

# Creating a cleaner, greener, healthier Islington

#### Where are we now?



We declared a climate emergency in 2019 and are working to help make Islington net-zero carbon by 2030.

Islington is one of the six London boroughs most at risk to climate change. Last summer's weather events show that London is already changing and feeling the impacts

We are working with local people, groups, businesses, and other boroughs.

# Housing, buildings and infrastructure





## Housing buildings and infrastructure

Our corporate energy savings programme is forecast to save more than £5 million on energy bills over three years.

We've secured £3.5m in grant funding to bring energy efficiency measures to 403 homes, saving more than one million kWh energy per year.

Delivery of new
Passivhaus standard
council homes on Vorley
Road will commence once
full planning permission
has been granted.

Work on energy efficiency measures at our Waste and Recycling Centre is expected to save 146 tonnes of CO2 per year.



### How we're working with others to reduce emissions

Our Energising Small Business Grant scheme has awarded a total of £160k to 128 businesses, saving 161 tonnes of CO2.

We have worked with schools on heat decarbonisation plans and delivered energy efficiency advice. Funding applications have been submitted for 9 schools eligible for PSDS

The Islington Community Energy Fund supports community-led, innovative energy projects that benefit Islington residents, particularly those struggling with fuel poverty, and reduce carbon emissions in the borough.

## **Transport**

# Low-traffic neighbourhoods (LTNs)

- Four of our seven LTNs have been made permanent.
- Air quality improved in all LTNs between 2019 and 2021.
- Islington topped the 2022
   Healthy Streets Scorecard
   for our action to create
   healthier streets

#### **School Streets**

- Islington has 35 School Streets, covering 88% of eligible primary schools.
- School Streets are set to be introduced at secondary schools from 2023/24.

# Transport (and place-making)

- We've announced exciting plans to cover 70% of Islington in LTNs and Liveable Neighbourhoods (target is 100% by 2030).
- Liveable neighbourhoods will see new green spaces, community enhancements, and public realm improvements to make Islington more resilient to climate change.



## Cleaner, greener travel



Our fleet now includes 80 full-battery electric vehicles, saving 300 tonnes in emissions per year.

Consultations underway on main road improvements on Essex Road and Southgate Road.

Engagement underway on four Liveable Neighbourhoods

More than 5,400 secure bike parking spaces across Islington



# Sustainable, affordable energy



## Sustainable, affordable energy

Our Seasonal Health Intervention Network (SHINE) supported 3,014 residents in 2022/23, saving 651 tonnes in carbon.

We're installing solar panels on five council buildings, including the Ecology Centre and Laycock Building.

Our innovative GreenSCIES project provides a blueprint for making use of previously-wasted heat.

### Green economy

Secured more than £2.7m to fund new Green Skills workshops at 13 colleges.

£60k Defra funding being used to deliver Smarter Greener Logistics programme, including potential shared e-cargo bikes programme.

Requirement for net-zero carbon added to our Affordable Workspace Specification.





# Natural environment and waste





#### Natural environment and waste



We've launched Islington Greener Together, which is supporting 38 community greening projects in phase one.

We've created our first Rain garden at Cleveland Road and the first Parklet at Mayton Street.

We've planted 450 new trees this year.

We're also giving all Islington primary school pupils a pack of calendula seeds to mark Islington in Bloom's 20<sup>th</sup> year.



We're running a pioneering food waste collection trial for flats above shops on Holloway Road.

We're also investing £2m in improving recycling on estates, and are improving recycling through the Thriving Neighbourhoods programme.



## Waste and Recycling Plan 2023-25

In March, we published our Waste and Recycling Plan for 2023-25.

We've committed to expanding food waste collection to all suitable purpose-built blocks of flats by next March.


We're working to create a zero emissions waste-collection fleet by 2030.

We've committed to recycling 75% of the commercial waste we collect by 2030.

## **Planning**

We're developing a new net-zero Supplementary Planning Document. We're directly engaging with residents and businesses on this, to hear your views.

To support households and businesses, we're now providing free, specialist pre-application advice. We've also created a new plain English guide to planning policies.

All new developments are required to be car free and new local plan policy will require all major developments and residential developments of one unit or more to be net zero

## Engaging, empowering and partnering



We've announced Islington in Bloom's 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary, and are working with the community to make it bigger than ever.



Through Greener Together and our Trees for Streets programme, we're helping local people and groups to shape the look and feel of their streets.



More than 3,000 people are subscribed to our environment bulletin and we continue to update our Together Greener website.



