1. Synopsis

3. Background

3.1 The premises currently holds a licence allowing:

- i) The sale by retail of alcohol, off supplies only, Mondays to Sundays from 09:00 until 23:00; and
- ii) The premises to be open to the public, Mondays to Sundays from 07:00 until 00:00.

3.2 Licensing History:

- A premises licence was sought by the current licensee, Mr Kazim Cinpolat, on 27th November 2019 and was subsequently approved on 8th January 2019.
- 20th August 2019, Trading Standards test purchase exercise where alcohol successfully purchased by 14 year old;
- 30th September 2019, premises licence review application sought;
- 25th October 2019, licensing compliance check, notes at Appendix 4.

4. Planning Implications

4.1 There are no specific planning permissions or planning enforcement cases that relate to this premises, which has a long established retail use.

5. Recommendations

5.1 To determine the application to review the premises licence under Section 52 of the Licensing Act.

5.2 The Committee must have regard to the application and any relevant representations. The Committee must take such steps as necessary for the promotion of the four licensing objectives.

5.3 The steps stated in Sections 52(4) of the Act are as follows:

- a) to modify the conditions of the licence; and for this purpose the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them are altered, omitted or any new condition is added;
- b) to exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence;
- c) to remove the designated premises supervisor;
- d) to suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months;
- e) to revoke the licence;
- f) the Committee also have the option to leave the licence in its existing state;

- g) the Committee also has the power in relation to steps a) and b) to provide that the modification and exclusion only has effect for a limited period not exceeding three months.

6. Reasons for recommendations

- 6.1 The Council is required to consider this application in the light of all relevant information, and if approval is given, it may attach such conditions as appropriate to promote the licensing objectives.

This application to review a premises licence relates to the licensing objective to protect children from harm. In particular, it relates to the sale of alcohol to a person under the age of 18 years of age.

A copy of the licence is enclosed as item 1.

Background

On 20th August 2019, Trading Standards conducted a formal test purchase using a minor (aged 14) and the premises licence holder and DPS sold one 330ml can of Hammerton Islington Steam Lager, with an ABV of 4.7% to a person under the age of 18, contrary to s.146 of the Licensing Act 2003. A Penalty Notice for Disorder was served on the seller by the Police. Photos of the alcohol purchased are attached as items 2 and 3.

The seller of the alcohol, Mr Kazim CINPOLAT, is also the premises licence holder and DPS for the premises. No refusals logs were in use on the premises and no training records were produced. No Challenge 25 posters were displayed in the store.

During the visit, a number of high strength Polish beers were displayed for sale in the fridges. These are known to be illicit as they have no English labelling on them, indicating that they are not intended for sale on the UK market and may therefore be illegally imported, duty evaded alcohol. These potentially illicit beers were branded as Perla (6% ABV), Zubr (6% ABV) and Debowie (7% ABV). No invoices were produced by the PLH for these beers. The detriment caused by illegal alcohol cannot be understated. It can be bought very cheaply because duty is evaded and means that shops can undercut their rivals unfairly. Selling cheap high strength alcohol might also encourage vulnerable street drinkers to drink more than they might otherwise. The foreign labelling (ie absence of labelling in English), in itself illegal under food standards law, also means that the end user may not know the ingredients are, which is especially important in the case of allergies.

Conclusion

The sale of alcohol to a minor is a serious matter and is a criminal offence under s146 of the Licensing Act 2003. The premises licence is already suitably equipped with licence conditions (specifically; annex 2, condition 1 which relates to the adoption of a Challenge 25 policy; condition 2 which states that Challenge 25 signage should be displayed; condition 3 which relates to the maintaining of refusals logs and condition 4 which relates to staff training). However, we have little or no confidence that age restricted sales are being taken seriously because:

- the seller of alcohol to a minor was in fact the PLH and DPS;
- there is an absence of staff training records;
- there is an absence of a refusals log, and
- no Challenge 25 posters were on display.

Additionally, a breach of annex 2, condition 9 was also demonstrated at the time of the visit, as the illicit beers were all 6% ABV or over.

Recommendations

Currently, we would need persuading that the licensee is fit to hold a licence, given the lack of evidence of the licence conditions concerning age restricted sales being applied and the duty evaded alcohol found in possession for sale. The conditions on the licence are adequate, it is the total disregard to them that is totally inadequate. We would therefore ask the committee to consider revoking this licence or imposing a long suspension if based on a credible and realistic plan of action that fully addresses all the matters outlined in this report.

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
 - a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
3. All door supervisors shall be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.
4. The admission of children to the exhibition of a film shall be restricted in accordance with the recommendation of a film classification body as defined in the Video Recordings Act 1984 or Islington Council acting as the licensing authority where it has given notice in section 20(3) of the Licensing Act 2003.

