference to Islington Council's <u>Vision 30 strategy</u> working towards a net zero carbon Islington by 2030; and that organisers have the knowledge, skills and capacity to deliver the event independently and effectively – this includes demonstrating appropriate contingency planning.

Organisers will also need to provide evidence of their planned approach to monitoring and evaluation for reporting purposes.

## 5. Inclusive and accessible Page 50

Activities should be open to all the community and accessible and inclusive for Islington's most disadvantaged communities. Applications from organisations that are based in areas of high deprivation will be particularly welcomed. Proposals should clearly demonstrate a commitment to using environmentally friendly policies and practices with reference to Islington Council's climate emergency guidance.

We are particularly keen that festivals will attract people from the following groups (who can often feel excluded from these events) as well as people from across the Islington community, to actively take part in the festivals as audiences, participants and/or organisers:

- Disabled people
- Black, Asian, Minority Ethnic and Refugee communities
- Lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender groups
- Older people
- Young people
- Children

Applicants will need to clearly detail which of these groups will participate in the event and what engagement method(s), including targeted marketing, will be used to encourage these groups to be involved. Applicants must also demonstrate how they plan to monitor inclusivity and manage the collection of audience and participant demographic data in a respectful and ethical manner.

All festivals must be open and accessible to the general public and provide benefit across Islington, not just to the organisation's own members.

#### 6. Match Funding

Applicants are required to seek funding from more than one source. This may include contributions from the lead organisation itself as well as charities and trusts, business sponsorship, other local grant schemes, Arts Council England or the Heritage Lottery Fund. Applicants seeking Community Festivals Fund support must secure external funding for their event and not be solely reliant on funding from other council sources.

#### 7. Partnership Working

Applicants are encouraged to work with other agencies and organisations that may be able to share costs, facilities and expertise, and support the involvement of participants or beneficiaries.

Funding will be conditional on applicants liaising with the Council in order to guarantee that the Council have a presence at the festival. This includes Islington Council stalls and any marketing, publicity or information that would benefit Islington residents. Stalls should be provided free of charge to the Council. An update on plans to liaise with Council departments must be provided to the Cultural Enrichment Team prior to the festival each year.

#### 8. Licensing and Public Protection

Applicants will need to comply with the following public protection requirements.

- **Venue Permissions**: You will need to obtain written permission from the owner of the space you are using, whether you choose a school, a community centre, an estate or other open space, and attach a copy to your application.
- **Public Liability Insurance**: Funding will be conditional on you obtaining sufficient public liability insurance. You may be able to arrange cover through your existing insurer. You must include the cost of insurance premiums in your budget.
- Entertainment Licensing: If you are putting on any form of entertainment, such as live or recorded music, film or video, a disco, bands, or live performance, you will need to apply for an entertainment licence. Applications for a licence need to be received at least 28 days in advance of the event. For all enquiries about this contact the Council's Licensing Team on licensing@islington.gov.uk or telephone 0207 527 3031.
- **First Aid**: You will need to arrange First Aid cover for your event. If you do not already have a trained first aider, a representative from your organisation must complete training or you will need to hire first aid support for the festival.

### Record keeping and accounts

- Full financial records must be kept and evidence of expenditure must be provided if requested by the Council (e.g. copies of receipts, invoices etc).
- Accounts must be independently audited/inspected as required by legislation at the end of the financial year.
- Records and information must be made available for inspection by the Council at any reasonable time.

## **Activity Reporting**

Organisations must complete a report back form annually to provide information on how the grant has been spent.

The form (see Appendix / Schedule x) must be submitted to the Council no later than six weeks after the core festival event or by 31 March each year, whichever is earlier. Through this monitoring, organisations will be required to demonstrate how they are delivering against the activities proposed in their application. Full financial reporting, a review of environmental impact considerations, details of community engagement content and results of audience surveys (postcode, age, demographic details etc) are expected.

A final debriefing session with the Council for organisations to review their experience of the funding cycle will take place after the third year's festival.

## **Publicity**

The Council will publish details of grant awards and may include information about funded activity in council publications. Islington Council's support of the event through the Community

Festivals Fund should be acknowledged in any publicity or information relating to the activity for which the funding has been awarded.

### **Equalities**

All organisations must comply with equalities legislation and must promote equalities and good community relations in all areas of its work and the activities for which the grant has been awarded.

### **Safeguarding**

Applicants must comply with relevant legislation regarding the activities being delivered:

- Where projects will involve event team members working alone with children, young people or vulnerable adults, the relevant lead event staff must have up to date Enhanced DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) checks.
- Staff and volunteers should be aware of who to contact if they are concerned a vulnerable adult is being abused or if they have concerns about a child or young person's welfare.
- Organisations/projects providing services or activities specifically for children/young

#### **SUBJECT: Voluntary and Community Sector Partnership Grants Programme 2024-2028**

#### 1. SYNOPSIS

The council's four-year VCS Partnership Grants programme is due to end on 31st March 2024.