We supported the Islington Environmental Alliance, Islington Climate Centre and Union Chapel in delivering the borough's first Circular Economy event in September 2022



## Launching Go Zero

#### **Anchor Institutions are exploring plans for:**

- joint communications campaigns, starting with Go Zero
- bulk procurement of low carbon tech
- energy supply links to Renewable Power for London
- transport infrastructure and travel planning
- sharing of information and joint promotion of tree planting/biodiversity activities where appropriate
- monitoring and funding

# Finance





#### **Finance**

We've raised more than £9m through external grants in 2022/23, and we're working with partners including the Green Finance Institute to realise our net-zero carbon ambitions.

Islington submitted its return to the 'UK Cities Climate Investment Commission' which identified potential projects totalling £1.490bn and counting...

We need greater support from central Government to make our ambitions a reality.

# Engagement and creating the roadmap to 2030

- Identifying and building relationships
- Understanding barriers
- Co-creating the roadmap to 2030 – creating a culture and changing behaviours



 Planning guidance is out of date and needed urgently

- Residents are keen to codesign new planning guidance
- Tension between visual impact of solar panels and climate emergency

- Appointed an NZC SPD Officer in November 2022 to begin preparation of the Net Zero SPD. The Local plan will be adopted in the interim.
- Prepared a **simple guide to permitted development** which explains how residents can install solar panels on their homes without planning permission, as well as outlining the process for other retrofit measures.
- Developed engagement plans to ensure participation in the SPD development process starting with tonight's breakout session.
- Reassessing the council's position on solar panels and other interventions to protected buildings



- No trustmark contractors locally to deliver retrofit
- What about green funding for non council decarbonisation (residential/commercial)?

- Can we scale up CMIs? Are we looking at PFI models?
- Can we adopt a "polluter pays" approach?

- Produced a construction directory of 159 suppliers. Next stage will badge those able to provide retrofit works. Green construction officer to be appointed to enable in house and external capacity to deliver retrofit.
- Working with Green Finance Institute and others to explore alternative funding mechanisms including loans and property linked finance.
- Energising Small Business grants continuing £286,000
- Working with community energy groups and reviewing how best we can support these.
- Wider market conditions and recent CMIs show a decrease in demand.
   GLA have delayed issuing a Green Bond.
- Reviewing alternative delivery models including Joint Ventures, partnership and ESCOs
- Have introduced changes to parking fees and charges to support environmental priorities.



- LTNs can be a hindrance for local businesses
- How can we use licensing to encourage sustainability?
- Peer to peer business support could be more effective that council led?

- Can we upskill council staff to help spread net zero messaging
- Opportunity to use Union Chapel for a sustainability event – can we collaborate?

- Local Economies Officer working with businesses on concerns around LTNs
- New licensing policy sets expectations for supporting the council's net zero ambitions
- Islington Sustainability Network, (a community of businesses, nonprofit organisations, and groups committed to sustainability), relaunched last autumn, now scoping plans for mentoring support and training for businesses.
- Reviewing **internal training** to introduce greater climate awareness and develop a Making Every Contact Council net zero module.
- Supported the successful Waste Stops Here event in September, led by the Islington Environmental Alliance and Islington Climate Centre and the Union Chapel events team



 Council should ask suppliers for more commitment to sustainability

- People don't have access to Food Waste recycling across the borough
- We need to address food waste
- We should capitalise on engagement with greening as tangible link to Net Zero
- Increase focus on biodiversity in Islington in Bloom
- More opportunities for greening?

- Introduced 30% social value and environmental commitments on Highways Contract, exploring emerging contracts for opportunities and joint approach with London Responsible Procurement Network
- Introduced a food waste trial for flats above shops
- New Islington Food Strategy published and working with ReLondon via London Councils on Eat Like a Londoner campaign.
- We launched the Greener Together programme 38 community led projects in first phase.
- Greater focus on biodiversity and increased promotion of Islington in Bloom for 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary
- Secured funding to identify greening of 'stub roads'



 The platform offers a range of tools to allow residents to engage with a consultation project.






## Let's talk net zero Suggested citizens panel model

- Hybrid: quarterly meetings in person in an accessible community location and some online sessions that could include expert workshops or surveys and focus groups.
- 2. Externally facilitated: we will approach expert organisations to facilitate the quarterly sessions.
- 3. Robust sortition: to ensure effective democratic participation we will recruit a demographically representative pool and also ensure an effective spread of views and knowledge of NZC issues.
- 4. Inclusivity: we will fund every participant to undergo climate awareness training to be able to participate effectively and ensure that sessions are run in a way that people can express their views in multiple ways, are held at appropriate times etc.
- 5. Align with a wider council citizens network: the council has big ambitions to put communities in the driving seat and in the medium term to have a "Let's Talk Community" (building on our Let's Talk Islington engagement programme) which members of the NZC panel would be eligible to be part of and take advantage of other opportunities.