There are further 'Mandatory conditions' applicable to licences authorising the supply of alcohol. A full list of the current mandatory conditions is available from the licensing pages on Islington's web site, www.islington.gov.uk. This list is subject to change by order of the Secretary of State and licensees and other responsible persons are advised to ensure they are aware of the latest conditions.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

1. A proof of age scheme such as Challenge 25, shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as: a driving license or passport / holographically marked PASS scheme identification cards.
2. Challenge 25 notices shall be displayed at the premises.
3. A written record of refused sales shall be kept at the premises. The records shall be made available to the Police and Authorised Officer upon request.
4. All staff members at the premises shall receive appropriate training on induction training and at refresher training about operating Challenge 25, asking for proof of age, Checking forms of ID, making and refusing the sale of alcohol and completing the refusals register.
5. In the event that an assault is committed on the premises (or appears to have been committed) the management will immediately ensure that:
 - (a) The police (and, where appropriate, the London Ambulance Service) are called without delay;
 - (b) All measures that are reasonably practicable are taken to apprehend any suspects pending the arrival of the police;
 - (c) The crime scene is preserved so as to enable a full forensic investigation to be carried out by the police; and
 - (d) Such other measures are taken (as appropriate) to fully protect the safety of all persons present on the premises.
6. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to the police or an authorised officer, which will record the following:
 - a. All crimes reported to the venue
 - b. Any complaints received
 - c. Any incidents of disorder
 - d. Any faults in the CCTV system
 - e. Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service
 - f. All ejections of patrons
 - g. All seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
 - h. Any refusal of the sale of alcohol

7. CCTV shall be installed, operated and maintained, at all times that the premises is open for licensable activities, so as to comply with the following criteria:
 - a. The licensee will ensure that the system is checked every two weeks to ensure that the system is working properly and that the date and time are correct.
 - b. A record of these checks, showing the date and name of the person checking, shall be kept and made available to Police or authorised Council officers on request.
 - c. The Police must be informed if the system will not be operating for longer than one day of business for any reason.
 - d. One camera will show a close-up of the entrance to the premises, to capture a clear, full length image of anyone entering;
 - e. The system will provide full coverage of the interior of the premises and any exterior part of the premises accessible to the public;
 - f. The system shall record in real time and recordings will be date and time stamped;
 - g. Recordings will be kept for a minimum of 31 days and downloaded footage will be provided free of charge to Police or authorised Council officers on request (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998) within 24 hours of any request;
 - h. At all times, there will be a person on the premises who can operate the system sufficiently to allow Police or authorised Council officers to view footage on request and to supply a copy of footage immediately to Police to assist with the immediate investigation of an offence.
8. No more than 15% of the sales area shall be used at any one time for the sale, exposure for sale, or display of alcohol
9. There will be no sales/supplies of beers, ales, lagers or ciders of 5.5% ABV or above.
10. The premises shall operate a zero tolerance policy to drugs.
11. The shop shall have a current Health and Safety Policy in place. All staff members shall be trained in the Health and Safety Policy.
12. The shop shall have a current Fire Risk Assessment in place. All staff members shall be trained in the Fire Risk Assessment.
13. Firefighting equipment shall be provided and maintained at the premises. All staff members shall be trained in fire prevention, emergency procedures and the use of firefighting equipment.
14. A first aid kit will be available at the premises.
15. Prominent, clear and legible notices shall be displayed at all public exits requesting customers respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises quietly.
16. The off licence frontage shall be kept clean and clear of rubbish at all times.
17. Staff training records shall be kept at the premises at all times and shall be made available to the Police and Authorised Officers upon request.



I am submitting a representation on behalf of the Licensing Authority with respect to the premises licence review application, submitted by Islington Council's Trading Standards team in relation to the above premises.

The premises currently benefits from a premises licence authorising:

- The sale by retail of alcohol, off supplies only, Mondays to Sundays from 09:00 until 23:00; and
- The premises to be open to the public, Mondays to Sundays from 07:00 until 00:00.

The grounds for the representation are:

- Protection of Children from Harm.

Issues of Concern

- The Licensing Authority supports the Trading Standards team's application to review the premises licence as it believes the standards of management of the premises (LP8) are well below that which we would expect. This is of particular concern when dealing with a shop selling alcohol (LP4). The reported failures in relation to significant breaches of licensing conditions, staff knowledge, training and record keeping very much highlights these inadequacies.
- Restricting access to alcohol for children under 18 has been a high priority for Islington Council (LP28) and is the reason premises licences, such as this one, have conditions attached to aid such. The findings of the Trading Standards team in this case clearly identify failures in complying with such targeted conditions and indicates a disregard on the part of the licensee and DPS as to their importance.
- Officers inspecting the premises, post-sale, noted a significant number of potentially illicit beers for which the licensee could produce no receipts, significantly from a compliance perspective, these beers were identified as being in excess of 5.5% ABV, another clear licence condition breach.

The Licensing Authority expects a well-run off-licence premises to work in helping to tackle alcohol dependence and street drinking, this breach is an example of a clear failure in this regard and does nothing to engender confidence in the management of this premises moving forward.

Summary

The management of the premises has been shown to be inadequate with significant compliance, record keeping and training failures, these failures have, in the view of the Licensing Authority, directly led to the test purchase failure on 20th August 2019.