The current grant budget totals £2,696,000 per annum.

Since the launch of the council's VCS Partnership Grants Programme 2021 - 24, the council has developed a new Corporate Plan - Islington Together 2030, which sets out the vision for a more equal Islington, agreed a series of Missions to help achieve this vision and has undertaken significant work to enable us to tackle inequality and lead the way in early intervention and prevention.

The council's VCS Partnership Grants Programme is a key component of the council's efforts to support the development of resilient communities. The Voluntary Community and Faith Sector (VCFS) play are key role in supporting our communities through these difficult times and are themselves facing significant challenges. The Council has committed to maintaining the VCS grants programme. This paper sets out details of the current programme and recommends that authorisation is given to initiate the programme within a framework set out below. It also recommends the overall budget for the programme to be included in the Council's budget setting.

#### 2. RECOMMENDATIONS

To approve the development of the Council's VCS Partnership Grants Programme, enabling consultation and co-production of the programme with key stakeholders, including elected members, council departments, CCG (Islington Integrated Care Group) and VCS partners

To recommend to the Executive the maintaince of the existing council budget of £2,696,000 from General and Housing Revenue Account funding streams for 2024/25.

To agree the outline timetable for the development and delivery of the 2024 – 28 grants programme as outlined in appendix 1.

To approve negotiations with Islington CCG to seek commitment to continue joint funding for Advice provision in the borough at existing levels (£119K per annum) throughout the duration of the 2024-2028 programme.

#### 3. BACKGROUND

Our recently published Islington Together 2030 plan sets out a bold vision for working together with our communities to create a more equal future for our borough by 2030 and the <u>five key missions</u> we have set ourselves to achieve this.

In summary, we want Islington to be a place where people know their children will get the very best start in life, where people can access help and support when they need it and where wealth is created and enjoyed locally. A place where people can live sustainable, happy and healthy lives.

The council's corporate plan provides the over-arching framework for our work and the partnerships that the council forms with the voluntary and community sector, through our Fairer Together objectives.

The council has set out ambitions to adopt an early intervention and prevention approach to improve community resilience. Through this work a 'prevention' pyramid was established, segmenting services into four levels; 'specialist', 'targeted', 'universal' and 'place-shaping'. Achieving our aspiration of being the best council in the country at delivering preventative work will require a reorientation towards community resilience and a rebalance of our current spend towards early intervention and prevention work at 'universal' and 'place shaping levels'.

Islington's VCS are key partners in delivering an interconnected system of preventative services in community settings across the borough. The VCS play a key role in supporting our communities and have provided invaluable support through the pandemic and now with the cost of living crisis. Like the council, the sector itself is facing significant challenges. The council recognises the value of the sector and the challenges faced by the sector and has committed to maintaining the grants programme over the next four years. Unlike other boroughs, we believe cutting VCS grants isnt the answer. Instead we need to think about how else we can work together to harness the power of the whole system.

The council's Voluntary and Community Sector Strategy 2016-2020 ended in 2020 and work is underway to develop a new Communities Strategy that will seek to establish a co-produced strategic framework for the council and VCS – framing the whole council's work with the VCS. This strategy will seek to empower communities to enable resilience through our partnership with the borough's VCS.

The Compact which is currently being redeveloped and will come into effective in Autmn 2023 is the framework in which the Council and the VCS sector form alliances to enhance the relationship and equity in which we work. This provides a tool where the VCS are seen as partners in delivering our ambitions of a 'more equal Islington'.

#### 4. VCS PARTNERSHIPS GRANT FUNDING 2021 - 24

£2.7 million of the council's current annual £44 million spend with the borough's VCS is allocated through the council's VCS Partnership Grants Programme 2021-2024, a programme that provides core funding to our strategic VCS partners.

Islington's VCS Partnership Grants Programme serves as an enabler, ensuring that the borough has a strong, independent VCS that is able to respond to the needs of our local communities and to attract resource into the borough. The current grants programme will end on 31st March 2024 and work was carried out in the last programme to reframe the programme in relation to the Corporate Plan 2018-2022 and the council's ambitions for early intervention and prevention, and our focus on a fairer Islington.

