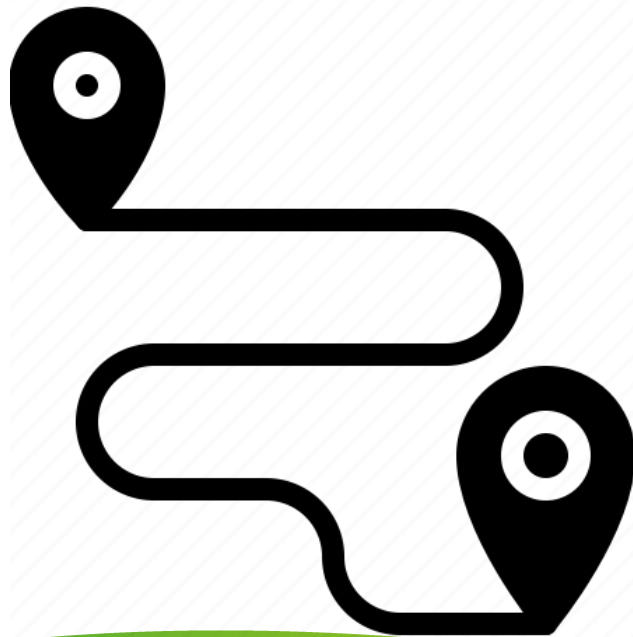

Covid19: Key moments for council services supporting children and young people



- Support for children of critical workers, vulnerable children with a social worker and those with an EHCP during the lockdown period including our close support to secure their attendance.
- Free wifi to our care leavers
- Devices organised and allocated to support children with their learning
- Food parcel deliveries vulnerable families in partnership with voluntary sector partners
- Investment in supporting the increasing for social, emotional and mental health support
- Ensuring other key services for children and young people including early years and childcare settings, adventure playgrounds, youth centres and hubs and libraries were open to those who needed it
- Face to face contact with children during the pandemic based on a dynamic risk assessment of the need for multi-agency support. Gradual resumption of face to face contact with children, young people and their parents/carers for other services
- Programmes of work to ensure that groups such as Black Caribbean pupils make good progress and attain as well as their peers
- Taking forward actions from our joint study with the Youth Justice Board to address the disproportionality of Black, Asian and other minority ethnic young people in the youth justice system
- Responding to community safety issues for young people

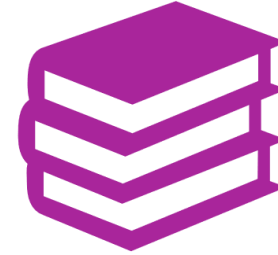

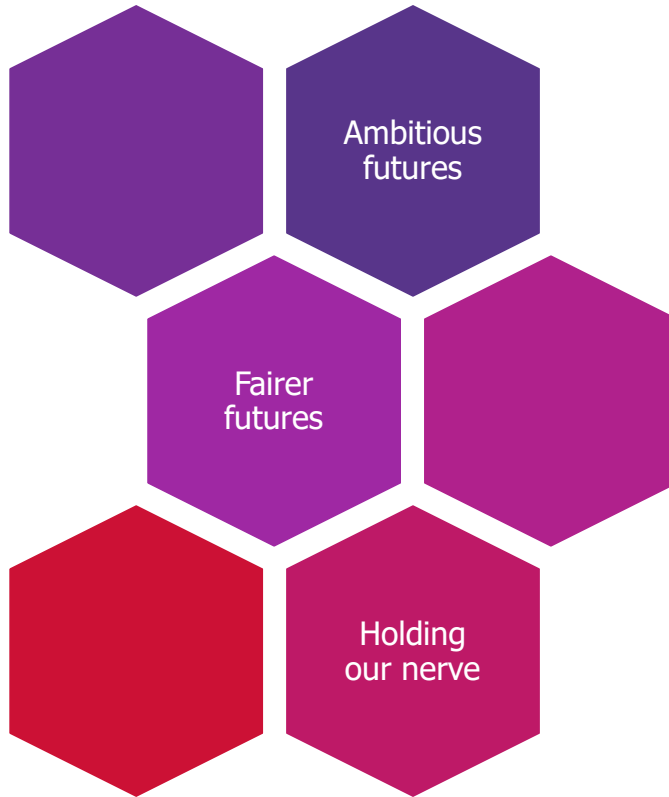

Children and young people at the centre: grabbing good opportunities from the Covid19 challenges



- Covid19 brought people together to do things differently and join up with children and young people at the centre.
- A 'new normal' means rebuilding back better:
 - A focus on equalities and equities that affect childhoods and life chances
 - Adapting swiftly to change to support children and families
 - New understanding of children and their families and their connection to everyone working with them
 - Care leavers – more we can do as a council that reduces isolation and opens up avenues for them
 - Learning from the device rollout - increasing digital access and internet connectivity
 - Strengthening participation and involvement of children and parents
 - All parts of the safeguarding system stepped up and we need to keep this
 - Strengthening relationships with external stakeholders to improve children's outcomes through individual actions e.g. headteachers.
 - Funding and income across services and support for children and young people in a post-Covid Islington

Early Help and Working Together for A Safer Islington