The fact that the Licensee & DPS was the individual responsible for the sale is of significant concern and an important consideration when determining this application.

However, officers visited the premises at 20:40 on 25 October. Officers spoke to Ozguler Cinpolat, the son of the premises licence who showed them comprehensive documents which covered refusals at the premises, staff training, an incident log and a CCTV log. All premises licence conditions were being complied with at the time of the visit and all high strength beers and ciders, previously being sold at the premises had been removed from the shelves.

The Licensing Authority therefore supports the Trading Standards review. Following the aforementioned visit, the Licensing Authority recommends that a short suspension of the premises licence be considered. The Licensing Authority also recommends the removal of the Designated Premises Supervisor.

Representation from Camden and Islington Public Health on behalf of health bodies providing services in Islington.

We are submitting a representation in response to the request by Islington Trading Standards team for a review of the license for the above premises. Islington Trading Standards team have brought this review following the sale of alcohol to a person aged under-18 years. Islington Trading Standards team report that on 20/08/19 alcohol was sold to an under-age volunteer (14 years) working with them.

This representation is on behalf of Camden and Islington Public Health Department, which as a health body is a responsible authority.

The grounds for the representation are:

- The protection of children from harm

The relevant policies in Islington's Licensing Policy

- Licensing policy 14: The Licensing Authority expects licensees to operate to the highest standards of management, and to cooperate with responsible authorities, to prevent: The sale of alcohol to underage children
- Licensing policy 28: Children and alcohol

Alcohol, Children and Young People

The Chief Medical Officer's guidance on alcohol advises that an alcohol free childhood is the healthiest and best option. This is because there is well-documented evidence of the association between alcohol consumption and harm to children and young people aged under-18¹.

Research shows that alcohol use in young people is associated with a range of health risks. Alcohol poses a greater health risk to children than adults because they are still developing mentally and physically. Alcohol poses both short-term health risks to children such as acute alcohol poisoning and longer terms developmental risks. Harms are experienced in both those who binge drink and those who drink regularly. A single incident of drunkenness can have severe consequences for a person aged under 18.

Department of Health guidance provides evidence that drinking alcohol is associated with an increased likelihood of having sex and at a younger age, unprotected sex, teenage pregnancy, and the likelihood of contracting sexually transmitted infections

Alcohol use in young people is also associated with injuries from accidents or from fighting; perpetrating or being the victim of alcohol-related crime and violent crime; involvement in anti-social behaviour; school absenteeism; and poor academic performance.

There is evidence that early age of drinking onset is associated with an increased likelihood of developing alcohol misuse or dependence in adolescence and adulthood, and with dependence at a younger age.

Off-licences and shops licenced to sell alcohol play a significant role in underage access to alcohol. Of 11 – 15 year olds who reported drinking, 19% said they purchased this from off-licences or licenced premises (Smoking, drinking and drug use among young people in England survey, 2018)².

The licensing policy emphasises restricting access to alcohol for children as a high priority in Islington in order to help reduce the anti-social behaviour and health issues associated with underage drinking.

The impact of underage drinking in Islington

The impact of alcohol on young people is particularly great in Islington. The borough had the highest rate of alcohol specific admissions in London among those under 18 years, during the period 2015/16-2017/18 – a rate that, statistically, was significantly higher than the London average.

Over the period between 2015/16-2017/18, there were 43 young people from Islington³ aged under 18 admitted to hospital with an alcohol-specific condition. Alcohol specific conditions are directly caused by alcohol, such as alcohol poisoning, rather than one exacerbated by alcohol. This figure does not include those who only attended accident and emergency but were not admitted.

Conclusion

Islington experiences the highest level of alcohol-related harm among children and young people in London, and sales of alcohol to under-18 year olds is a significant source of alcohol for young people.

The Islington Licensing Policy states that licensees supplying alcohol to underage young people can expect the Licensing Authority to impose additional controls and sanctions and repeat offenders run the risk of their licence being reviewed. Islington Public Health fully supports the review of this licence.

Recommendation





Review pending. There was a notice displayed on the lamppost for this review.

We entered the premises and there was one person behind the counter, introduced ourselves and the reason for the visit. The gentleman we spoke to was Ozguler Cinpolat - his father is the Licence holder and DPS and he also said his sister works there.

Ozguler is aware of the review – he said that the notice which was hand delivered was given late. He also had some letters of support which he wanted to submit.

Going through the Premises Licence conditions – it appeared that they were all being complied with.

There was a notice on display requesting customers to leave the store quietly.

There was a Challenge 25 poster up in store behind the till. Ozguler produced a document that covered the Incident log, Refusal log, staff training log, CCTV log – Ozguler said there are 16 cameras in the store and the CCTV to be checked every 2 weeks. Fire Risk assessment to do.

The refusal log hadn't been completed fully- he showed us another note pad that had refusals on it which he needed to transfer in the main log.

All high strength beers and ciders previously sold at the premises had been removed from the shelves.