The exact structure of the council's VCS Grants Programme 2021-24 was co-designed and co-delivered, with involvement of a range of Executive Members, directorates and external partners, including the CCG (Integrated Care Boards). Based on current arrangements and the opportunities identified through a mapping of grants and contracts that Islington CCG (Integrated Care Boards) and the council held with the borough's VCS, the current programme is structured around the following strands:

- Community Hubs
- Delivery Partners
- VCS Capacity Building
- Equalities and Cohesion Networks
- Volunteering
- Independent Advice

Funding to organisations across the 6 strands are detailed below, details of the various strands and the indicative levels of funding which were made available up to a total fund of £2,696,000:

The 2021-24 VCS Partnership Grants Programme provides funding to 50 VCS organisations, designed to meet our early intervention and prevention ambitions. (Details of awards in appendix 2).

All partners are subject to a rigorous assessment process and ongoing monitoring as 'strategic partners'. Organisations are continuously assessed, monitored and supported through a Funder+model in terms of; service delivery and outcomes for residents, governance, organisational management, financial management, fundraising capacity, communications, safeguarding, and data protection.

#### 5. VCS PARTNERSHIPS GRANTS FUNDING 2024 -28

The Council's VCS Partnership Grants Programme is a corporate undertaking, requiring collaboration across the organisation to ensure that that the programme responds to corporate priorities and the aims and objectives of different departments.

The VCS Partnership Grants Programme 2024, therefore requires a 'whole-council' approach in terms of development, design, administration and monitoring.

The Council is committed to providing funding support to VCS organisations to a total of £2,696,000 per year over the period Financial Year 2024-2028.

The current programme has been successful in moving towards a vision of a 'more equal Islington' and therefore, it is recommended that the programme for the coming period 2024–28, mirrors the current programme in place.

The recommendations are that the six strands and the indicative budgets remain the same, as they are detailed above, with a little more emphasis on collaborative working to ensure smaller grass root organisations are enabled and empowered to be part of the process, and we are able to use their expertise to support our harder to engage/reach communities.

The recommendation is that the application process which was previously just at one stage, be moved to a two stage process, for this to be in the from of a pre-qualifying questionnaire, to ensure the eligibility of applicants and make the process more streamlined and efficient.

The recommendation is for the Grants Programe to be launched in the summer of 2024, with a view for all new contracts to be aligned by 1 April 2024. (Timeline in Appendix 1).

#### 6. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The Council is committed to providing funding support to VCS organisations to a total of £2,696,000 per year over the period Financial Year 2024 - 28. This will be reflected in the Budget Setting report to full Council in February 2024.

Maintaining the Council's existing financial commitment of £2,696,000 per annum to the VCS Partnership Grants Programme requires continued funding of £119,000 from the CCG. The Council are currently drafting a formal agreement to guarantee the funding of £119,000 from the CCG for the next four years. The CCG have indicated support for this, but if the funding from the CCG is not available, the Council will require additional resources to support the programme. (Appendix 2)

It is intended that grant commitments will be protected for a four-year period although the award will be issued on a two-by-two-year basis as per the last grants programme.

The Council has been given an indication that its financial settlement for 2024/25 will be in line with the current settlement and the MTFS refresh incorporates a continuation of the scheme as proposed.

#### 7. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

The council has power to provide grants to voluntary and community sector organisations under the general power of competence set out in section 1 of the Localism Act 2011.

The Voluntary and Community Sector Committee is a sub-committee of the Executive and has delegated authority, in Part 5 of the Council's Constitution to 'oversee the Council's engagement with the Islington community and voluntary sector and to ensure value for money and fairness in the allocation of council resources to the sector' and to 'be responsible for the allocation off the Islington Community Fund including allocating the VCS Partnership Grants Programme.'

The provision of these grants is likely to be associated with state aid. The council can provide state aid in relation to 'services of general economic interest' (SGEI) as detailed in Article 106(2) of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union and Schedule 3 paragraph 4 of the Competition Act 1998.

Aid of up to €500,000 (approximately £435,000) may be provided to an organisation for SGEI so long as that organisation has not received de minimis aid from any other source in the last three fiscal years which would result in the total de minimis aid to that organisation exceeding the €500,000 (Commission Regulation No 360/2012, the "de minimis Regulation").

In the event that an organization has received other de minimis aid that takes it over the threshold of £435,000, there is an alternative regime for SGEI exemption for high value compensation that may be used. This was established by Commission Decision (2012/12/EU, the "Decision") that came into force on 31 January 2012. Should this be necessary the detailed rules on calculation of cost and record keeping and reporting set out in the Decision will need to be complied with.

#### 8. ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

The grant programme in itself has minimal environmental impacts, being limited to those associated with the office use of the staff involved. However, the grants will be used to fund activities that are likely to have a range of environmental impacts. These impacts will be considered during the award process and detailed in the VCS Committee report.
